PUBLIC POLICY



An interesting deadline to watch is July 1, 2015. That is when California colleges must have policies in place regarding the reporting of sexual assaults on their campuses. In recent years the public has become aware that rapes, especially, have gone underreported. The Department of Justice maintains that women in college are four times more likely to be assaulted than the rest of the population. In addition, 95% of campus rapes are never reported and of those that are, the numbers are too often swept under the carpet. The media has raged at this carpet-lifting behavior for the past few years. As a result, public awareness of the problem has grown and lawsuits such as those involving Occidental and Cal Berkeley have been filed, citing, among other reasons, failure to comply with Title IX. Following Title IX's stipulations is a major area of emphasis for AAUW, which explains that "although Title IX is often known only for its role in women's sports, the law also requires that schools eliminate sexual harassment and prevent its occurrence on campus." If schools don't comply with Title IX, students can file a complaint. Unfortunately, too often college women do not know of this right. Too many do not report their rapes. The public wants to know how safe college campuses are and what is being done to enhance security.

Several bills have been introduced in the California Legislature addressing the transparency issue and the treatment of rape victims. One is AB1433 which initially required that assaults reported to campus authorities also be reported to the local police. In an unusual move, the measure's sponsor, Mike Gatto, listened to assault victims and amended his bill. These women wanted the police report made *only when the victim agreed* to it. "Going through the justice system is a harrowing experience," one woman reported. A study showed that describing the assault numerous times to numerous agencies, testifying at trial and feelings of not being believed often left women feeling emotionally worse than those who never reported the crime. Clearly, more support in traversing the justice system is needed, as well as women being informed of their rights. There is obviously more to the topic of campus assault than expands beyond capturing accurate data as it relates to the number or instances.

In addition to watching for developments on July 1, we can actually do something proactively. Before summer completely lulls us into days of lassitude and inertia, let us rise up and go to our computers, click on the AAUW website and go to the "Two Minute Activist." We can keep ourselves informed by investing a very small amount of time. As of this writing, the areas AAUW was emphasizing on the activist site were:

- Paycheck Fairness Act (ask congressional members to co-sponsor)
- Education (AAUW believes this to be a priority of this congress)
- Healthy Families Act (7 paid days of sick leave)

Have a wonderful summer, be active and don't forget to use sunscreen.

The *Wives of Los Alamos* is a novel that sheds light onto one of the strangest and most monumental research projects in modern history and a testament to a remarkable group of women who carved out a life for themselves, in spite of the chaos of the war and the shroud of intense secrecy.

Their average age was twenty-five. They came from Berkeley, Cambridge, Paris, London, and Chicago – and arrived in New Mexico ready for adventure, or at least resigned to it. But hope quickly turned to hardship as they were forced to adapt to a rugged military town where everything was a secret, including what their husbands were doing at the lab.

“Sustainability Challenges: Coping with Less Water and Energy”

June 5, 2015 • Whittier, CA

“Sustainability Challenges: Coping with Less Water and Energy,” a conference focused on linking scientifically credible information to the formulation and implementation of sound, effective local policies, is being convened by the Institute on Science for Global Policy (ISGP) on June 5, 2015, from 7:30 AM to 6:15 PM in Whittier, CA. A local committee of concerned volunteers, The Whittier Working Group, has undertaken to organize the conference to engage the community in climate issues.

The distinctive, if not unique, ISGP model emphasizes critical debates and extended caucus discussions among highly credible scientists, policy makers, students, and the public. These debates seek to clarify the scientific and technical (S&T) understanding for the nonspecialists who are often responsible for making or directly influencing, local, regional, national, and global policy decisions. ISGP conferences also provide opportunities for scientists to experience the challenging tasks routinely faced by those responsible for formulating and implementing effective policies that involve S&T issues. The debate/caucus model pioneered by the ISGP has been successfully used to examine a wide range of contemporaneously critical issues, including Emerging and Persistent Infectious Diseases, and Food Safety, Security, and Defense.

The critical debates and caucuses at “Sustainability Challenges” are open to the public and press. This conference is designed to provide a forum in which the scientific and technological issues facing societies worldwide can be viewed through the personal lifestyle choices and community-wide decisions facing Whittier and Southern California.
