Karen Roy is the Keynote Speaker

Karen attended Whittier schools including Leffingwell Elementary, Granada Intermediate, and graduated from La Serna High School as first in her class. She went to UCLA to earn both BS and MS degrees in Kinesiology.

Presently she is the chairperson/professor of the Department of Biological Sciences at Los Angeles Valley College in Van Nuys. She has taught biology, health, anatomy, biological sciences and physical education. She also served as a coach and women's athletic director at LA Mission College.

Her honors include the Bank of America Award in Science and Mathematics at La Serna High School. She was a Regents' Scholar and received Honors at Entrance at UCLA. At Los Angeles Valley College she received the "Above and Beyond" Award.

Throughout high school and college, Karen competed in many sports and was an elite track and field athlete competing in the AAU. Later she took up the sport of bicycle racing and became a coach and organizer of events. She was the first woman to be selected as a United States national cycling coach. She represented the United States at three world championships. Karen was hired by Midol and Self Magazine as their media spokesperson for their sponsorship role in the first-ever



inclusion of women cyclists in the 1984 Olympic Games. This expertise has allowed her to travel and work at sporting events throughout the world.

Karen started pursuing interests in the areas of science, health and athletics when she was attending local schools and it developed into a multifaceted career path. We welcome her to our 16th Math/Science Conference for Eighth Grade Girls.


have been answered on the AAUW website. They are reprinted here for your information and assistance in your decision making.

Is the restructuring proposal the same as a merger between the Association and the Educational Foundation?

No. The restructuring proposal is a different legal process, which is called a transfer of assets. The Association (AAUW) is a 501(c)(4) IRS status nonprofit corporation, and the AAUW Educational Foundation is a 501(c)(3) IRS status nonprofit corporation. Both statuses have separate legal, accounting, and tax compliance requirements. The proposal to transfer the majority of assets and activities was based on a legal review of options that best meet AAUW's current and future needs.

If the proposed bylaws changes are approved, how are members affected?

A unified organization will strengthen members' ability to efficiently and effectively promote education and equity for all



women. If the amendments are approved, beginning July 1, 2009, memberships will be created in the 501(c)(3) corporate entity, plus the current 501(c)(4) entity. Members' dues will be paid to only one organization, AAUW. At the local branch level or for a member-atlarge (MAL), the organizational restructuring will not have a significant impact and will appear seamless.

The amended proposed 18 articles of corporation will be available in the Spring *Outlook*. Hopefully by June we will know how to vote when we attend the convention.

It's interesting to learn about some of the ways that money generated from donations to EF is used. Fellowship and Grants are given to women in these categories. American Fellowships support women doctoral candidates. Career Development Grants support women who hold a bachelor's degree and want to advance their careers or change to a new career. Selected Professions Grants are awarded to women to pursue courses of study in professions in which women's participation has traditionally been low (i.e. Architecture, Computer/Information, Engineering, Mathematics/Statistics). Community Action Grants provide seed money for innovative programs that promote equity and education for women. International Fellowships are awarded for full-time study or research to women who are not U.S. citizens or permanent residents. As you can see, there are a wide variety of possibilities.

At a luncheon held in the fall some of the grant recipients from California were introduced. American fellows recipients are pursuing education in German Cultural Studies, Drama and Theatre Studies, Anthropology and Communications, An International Fellow from Vietnam is studying in the Humanities at USC. (Nationwide International Fellows also include women from Ireland, and Uganda.) A Career Development Grant recipient is studying library science at San Jose State. Community Action Grants have been awarded for the following projects: Iridescent Family Science Project; Mother Daughter Puberty Education Project; Girl Power Program; Arhythmetic Jukebox. These are only a few of the projects supported by EF in California and of course many more nationwide. As you can see, they are varied and worthwhile. I was impressed by the number or projects supported as well as their diversity. It has made me realize how worthwhile our contributions are to the work of the Educational Foundation.

Jill's Letter to Legislators is a Model You Can Use

As your constituent, I join with the American Association of University Women (AAUW) in strongly urging you to vote yes on the Ledbetter Fair Pay Act (H.R. 11) and the Paycheck Fairness Act (H.R. 12) when this critical legislation comes to the floor this week. I also urge you to vote against a motion to recommit and any other attempts to weaken this bill.

As the 2007 AAUW report Behind the Pay Gap shows, women just one year out of college working full time earn only 80 percent of what their male counterparts earn, even when they work in the same field. With a record number of women in the workforce, wage discrimination hurts the majority of American families. In addition, wage discrimination lowers total lifetime earnings, reducing women's benefits from Social Security and pension plans and inhibiting their ability to save not only for retirement but for other lifetime goals such as buying a home and paying for a college education.

According to new data from the

Bureau of Labor Statistics, in 2007 the ratio of women's and men's median annual earnings reached almost 78 cents on the dollar for full-time year-round workers, up from just under 77 cents in 2006. This is the narrowest the wage gap has ever been, but it's only an additional one cent on the dollar.

While women have been hard at work to earn their extra penny, Congress has failed to pass legislation that would give women effective equal pay (continued on page 4)

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The AAUW Language of Collaborative Strategic Leadership

Stakeholders

Stakeholders are all the constituents who have some investment in the present health and future success of AAUW. In collaborative strategic leadership, all stakeholders are involved at some level throughout the planning process. Included are potential/targeted members and strategic partners as well as current members.

Vision

A vision statement encompasses what we want for the world, nation, or field we are in and what role we want to have played in achieving it, given our mission. A vision statement comes from the heart and compels, excites and inspires as well as communicates an ideal future state.

Mission Statement

A mission statement is a clear and concise statement of our purpose; why we exist. It is a brief statement that identifies the basic business the organization wants to be in. It should tell what, for whom, how and why. The mission should be known and understood by all members of the organization. Unlike the vision, it "comes from the head."

Strategic Goals

Strategic goals are what AAUW wants to do. They are the priorities that need to be the focus of the organization in accomplishing its mission. They are usually limited to 1-5 of the most important things that an organization wants to accomplish. They should be broad-based and challenging, clearly and directly supporting the mission of the organization. They are meant to last over time and do not need to be measurable.

Action Plans

Also called objectives, action plans are the specific actions that describe **how** the goals will be accomplished. They move the organization from where it is to where it wants to be by spelling out who will do what within a specific time frame and by what measures of success. These should directly link to the strategic goals and budget.

Additional Terms We Use Brand

The perception of what AAUW is, built over time through experience with the organization and its products and services. In marketing, the sum total of an organization's value, including products, services, people, advertising, positioning and culture. The more consistent a brand is, the more powerful it is.

Programs

All activities conducted in pursuit of our mission. Ideally, this is what all levels of the organization focus most of their time, energy and resources on. The most effective programs are built on an understanding of the organization, its goals, targeted users of the programs, knowledge of the content, and application of best pedagogical, public policy, and other practices. They repurpose existing intellectual capital, coordinate both in scope and sequence, and are continually refined and evaluated for their ability to meet organizational goals.

Value Proposition

A value proposition is a clear statement of the tangible (or intangible) results a customer gets from using services or joining. The more specific a value proposition is, the better. The value proposition is effective when it offers targeted users something they want that is greater from their perspective than what they would have to give up to get it.

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AAUW Public Policy Action Alert

As one of the first actions of the new 111th Congress, the House is expected to vote this week on both the Ledbetter Fair Pay Act (H.R. 11) and the Paycheck Fairness Act (H.R. 12), providing a critical opportunity for Congress to make real progress on pay equity. AAUW Action Network members have worked tirelessly on behalf of both of these bills in the past, and we ask you again to urge your representative to vote yes on this legislation and oppose any attempts to weaken it.

According to new data from the Bureau of Labor Statistics, in 2007 the ratio of women's and men's median annual earnings reached almost 78 cents on the dollar for full-time year-round workers, up from just under 77 cents in 2006. This is the narrowest the wage gap has ever been, but it's only an additional one cent on the dollar. One cent is chump change. It isn't real change.

While women have been hard at work to earn their extra penny, Congress has failed to pass legislation that would give women effective equal pay protections. In light of this, join AAUW in telling Congress that passing the Paycheck Fairness Act and the Ledbetter Fair Pay Act is an urgent priority. Tell Congress: "Keep the Change until Women Have Real Change."

The 2007 AAUW report **Behind the Pay Gap** shows that just one year

out of college, women working full time already earn less than their male colleagues, even when they have the same major and occupation. Ten years after graduation, the pay gap widens. With a record number of women in the workforce, wage discrimination hurts the majority of American families. In addition, wage discrimination lowers total lifetime earnings, reducing women's benefits from Social Security and pension plans and inhibiting their ability to save not only for retirement but for other lifetime goals such as buying a home and paying for a college education.

It is critical that stronger laws that more thoroughly address the wage gap be enacted. Specifically, AAUW urges the passage of both the Lilly Ledbetter Fair Pay Act and the Paycheck Fairness Act; we also urge their passage as a package, as part of the first set of bills the new president signs into law. Passing both bills, in tandem, is critical to the overall goal of achieving pay equity for women: the Ledbetter Fair Pay Act rights the wrongs done by the Supreme Court, regaining ground we've lost and ensuring that people who've been discriminated against can seek vindication. The Paycheck Fairness Act is a comprehensive bill that would create stronger incentives for employers to follow the law as well as strengthen penalties for violations, strengthen federal outreach, education and enforcement efforts, and prohibit

retaliation against workers who ask about employers' wage practices. Together, the bills can help create a climate where pay discrimination is not tolerated, and give the new administration the enforcement tools it needs to make real progress on pay equity.

Take Action!

Urge your representative to support the Ledbetter Fair Pay Act and the Paycheck Fairness Act when they come up for a vote this week to ensure the change hard working Americans need to receive equal pay. Simply scroll down and follow the instructions to compose and send your message.

Spread the word and get others involved by sending a Keep the Change e-card to friends and family. AAUW also has Keep the Change posters and lapel stickers available for use at AAUW events, meetings, program, even protests that bear the slogan "Keep the Change until Women Have Real Change," and the penny graphic featured above. AAUW Leadership Corps Briefing

Part of a series focused on Life in the New AAUW Background

If the 2008 proposed bylaws are approved, AAUW will no longer have regions or regional directors as of July 1, 2009. In preparation for this potential change in AAUW's volunteer structure, an alternative volunteer leadership model is being proposed to the new AAUW board. For the present, this model is referred to as the "AAUW Leadership Corps" or LC.

Goal

To maximize member awareness and engagement, develop new branches, revitalize existing branches, increase overall branch membership and rate of growth, expand implementation of full AAUW program by branches, develop means of engaging members at large, and improve effective, multi-way communication among all levels of AAUW individual members, branches, states and national through a consistent and responsive volunteer corps.

Concept

Process: The board-approved Leadership Corps, consisting of member leaders—of a number yet to be determined—will help to identify prospective AAUW leaders, to mentor and support AAUW leaders, and to facilitate effec-

tive communication and engagement among all levels of our organization on an assigned basis, which will not necessarily be geographic. A selection process, job description, and evaluation process for the position of LC member will be posted on the AAUW website and distributed via e-mail in February 2009. Following notification, a website-based opportunity for members to apply for participation in the LC will be available; the application will be similar to the fillable pdf form that has been posted for volunteers to apply for future committee and task force roles.

LC Membership: All AAUW members would be eligible to apply to serve on the LC. Applicants need not be current officers, but they should be people who share the vision of a 21st-century AAUW, who exhibit strong leadership qualities, who are good multi-way communicators, and who have the time and commitment to devote to the role. LC members would be asked initially for a two-year commitment, with (a) a defined set of core responsibilities and (b) another set of alternative activities/duties from which they would be expected to choose one or more. LC activities would be coordinated by AAUW staff at the directive of the AAUW board.
