Notes from Brenda

Brenda Jahn, Whittier Branch President

I want to expand upon the June AAUW Convention.

Ginny Ball, Barbara Gile, Dolores Seidman and I were in attendance. It was an inspiring experience seeing the enthusiasm of the 977 women in action. The Association has 100,000 members and has been in existence for 125 years. **AAUW has made important gains for women and girls, and remains steadfast in the commitment to creating a level playing field for them.** Gender gaps persist, from grade school, through employment and into retirement. Women who work full time earn about 78 cents for every dollar men earn. High school girls represent only 17 percent of computer science Advanced Placement test takers, and college educated women earn only 29.1 percent of the bachelor's degrees in mathematics and computer science (down from 39.3 percent in 1984). In addition, women tend to be overwhelmingly clustered in low-wage/low-skill fields, thus making up less than 25 percent of workers in high-wage/high-skill fields. Further, many of these jobs do not afford women with important health care benefits or work/life balance supports such as flexible scheduling, paid sick leave, or parental leave.

AAUW is working on new opportunities on several fronts. Their federal policy agenda builds upon more than a century of advocacy by AAUW members at the local, state, national and international levels. This long effort breaks through barriers so all women and girls have a fair chance, and moves us closer to true economic and educational equity. In 2009-2010, AAUW will work to expand educational opportunities for women and girls, promote women's economic security and defend civil rights.

AAUW has a strong financial base and a well planned revenue strategy. They are continuing to invest in membership recruitment and retention. The AAUW renewal rate is better than in other membership organizations. They are developing new programs, products and services. AAUW will continue to solicit contributions from members and to build partnerships for grants and sponsorships. They are seizing on opportunities where AAUW has been in the news recently, e.g. Pay Equity and Healthy Families.

At our local level, the Whittier Branch supports Math Science, Tech Trek, Speech Trek, EF and LF. These are remarkable mentoring programs. In fact, the more I am exposed to our involvement in these events, the more I am in awe of their results. **AAUW Whittier Branch is a strong and amazing group of women.** I look forward to working with all of you this year. I know you will enjoy the interesting programs that Jan Berry, Beverly Ball and Peggy Burlingham have planned for you.

The last newsletter contained the first of our **Public Policy Principles for Action** stating our support for quality public education. Listed below are the remaining principles.

AAUW promotes the economic, social, and physical well-being of all persons. Essential to that well-being are an economy that provides equitable employment opportunities, a livable wage, reduction of poverty, quality affordable dependent care, paid family and medical leave, decent and affordable housing, quality affordable health care; and a clean and healthful environment. We support a Social Security system that provides inflation-protected, guaranteed lifetime benefits with a progressive benefit formula, spousal and widow benefits, and disability and survivor benefits.

AAUW believes in the right to privacy, freedom from violence, and choice in the determination of one's reproductive life. We firmly believe in the separation of church and state. We support a fair, balanced, and independent judiciary. We support public budgets that balance individual rights and responsibility to the community.

AAUW supports affirmative action to improve racial, ethnic, and gender diversity and affirms our commitment to passage and ratification of the Equal Rights Amendment. We support meaningful campaign finance reform and voter education efforts that will promote equitable political participation and representation.

AAUW values and is committed to the arts and humanities, which develop and enhance our pluralistic cultural heritage.

We will start our year with Ariana Franklin's historical thriller, *Mistress of the Art of Death*. The heroine, Vesuvia Adelia Rachel Ortese Aguilar, is a woman out of place in her own time. An orphan raised by an atheist Jew in twelfth-century Salerno, Adelia has mastered the "art of death" (what we today recognize as forensic medicine) in an age when medical practitioners of any sort as viewed as witches and sorcerers, and a woman's only place is in the home or in the convent. Gwen Woirhaye has had her share of health incidents. We miss you and your voice and know you will be back to normal after your next granuloma surgery.


Condolences to Pamela Holmes on the death of her sister Deborah Holmes who was 54 years old.
