PUBLIC POLICY



First, thanks to all of you who voted (I hope that does include all). AAUW-backed Propositions 1 (water system bond) and 47 (crime reclassification) passed. Those opposed by AAUW, Propositions 45 (insurance company rates) and 46 (increase of cap on medical lawsuits) went down to defeat. Positions taken by AAUW are based on its Public Policy Program, which leads us to a second task.

AAUW's Public Policy Program (PPP) Committee would like your input on the proposed changes to PPP for 2015-2017. The policy is revised every two years and voted on at the AAUW national convention in the spring. The revised program is then used to advocate for women and girls at all levels of government. If you haven't looked at the PPP in a while, you can go over it online – just type in "AAUW Public Policy Program Brochure." You will see that there are three general divisions; education, economic self-sufficiency and civil and constitutional rights. You can find the proposed changes for 2015-2017 in the following way:

Go to "AAUW.org" - click on "Resources" - scroll down and click on "Election" - scroll down and click on "Comment on the PPP" under the picture of the Capitol - click on red-highlighted "Public Policy Program" and you will see what changes are suggested. Going back to the previous page will give you the steps needed to submit your suggestions.

The deadline for submitting your ideas is December 15, which was extended from December 5. Your input is highly valued.

Now, in the spirit of the season, I wish you all meaningful and joyous holidays.

AAUW FUNDS

In the previous two articles the Educational Opportunities Fund and Legal Advocacy Funds were described. This month will feature another part of the program - the <u>Eleanor Roosevelt Fund</u>, which supports AAUW research to provide analysis, data and accurate information about issues that are important to women and girls.

Past reports include "Why So Few? Women in Science, Technology, Engineering and Math" (STEM)-(2010) "Crossing the Line: Sexual Harassment at School" (2011), and "The Simple Truth about the Gender Pay Gap" (2013). These reports are well known in the academic world and are often the basis of print and televised news stories.

Your contribution to AAUW Funds can be designated to any of these funds or to General Support. Remember the deadline for your 2014 tax deductible contribution is December 1 (or shortly thereafter). Let's All Work to Grow GWA-AAUW!

Recruiting people can be awkward and uncomfortable, but using this resource will show you how to focus on getting to know the person and what she wants so that you can invite her to participate in a way that is meaningful to her.

Belief in the Mission: The number one reason people get involved is AAUW is passion or AAUW's mission and issues. Strong belief in the mission can motivate members to participate.

Professional Development: Many women who are in or are looking to enter the workforce are seeking opportunities that will help them in their careers.

A Desire to Give Back to the Community: Many women are looking for opportunities to make a difference in their local community in a tangible way. AAUW has great opportunities for local support.

Social Interaction: Women who are new to the community or are looking for a group of people they can connect with may be excited to learn about AAUW.

Ask, Inform, Involve, Thank, Repeat

When you are ready to talk to potential members and invite them to join follow these four easy steps.

Ask: Start by getting to know the person you are talking to. Learn about the motivations she may have to join or get involved.

Inform: Share with her what Greater Whittier Area Branch does and focus on the details that are most relevant to her passions and interests.

Involve: Now it's the time to ask her to join. Ask a clear question that requires a definitive answer and try to plug her in to opportunities related to her interests. Often people just pass out a flyer with the information on it, but don't say "Will you join us?".

Thank: No matter whether she says yes, no or maybe, always thank her. Saying thank you is a small way to show appreciation and recognition.

Repeat the Cycle: You can apply it over and over again to engage someone over time. Remember, recruiting is all about relationship building.
