A Few Fun Facts About The First Lady

Two days after Franklin Roosevelt's inauguration, Eleanor Roosevelt held her very own press conference. Thirty-five reporters attended, the number would eventually swell to 115. Eleanor held a total of 348 press conferences during her White House years, all exclusively for women! The First Lady wrote a news column carried by 62 papers with a readership of over four million. She was the host of a radio program for nearly a decade. Eleanor was among the few First Ladies who regularly cooked in the White House. Her favorite color was blue. For nine years she wrote a monthly article for *Ladies Home Journal* called "If You Ask Me". In her column she answered personal or political questions from the readership. While her husband was President, Eleanor worked for a brief time as Assistant Director of the Office of Defense; she did not take a salary, but she did teach ballroom dancing to the staff! Who knew?

PUBLIC POLICY

As we start our new year in the Branch, let's all commit to be even more aware of the issues still impacting woman and to take action whenever possible. A handwritten postcard, letter or email to a legislator on a topic important to you seems small, but it is a very powerful thing. It is antithetical to the spirit of AAUW to think that one lone voice does not matter. Remember Margaret Mead's exhortation, "Never doubt that a small group of thoughtful, committed citizens can change the world. Indeed, it is the only thing that ever has."

We are often stymied about how to get started. Please consider the National and California AAUW websites. Both do a good job of keeping critical issues in the forefront. Check out the "Two Minute Activist" <http://capwiz.com/aauw/home/> for quick and easy ways to make a difference. In addition, this monthly column will highlight important issues and provide some advice on how to make an impact.

Still in the news this summer is the failure of the House of Representatives to consider the Paycheck Fairness Act. If you haven't contacted your congressional representatives, please do. Women's salaries make a huge difference in the economic viability of families. Recent Pew research finds that 40% of mothers are the primary breadwinners.

A bit of good news is the focus on a Women's Economic Agenda launched this summer by House Minority leader Nancy Pelosi (D-CA) and a group of Democratic men and women. The focus of the agenda is on improving pay and wages, expanding paid leave and other work/life balance policies, and increasing access to and affordability of child care.

In early August, President Obama signed legislation setting a new method for calculating federal student loans. This legislation will keep the rates lower than anticipated for current students, avoiding the threatened doubling of the interest rate. However, as the economy improves, the rates will climb unless Congress acts again. This is an issue definitely worth watching.

AAUW opposes the House-passed reauthorization of the federal education law (H.R. 5). Keep an eye on this as it moves towards the Senate. The House bill would virtually eliminate funding for closing the achievement gap; allow states and districts to define their own standards, assessments and accountability measures; freeze funding for K-12; ignore the need for comprehensive bullying and harassment policies; and, fail to protect children's civil rights.

Myra Long Scholarship Fund Committee Report

Even though we were incorporated in 1999 as a 501 (c)(3), this is the first year we have been a committee of the Greater Whittier Area Branch of American Association of University Women. We have thrived with your assistance.

This has been a very advantageous and profitable year for the Myra Long Scholarship Fund Committee. All committee members will serve the next 2013-14 year of their two-year terms. In November we added the seventh committee member, Sharon Heck. The committee held four meetings on the first Thursday of: August, November, February, and May. We have had several guests attend our meetings: Brent Berry from Berry-Arnold Financial Services LLC, Bill Murray from Edward Jones Financial Advisors and Howard Kummerman from Rio Hondo College Foundation.

In addition we invited the Scholarship, Speech Trek, Tech Trek, Math/Science Directors and AAUW Branch President Susan Halliday to attend our meetings. This had a very positive outcome in distributing, earning, and investing MLSF funds.

With the new designation as a committee we opened a new bank account at the Southern California Area Credit Union. We paid the directors liability insurance for the corporation and arranged for an audit.

We reviewed our financial situation and rearranged some of our investments to receive a higher interest rate. Our conservative fiscal policy still guards over the \$140,000+ corpus. This year we were fortunate to receive several large gifts.

One \$5,000 gift is designated to be used for special projects. A young woman came to the attention of the scholarship committee who was not eligible for a college scholarship but was in great need of funds to complete her LVN training and certification. Ms. Jois Hofmann, the scholarship chair spent many hours arranging for the needs of this student, including a printer and donated computer. The scholarship committee also rewrote the guidelines for reviewing and selecting appropriate scholarship recipients from Rio Hondo College.

One of our scholarship winners joined AAUW and is going to be a dorm mom at San Diego Tech Trek. As always we are enthused about Tech Trek and want to continue our support. The Tech Trek committee was so impressed with the quality of the applicants that they dug into their own pockets and funded one applicant. We raised funds for one campership by being docents for 128 hours at the Philharmonic Design House. Instead of sending seven girls as planned we sent nine girls to Tech Trek.

A special thank you to each and every member who contributed money, time and positive support to the GREATER WHITTIER AREA BRANCH OF AMERICAN ASSOCIATION OF UNIVERSITY WOMEN and for making it a viable community organization.

Thank you, Branch members, for sending me to a superb AAUW National Convention in New Orleans, Sunday, June 9 to Wednesday, June 12, 2013. I will be writing a brief report of the event in each of the newsletters this year. I hope you will be able to discern a bit of my experience.

We stayed at the Sheraton Hotel in the heart of the city and I was placed on the 25th floor -- "So I would have a good view of the Mississippi River." Wooden shutters covered my floor to ceiling window, and my stomach flipped when I looked down. It took all the nerve I could muster to take a picture out that window, and the shutters stayed closed for the duration.

We were greeted by President Carolyn Garfein at our first evening dinner. She welcomed 770 women warmly to our biennial gathering. I met women from all over the country, but I saw many women I knew, in that 110 of the 770 attendees were from California.

We were entertained by an all-woman jazz band named The Evening Stars. It was wonderful New Orleans jazz, which had some of the women on their feet in conga-type lines. State presidents had been given parasols and they were on display throughout the evening.

Following the dinner, several of us hosted a display of posters showing Math/Science events for girls. I brought a large poster created by my daughter, Cherie Trapani, and I told onlookers about our Annual Math/Science Conference for 8th Grade girls. I was proud to share this important Branch project with many people.
