State of Wonder, by Ann Patchett, is the book we will be discussing this month. Pharmaceutical researcher Dr. Marina Singh sets off into the Amazon jungle to find the remains and effects of a colleague who recently died under somewhat mysterious circumstances. But first she must locate Dr. Anneck Swenson, a renowned gynecologist who has spent years looking at the reproductive habits of a local tribe where women can conceive well into their middle ages and beyond. In finding her former mentor, Dr. Singh must face her own disappointments and regrets, along with the jungle's unforgiving humidity and insects, making the novel multi-layered and atmospheric. It has been described as "emotional, vivid and a work that will surely resonate with readers, truly a thing of beauty and mystery, much like the Amazon jungle itself." Fifteen years old, gawky, egotistical and recently orphaned, Mary Russell displays an intellect to impress even Sherlock Holmes - and match him wit for wit. Under his reluctant tutelage, this very modern twentieth-century woman proves a deft protégée and a fitting partner for the Victorian detective. In their first case together, they must track down a kidnapped American senator's daughter and confront a truly cunning adversary - a bomber who has set trip wires for the sleuths and who will stop at nothing to end their partnership.

The topic for the competition was SEXUAL HARRASSMENT IN SCHOOLS ... Big Deal? Students were to prepare an original five to six minute speech. Five high school students participated in the competition. Brenda and Peter Jahn, long time members of Toastmasters, conducted two workshops to help the students develop polished final presentations. Final judging was on Saturday, December 8. Pat Dudley greeted the contestants, family and friends as they arrived for the competition. The judges were Pamela Holmes, Dolores Seidman and Colleen Tan. Barbara Gile was timekeeper.

The three winners are:

First Place: Andrea O'Loughlin, a senior at La Serna High School. She is an AP student and participates in the school's theatre group. She also volunteers at the Whitwood branch library, Key Club and various other organizations. A DVD of her speech will be recorded in January or early February, and will then be submitted to AAUW-CA for entry into the state competition. She received a \$250 cash prize.

Second Place: Evelyn Guerra, a sophomore at California High School. She is an AP student, a member of the Scholars Academy, a member of the Speech and Debate team for two years, and is its secretary. She also volunteers at Laurel Elementary School. She received a \$150 cash prize.

Third Place: Keren Chulde, a senior at California High School. She has been a member of the Speech and Debate team for four years, and is its finance officer. She is active in the model U.N., her church and the YMCA. She has helped build houses with World Vision on China and Mexico. She received a \$100 cash prize.

ENOUGH IS ENOUGH

Urge Congress to Find a Balanced Approach to Reducing the Budget

Fewer teachers. Larger class sizes. Decreased funding for federal civil rights agencies. Fewer workforce training programs to get people back to work. Limiting a woman's access to affordable reproductive health services. Does this sound like the right path?

With the end of the year approaching, Congress still has not found a solution to avoid going over the so-called "fiscal cliff," a series of tax changes and spending cuts that are slated to take effect at the beginning of January 2013. Going over the fiscal cliff would be devastating to many of the programs we care about --- education, workforce training opportunities, research, and other programs that defend civil rights and protect women's health --- but equally as dangerous would be enacting an unbalanced deficit reduction proposal that hits these programs even harder.

AAUW is particularly concerned about cuts to funding for elementary, secondary, and postsecondary education; federal civil rights agencies; workforce training programs that promote job creation and economic security; programs that promote gender diversity in science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM); and programs that provide family planning and reproductive health services. These programs have already contributed to deficit reduction through prior spending cuts.

TAKE ACTION: Tell your members of Congress, "Enough is Enough": Nondefense discretionary (NDD) spending has already been cut to reduce the deficit, so we need a balanced approach that does not include further cuts to these critical programs.
