Join us at 10 AM on Monday, October 22, for discussion of Erik Larson's stunning narrative on the rise of Hitler and Nazi Germany, In the Garden of Beasts.

Our conversation will be led by Georgine Sweeney. Beginning in 1933, it chronicles the lives of William E. Dodd, the newly-appointed ambassador to Germany, his wife and flamboyant daughter, Martha. One reviewer has stated that the book is "suffused with the tense atmosphere of the period and unforgettable portraits" of the players involved. He goes on to say that the book "speaks volumes about why the world did not recognize the grave threat posed by Hitler." Our meeting will be held at Sandy Bridges', 1550 N. 

THANKS to all who donated items at our September meeting.

Besides issuing food to needy families the food center has a homeless lunch program. Each day between 50 - 70 homeless men and women are helped. They must show pictured identification.

Lunch bags consist of items such as muffins granola bars, sandwiches or salad, tuna kits, small drinks, fruit, small boxes of cereal, instant oatmeal, cup-size pudding, crackers, chips, etc. They also include personal items such as men/women socks, disposable razors, and small individual use toiletries.

They try to put enough in each bag to feed the person for the whole day

SPEECH TREK

The Whittier Branch of the American Association of University Women (AAUW) is sponsoring the Eleanor Stem-Allen Memorial Speech Trek competition. This contest is open to boys and girls enrolled in public and private high schools as well as home schooled students and those enrolled through continuation schools.

The topic for this competition is "SEXUAL HARRASSMENT IN SCHOOLS ... Big Deal?" Students are to prepare an original 5-6 minute speech. The three finalists will be awarded cash prizes. Brenda and Peter Jahn, long-time members of Toastmasters, will conduct two (2) workshops in October and November to help the students develop and hone their final presentations. Final judging will be on Saturday, December 8. A DVD of the first-place winner's speech will be recorded in January. The first place winner will also have the opportunity to compete at the state level for another cash prize.

PUBLIC POLICY by Sharon Heck

A White House special summer call Just for AAUW Members was held on Thursday, August 16. Hundreds of AAUW members around the country dialed up for this very interesting teleconference. Lisa M. Maatz, National AAUW Director for Public Policy and Government Relations, participated in the call. Tina Tchen, Executive Director of the White House Council on Women and Girls, and Chief of Staff to First Lady Michelle Obama, thanked AAUW for our support of issues focused on women. She asked us to get out the message to our membership on all policy issues.

Lynn Rosenthal, White House Advisor on Violence Against Women, said that President Obama has read our AAUW report on Sexual Harassment. She said the Violence Against Women Act (VAWA) actually expired at the end of 2011 and needs to be renewed. It was originally introduced by Joe Biden when he was a member of Congress. The President has activated some parts of VAWA, but it is very vulnerable without the funding activation by Congress. She said three women a day are killed by domestic violence, and that doesn't include children and other family members.



The expired law had improved law enforcement and prosecution. Young women from ages 15 to 24 are most vulnerable. Under pressure from men's rights groups the House passed a much weaker version and rolled back legal protection. She said these groups would take us back to a day when women suffered behind closed doors, and domestic violence was a "private family matter." The Senate passed a much stronger bill and the two houses must reach agreement on it before the end of September if it is to pass this year. This is an important issue about which we should write to our elected officials in Washington.

Several other topics were covered including the Affordable Care Act, women's employment in the Math/Science field, education, Title IX and pay equity. The Census figures show that women still make \$.77 for every \$1 men make for similar work. Perhaps I will cover some of these topics in a future newsletter article. It truly was a very interesting teleconference.
