

Nowhere in the nation is the problem greater than in Los Angeles County, where 26,000 children who have been abused or neglected are under the jurisdiction of the Dependence Court. AAUW NATIONAL CONVENTION REPORT

(Second in a Series)

I attended two workshops on Monday of the convention. One workshop presented many ideas on fundraising, which I will pass on to our Finance Committee. The other workshop was titled Connecting Our Generations: Idealism, Passion and Wisdom. This workshop focused on the opportunities and challenges of different generations working together in AAUW. Both workshops were enlightening.

At the lunch meeting we heard about a program called Tech Savvy, which is very similar to our Math/Science Conference for 8th Grade Girls. It is a program started in one locale that will be duplicated around the country using a \$105,000 grant from Praxair.

At that lunch I sat next to a young women from Ohio. Her nametag was labeled SPEAKER, so I asked about it. She is one of the 17 plaintiffs suing the government because they were sexually assaulted in the military. AAUW is supporting their lawsuit. Later that day I saw a showing of the movie "The Invisible War." The movie is a very well done documentary about the sexual assaults. In the film several of the plaintiffs tell their stories and the terrible ways the assaults have affected their lives. The young woman I lunched with told her tearful story following the movie. I'm hoping we can present the film to high school girls who are considering the military as a career. Everyone should see this movie.

PUBLIC POLICY

Sometimes, when we think of all of the things that are wrong in this world, all of the things that need fixing, we get overwhelmed. Our inclination is to stop paying attention. If we can't fix everything we won't try to fix anything. It's natural to feel that way – and it's self-defeating, and ultimately, a guarantee that nothing gets better. That isn't what AAUW is about. We are women who get things done, who make positive changes in our world.

This month, I would like to highlight the issue of human trafficking. Human trafficking takes two hideously ugly forms: sex trafficking, for which there is a fair amount of media coverage and trafficking for forced labor, which doesn't get as much attention, but is the larger problem in terms of numbers.

At our October meeting, Lynne Gabriel from CASA Los Angeles (Court Appointed Special Advocates) will discuss the issues surrounding foster care. One of the serious risks to young girls in the dependency court system is getting caught up in sex trafficking. We will focus on that issue next month, after we hear from Lynne.

Forced labor ties with the illegal arms trade, right behind illegal drug activity, for the #2 spot on the "hit parade" of American criminal activity. Generally, victims in foreign countries are promised well-paying jobs in the U.S. After leaving home and coming here, the victims find a wholly different reality – forced to work for little or no pay, and kept as virtual slaves.

AAUW urges support for State Senate Bill 516, which is moving through the Assembly after garnering bi-partisan support and NO opposition in the Senate. It will take the first steps towards ending modern-day slavery in California. Take two minutes and urge your Assembly member to vote for this bill. For more information, go to http://www.castla.org/state-legislation#sb516.

Want to do more? Get educated on the topic. Often, the clothes we buy, the electronics we use, the food we eat comes to us with the stain of force labor attached, but very well scrubbed away by corporate public relations. A Google search on "Human Trafficking Labor Slaves" is a good place to start. I promise you hours of eye-opening horror. Check out sites like the Polaris Project <u>http://www.polarisproject.org/resources/resources-by-topic/labor-trafficking</u> and Free2Work <u>http://www.free2work.org/</u>. Find something you normally use that you won't any longer because the company involved takes advantage of slave labor, and write to tell the company that!




