There are several programs which are supported by your donations. They include the Educational Opportunities Fund (which awards fellowships and grants to students and for projects); The Eleanor Roosevelt Funds (which supports research); the Public Policy Fund (supporting government relations and civic engagement), the Leadership Programs Fund (which supports leadership and training for college students); and the Legal Advocacy Fund (which supports legal cases)

Public Policy

Public Policy is extremely important to our AAUW organization as a whole. The action priorities are voted on by the membership and those for 2011-2013 include:

- To support a strong system of public education that promotes gender fairness,

equity and diversity

- To achieve economic self-sufficiency for all women

- To guarantee equality, individual rights and social justice for a diverse society Each of these priorities has many subtopics I would be happy to share with you. I will have brochures available at our September 8 general meeting for those who want them.

Anyone can be placed on the e-mail list to receive the AAUW Washington Update which is published each Friday. The August 10 issue contained the following paragraphs in an article regarding state budget reports.

"AAUW believes that Medicaid, together with Medicare, is a crucial element of the social safety net. Americans, especially women, rely heavily on the protections Medicaid offers and the services it provides. Your donations to AAUW Funds and fully taxdeductible and you may send your donations in two ways. You can go to the AAUW Website, click on Give to AAUW, and submit money online. If you do that, please let me know about your donation. Our branch number is 0124. Or, you can send your check to me and I'll send it to the appropriate place for you.

For each \$500 donation, we can honor one of our members as our Named Gift Honoree. This year we are honoring three women who have made outstanding contributions to our Branch. They will receive certificates at our September meeting.

As implementation of the Affordable Care Act begins, AAUW believes Medicaid and other public health programs must continue to be maintained and strengthened.

AAUW is also committed to promoting quality public education for all students, and we strongly advocate a federal and state commitment to public education. AAUW strongly opposes any efforts to weaken public education through funding cuts. We support strengthening public education programs through preserving funding and maintaining protective legislation."

To take action on any topic, we are encouraged to go to AAUW.org. At the top of the page click on the word ACT. You will have several choices on the Action page including the Two-minute Activist. Contact your elected officials in Washington and Sacramento on topics that are dear to your heart. We can make a difference.
