

### PUBLIC POLICY

As we continue on in the holiday season, our thoughts turn to a new year filled with possibilities. In AAUW's Action arm, we see women's issues such as rape (especially on campus and in the military), abortion and equal pay continuing to take the spotlight and rightly so. But, because AAUW so wholeheartedly promotes college access for all women, I would like to address a problem many young people (both male and female) face for many years, if not for their entire lives - student loan repayment.

Just this December we read that the state university system received the greatest number of applicants in its history, the largest group being freshmen. The quandary for the universities is finding places for more students even if Gov. Brown's proposed budget increase of 1 percent is raised. Many students find it difficult to complete their studies in four years as it is. The average undergraduate student loan debt for 2011-12 was \$26,600. With California's economic climate only creeping up in its recovery, more students rely on student loans for a longer period of time and, thus, repayment often takes ten years or more. Repayment for women is a special burden since they make less over the course of their lives than their male counterparts. According to AAUW's *Graduating to a Pay Gap*, 47 percent of women were paying 8 per cent of their earnings toward their debt. 39 percent of men did.

What can we do as parents, grandparents, and even great-grandparents? Of course, if we have the resources, we can help with college expenses, which have climbed much higher than salaries over the last decades. We can help search for grants and scholarships. But, if all else fails, and students must take out a government loan, which is especially true for those who come from an economically disadvantaged background, we can contact our senators to:

- a. Encourage a bill to support fair student financing. While women working full time still continue to make less than men, even after controlling for student majors, occupation, hours worked and geographic area, their repayment is the same.
- b. Format a bill to allow students to refinance and lower their interest rates as is done for other types of loans.

As with other issues, a quick way of contacting our senators about student loan reform is through the *Two-Minute Activist* on the national AAUW website. It really does take only two minutes (or less). As we wish each other a happy, healthy and prosperous New Year, let's remember that we need to do all we can to be sure it is an equitable one, as well.

These programs include:

National Conference for College Women Student Leaders - (affectionately called NCCWSL) Attendees develop their leadership skills at an intensive three-day conference held annually in Washington, D.C. (At this year's Southern California AAUW Funds Luncheon we heard from a young woman from CSULB, Shannon Cholakian, who was an attendee and impressed us with her leadership skills. In fact she has now established an AAUW Branch on her campus at Long Beach!)

**Campus Action Projects** - AAUW awards grants to campus leaders to deliver programs guided by AAUW research to address a gender-based issue in their communities.

**Elect Her - Campus Women Win** - This program teaches leaders the skills they need to run for student government.
