Dr. Kidogo Kennedy

Dr. Kidogo Kennedy, is an adjunct professor at USC Rossier School of Education. Some of her courses include educational theory, varied aspects of communication: and contextualizing the social foundations of education, gender, race, class and communication studies.

Dr. Kennedy will speak about the importance of two historical African-American women in contemporary times - Sojourner Truth, an abolitionist and women's right activist in the late 1800's, and Henrietta Lacks, whose cancerous cells were taken without her permission and have been used for noteworthy medical research, such as the polio vaccine and 1st human clone cell.

PUBLIC POLICY

"Equal Pay Day is a day that should be observed in all our branches – it is our most important public policy priority." (AAUW) I had never realized it was THE ONE of paramount importance among so many consequential AAUW stances. Readings from the Department of Labor Statistics explain why: Although women make up nearly half of the American workforce, they are paid 84% of what men are paid for comparable work, even taking into consideration career choice, hours worked and familial status. (This is an average, which includes women of color who make far, far less and women college graduates who generally make a bit more). This year Equal Pay Day is April 14, a day that signifies the extra time it takes for women to work in order to equal the pay white men made in 2014. The most recent law passed in promoting pay equality was 2009's Fair Pay Act. Poll after poll shows that Americans wholeheartedly support fairness in pay. Yet, conclusions from an AAUW study show that the gender pay has changed little in the past decade. At this rate, the gap will not disappear for another 124 years.

Is there anything we can do to speed up the process? Yes, we can write our congress people to encourage them to support the Paycheck Fairness Act introduced on January 28, 2015. This Act would (1) create stronger incentives for employers to pay workers fairly (2) empower women to negotiate for equal pay and (3) prohibit retaliation against employees who share their salary information.

A Rare Court Case in the Silicon Valley: An interesting trial is taking place in San Francisco. Ellen Pao is suing the Silicon Valley venture capital company she worked for as vice-president. Her claim: sexual discrimination. She charges that she was let go because she refused to go along with the old boys club. Other similar cases have been settled out of court. Since only 11% of executives in the Silicon Valley are women and even less (7%) in the venture capital area, it will be interesting to see how this plays out.

TECH TREK

In March the Tech Trek committee interviewed 13 girls from Los Nietos and Granada Middle Schools. Six selected campers and a guest will be invited to attend the May AAUW luncheon.

Our commitment to these girls and the Whittier Camp goes beyond providing a scholarship to attend camp. A strong AAUW presence is needed to provide a quality experience for the girls that is comparable to other sites in California. Specific staff positions are required to be filled by AAUW members. Members from all branches sending girls to the Whittier Camp may be needed to fill positions such as dorm moms. The Tech Trek co-coordinators are preparing a list of ways we could support and facilitate camp activities that we will present to the current director, Nilsa Arias. The list will include helping at registration, facilitating a parent orientation on check-in day, sponsoring a visitation day, serving as greeters for the professional panel, Build It Festival and Women in History events. Members may be asked to provide resources for the core classes or be presenters for mini workshops. The director of the camp may have additional requests that will allow us to play a more supportive role. We encourage our Branch members to join the Tech Trek committee in these activities.
