# Women Helping Our Community to be Featured at March 10 AAUW Whittier Luncheon

The Whittier Branch of the American Association of University Women and their guests will meet on Saturday, March 10 at the Radisson Hotel, 7320 Greenleaf, Whittier, at 11:30 AM. The luncheon will be buffet style and include Chicken Kiev, mashed potatoes, a steamed vegetable medley, green salad, rolls and lemon cake for dessert. The cost is \$18.

The program will highlight WOMEN HELPING OUR COMMUNITY. Featured will be Ginny Ball, the president of the First Day Homeless Shelter of Whittier (and a Whittier AAUW Member) and Linda Argyle, Director of the Penn Rehabilitation Center.

The mission of the First Day Homeless Shelter is to help the homeless and at-risk individuals transition towards self-sufficiency. It provides short-term emergency transitional housing with on-site supportive services to 45 individuals at a time. These services include a health clinic, mental health services, on-site meals, case management, clothing, transportation, 12-step meetings, education, training and employment assistance.

The primary purpose of Penn Rehabilitation Center is to maximize the self-esteem, sense of responsibility and personal accomplishment of developmentally disabled adults. The secondary goal is to habilitate individuals to their highest social, psychological and vocational potential. This is done by providing a stress-free extended work services program along with academic, social and recreational opportunities.



Thirteenth Night by Alan Gordon Reviewer: Maurine Behrens

Gordon's title expands on Shakespeare's play and so does his plot. Narrator Feste, a 13<sup>th</sup> century member of the Fool's Guild (jugglers, jesters and secret agents) owns up to contriving the main events concerning the Duke of Orsino as recounted in Twelfth Night. Now, years later, the Duke has been murdered, and Feste, traveling incognito as a German tradesman, braves an ocean voyage to investigate his death and perhaps stymie a vengeful Malvolio. Witty wordplay, comical characters and exaggerated circumstances mark this fanciful and entertaining historical mystery.

#### AAUW Action Fund Releases Congressional Voting Record for 112th Congress

Partisan Gridlock Stalls Progress on Critical Women's Issues

WASHINGTON — The American Association of University Women (AAUW) Action Fund released today, February 13, a scorecard of congressional action on issues that will be critical to women and their families when they cast their votes in the upcoming elections.

The Congressional Voting Record, available at <u>www.aauwaction.org</u>, covers the first session of the 112th Congress, outlines how U.S. Senators and Representatives voted and whether they co-sponsored legislation on priority issues affecting education, economic security and civil rights.

As in the previous Congress, the story of the 112th Congress has been dominated by the economic recession. The similarity, however, stops there. While the 111th Congress made considerable progress on many of AAUW's priority issues, the current Congress has been caught in a vitriolic ideological divide. As a result, it has made little to no progress on women's issues. Instead of working to improve economic security, Congress has put eligibility for college affordability programs on the chopping block. Rather than helping women find jobs, Congress spent precious time and effort on damaging austerity measures. And while it could have been working to ensure women are paid fairly for their work, the House of Representatives instead attacked reproductive health programs.

"This voting record shows that Congress is gridlocked on the issues that can make a difference for women and their families," said AAUW Executive Director Linda D. Hallman, CAE. "This excessive partisanship isn't just disappointing, it's discouraging to a nation that expected the new Congress to make economic recovery priority number one."

There is a silver lining for some women's issues: The 112th Congress has made progress on campus safety and domestic violence. Thanks in part to AAUW's support, many senators and representatives became co-sponsors of legislation to protect students on college campuses, and the Violence Against Women Reauthorization Act was introduced.

Contact your elected officials in Washington, D.C. and urge them to support the Reauthorization of the Violence Against Women Act. Your voice will make a difference.
