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# PUBLIC POLICY

Last minute reminders of voting recommendations from AAUW:

- **Yes** on Propositions 1 and 47
- **No** on Propositions 45 and 46



(Neutral on Proposition 2; no position on Proposition 48)

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As you probably heard, on October 9 Microsoft’s CEO Satya Nadella made a sensational statement to a woman (at a women’s technological conference!) who queried him about how to ask for a raise: “ It’s really not about asking for the raise, but knowing and having faith that the system will actually give you the right raises as you go along.” I was so incredulous that for the first time in ages I yelled, “you’re kidding!” at the TV set. He wasn’t kidding. Mr. Nadella’s upbringing in India until coming to the U.S. for his master degree helps explain his stance, of course. But with all the challenges women face in gaining pay equity, I never thought karma would be added to the list. To his credit, the CEO did retract his statement (after a flurry of tweets and emails from outraged women). But it got me thinking....

One of AAUW’s main positions to emphasize for 2013-2015 is “pay equity and fairness in compensation.” In light of this, AAUW campaigned hard for the U.S. Senate to debate the Paycheck Fairness Act (S 84/H.R. 377). Unfortunately the bill was voted down (again) on September 17 by a mere 7 votes. Let’s take a look at why such a bill is so important to women:

- There is a pay gap between men and women at every education level and it is worse for working mothers and women of color (AAUW)
- If the slow pace for closing the gap continues as it has in the past, parity won’t be achieved until 2058. (Institute for Women’s Policy Research)
- 40% of households with children include a mother who is either the sole or primary earner for her family (IWPR)
- The poverty of families headed by single mothers would fall by half if the wage gap were closed (IWPR)

It’s not too late to let our California senators know that we appreciate their stance in support of the bill and also make them aware that we will not forget the importance of such legislation in the future.

Going back to Mr. Nadella’s comments, I found a wonderful website that teaches young and older women in the work force how to ask for a raise, arguably one of the most uncomfortable things a person can discuss with his/her boss. Perhaps, you have a daughter, granddaughter or mentee who might benefit from this AAUW-led webinar with practical advice on how to come prepared to ask for that raise. See [AAUW.org](http://AAUW.org), type in “Strategies for Salary Negotiation” and listen to a tremendous presentation by Kate Farrar, AAUW’s Director of Campus Leadership Programs. Take that, Mr. Nadella!

### AAUW FUNDS

Last month we began a series of articles entitled AAUW Funds- 101. That article described the **Educational Opportunities Fund** or what we know as fellowships and grants. We have had many opportunities at Branch meetings over the years to hear from some of these recipients. On October 19 some Branch members heard from numerous recipients at the Southern California AAUW Funds Luncheon in Seal Beach.

This month our article will feature the LEGAL ADVOCACY FUND, which supports the protection of the legal rights of those who are facing discrimination. Some of LAF's programs include **Legal Case Support** which protects LAF plaintiffs by supporting workplace sex discrimination cases. We also provide **Travel Grants** to support the plaintiffs and lawyers. Finally we have **Campus Outreach Projects**, which protect college students from discrimination, harassment, and assault through on-campus program grants.

When you donate to AAUW Funds you can designate the special fund to which you want your money allotted. The deadline for our Branch to receive credit for 2014 is **December 1**. You can donate on-line at [aauw.org](http://aauw.org) or you can send your check to AAUW directly. Envelopes for this purpose will be available at our November Branch meeting. 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## MATH/SCIENCE CONFERENCE FOR 8TH GRADE GIRLS

I wrote this article for those new to our Branch, and for those who might want more information.

The Greater Whittier Area Branch will have our 22nd Annual Math/Science Conference for 8th Grade Girls on Wed., January 28, 2015 at Whittier College. Whittier College is a 4-year liberal arts school located in our city. We pay \$900 rent and must use their food service. The girls are given a snack bar, fresh fruit, and water when they arrive at 9 AM. The speakers and volunteers are given lunch when the workshops end at 12:45 PM.

We start our planning in September with e-mails sent by Ellen Larsen, to our contacts in the area middle schools asking for the number of 8th grade girls and of their interest in attending the conference. We then invite a percentage (around 10%) of the girls to attend. We can handle only 340 girls because of space in the rooms. We will have 27 middle schools this year and the number of attendees from each school ranges from 8 to 19. The teachers choose their attendees.

In October, I contact the speakers. We use former speakers and new ones. I hope to complete my list of 20 speakers in Science, Technology, Engineering, or Mathematics (STEM) careers by November 15. The list of speakers will be e-mailed to the schools. Each girl chooses five speakers they would like to hear and I try to give them three of their choices. Every speaker will have a full classroom, however. We ask to have the choices returned by December 10. I must have all of them before I begin the assignments, and the earlier they send it to me, the better their chances of getting their choices. The young women and their adult monitors are given three tickets and they must attend the workshops as assigned.

Our day starts at 9:15 AM with an opening session. We do not have a large enough room for all the girls so we have 200 girls in one room and 140 in another. We have two keynote speakers and they give their five to eight minute talk in both rooms, trading places. One will be Dr. Sharon Herzberger, President of Whittier College; the other could possibly be Cathy Warner, the female Mayor of Whittier. We give a brief orientation between the two speeches. The girls then attend the three workshops. They receive a backpack containing 3 pieces of notebook paper, a pencil, a map, an evaluation form, and other information.

We have 35 volunteers from our Branch sign up to help. (Our Branch has close to 160 members.) Some are greeters, some are moderators who introduce the speakers, some help with registration and hand out packets and other jobs. Our Branch has a scholarship committee that raises money for this project, Tech Trek scholarships, and scholarships for women 25 and older that are transferring from community college to a 4-year college. Greater Whittier Branch is incorporated as a 501(c)(3).

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## MYSTERY MAVENS

*The Coffin Trail: A Lake District Mystery* by Martin Edwards

Oxford historian and TV personality Daniel Kind and his new lover, Miranda, both want to escape to a new life. On impulse they buy Tarn Cottage in Brackdale, an idyllic valley in the Lake District that Daniel knew as a boy. He is still fascinated by a place so remote that the dead had to be carried out over the peaks on pack animals along the ancient Coffin Trail. Though the couple hope to live the dream of downsizing, the past has a way of catching up.

Tarn Cottage was once home to Barrie Gilpin, an autistic youth suspected of a savage murder—what looks like the ritualistic killing of a young woman visitor to the valley. She was found laid out on the Sacrifice Stone, an ancient pagan site up on the plateau. Barrie fell to his death near the crime scene before he could be questioned. All these years later, Daniel retains his belief in Barrie's innocence and questions his own policeman father's handling of the case. When DCI Hannah Scarlett and her squad launch a cold case review, Brackdale's skeletons begin to rattle....

The wild geography of the Lakes District plays against local literary references, all backdrop to the lives of villagers and outsiders drawn to this beautiful spot...but for what reasons? *The Coffin Trail* launches a new series by a master British hand.

3. According to Greek mythology, the prominent Thanksgiving symbol of a cornucopia is an enchanted **severed goat's horn** that will produce a never-ending supply of whatever its owner desires.
4. In 1817, **New York** officially adopted a yearly Thanksgiving Day and other states followed suit.
