PUBLIC POLICY

Today's column is one of awareness and encouragement. A recent op-ed article in the LA Times, "Too Few Jobs, Too Much Poverty," spotlighted one Democratic and two Republican former California governors (Davis, Deukmejian and Wilson,) who lamented the lack of qualified workers in good-paying jobs. These include technology, manufacturing and health care. (Note that the first two are areas not traditionally filled by women.) In LA County two thirds of the projected job openings in the next five years will require a high school diploma or less. The fastest growing categories are waitresses, cashiers and retail salespeople. These jobs have an average annual income of \$20,000 and are mostly filled by women.

How can we, as educated women, change these career trajectories? You've already taken a giant step by joining AAUW, which has been "empowering women since 1881." AAUW research has shown that a number of girls have pretty much made up their minds by 7th grade that math and science are not female areas of study. This is why our Tech Trek program is so important in teaching girls entering eighth grade about the exciting and accessible science and technology fields available to them. They may say that their favorite part is staying in a dorm, but we have often heard from Tech Trek graduates who were inspired by the camp to explore non-traditional careers. In fact, one spoke at an AAUW luncheon last year. Our recently completed Math/Science day at Whittier College is another spectacular example of encouraging girls to be aware of careers usually filled by men. Time and again these girls evaluate the "day" as inspiring. On a more personal level, you and I can help stop the gender bias that sometimes stymies girls' interest in the math and science fields. Hold boys accountable for making fun of girls who are "dumb at math." Buy that little granddaughter a Lego set. Encourage that big granddaughter to take calculus, physics and computer science in high school. Encourage teacher training to recognize and eliminate gender bias and stereotypes in the classroom, beginning at the elementary level.

I realize that no change comes easily in a society, but we are duty-bound to help young women expand their educational and career possibilities. We will all benefit. Our sponsorships of scholarships for older women in college, of tech trek camperships and of Math/Science Day events are testimony to the fact that we are, indeed, helping to make that change.
