#### \*It is a two-year board position.

\*The accounting system is Quicken, which is very user-friendly. (I have personally purchased three upgrades and with the current edition I'd be able to download it to your computer if you do not already have it.)

- \*Our checking account is held at US Bank centrally located and some grocery stores have branches.
- \*We have two CD's (which are laddered) held at Capitol Source Bank on Whittier Boulevard by Trader Joe's.
- \*A budget is prepared at the beginning of each fiscal year (usually June or July). It is then published in the September newsletter to be voted on by all members at that Branch meeting.
- \*I work with other board members and committee chairpersons on branch activities involving money.
- \*I prepare guest lists for all Branch meetings as well as receive money at those meetings.
- \*A monthly report is prepared after I reconcile from the on-line statement from US Bank. That report is presented to the board at the board meetings. All expenditures need to be approved by the board.\*It does require monthly maintenance and all work is done at home on my own computer.
- \*A \$50 account is available for ink, paper and postage expenses.

# MYRA LONG SCHOLARSHIP FUND (MLSF) BOARD SEEKS NEW MEMBERS

### PUBLIC POLICY BY SHARO

AAUW Executive Director Linda D. Hallman, CAE, issued the following statement on President Barrack Obama's nomination of Solicitor General Elena Kagan to the US Supreme Court:



"With his nomination of Solicitor General Elena Kagan, the president has selected a woman who has been a trailblazer throughout her distinguished legal career, holding such positions as the first woman dean of Harvard Law School and first woman solicitor general of the United States. AAUW is pleased to note that, if confirmed, the Supreme Court will have three women justices serving concurrently for the first time in history - breaking through yet another barrier for women and girls.

AAUW will carefully consider the totality of Solicitor General Kagan's record over the coming weeks. We look forward to the upcoming confirmation hearings and the candid answers of the nominee."

On May 11, 2010, I was privileged to be part of an AAUW conference call presented by the Legal Advocacy Fund. Holly Kearl and Adam Zimmerman were the presenters. Adam gave a complete description of the confirmation process for Elena Kagan and explained that AAUW will be submitting a list of questions they want to have answered at the hearings. After a complete investigation AAUW will take a stand for or against her confirmation. Each of you can receive this information by going to the website at AAUW.org.

At this same site you can investigate and take action on a number of items of federal legislation. Just click ACTION on the website and it will take you to the public policy page.

As you know, California's budget process is underway again. The Governor has proposed further cuts to key safety-net programs and Medi-Cal. These cuts will disproportionately affect low-income women and their families. Because women live longer and have lower incomes, they are more likely to rely on SSI/SSP for support in their old age. Budgets are about values and choices, so lets hope the legislature will take heed and provide a budget which helps California's women and the families they support. Contact your California elected officials and urge them to support a fair budget for our most needy citizens.
