PUBLIC POLICY

It's time to celebrate women! But, isn't it always? Coming off another successful Math/Science Conference and looking ahead to awarding Myra Long Scholarships, bestowing the Las Distinguidas Award, and sponsoring the summer Tech Trek Program, we can certainly appreciate AAUW's encouragement of local women.

Yet, it is also an appropriate time to celebrate the work women are doing worlds away. Too often we hear of the despairing negatives: Malala Yousafzai shot for standing up for the education of women, young humanitarian aid-worker Kayla Mueller murdered by ISIS, three hundred African schoolgirls abducted by Boco Haram. Despite these horrors, women are making strides in developing countries. It's just that we hear so little about it.

Sunday, March 8 is the perfect opportunity to celebrate women's accomplishments on a world scale. It is International Women's Day. This event began in 1910 as part of the women's suffrage movement. While it has never gotten the attention here in the United States (most probably because many early supporters were socialists), it is celebrated roundly in other parts of the world.

Locally, we have the opportunity to hear about women's progress in modern-day India from Reshmi Dutta at the LACIC (Los Angeles County Interbranch Council) meeting at PIH Health (Presbyterian Intercommunity Hospital), Sunday, March 8, from 2 - 4 PM. Ms. Dutta was raised in Kolkata (formerly Calcutta), India and schooled there until age 18 when she came to the United States for a college education. After earning her degree in economics and computer science, Ms. Dutta became an IT professional and is now a senior projects manager at Direct TV. Ms. Dutta will speak on the progress of women in Kolkata where the head of state is a woman. Kolkata, the capital of North Bengal, has a population of nearly 14 million (including suburbs) and is a cultural, educational and commercial center. It should prove to be an enlightening and inspiring discussion about local women in leadership roles in an area we know so little about.

I hope you will take time to celebrate women's achievements, especially on Sunday, March 8 at PIH where we can hear, first hand, about women making a difference 8,000 miles away.

MATH/SCIENCE CONFERENCE FOR 8TH GRADE GIRLS

Wednesday, January 28, 2015 was a beautiful day in so many ways. The weather at Whittier College was extremely cooperative with no rain, sunny skies, and moderate temperatures. In addition, 340 young women and their advisors heard about six careers related to Science, Technology, Engineering, or Mathematics (STEM) from six wonderful career women. We had twenty career women in all and each gave their presentation three times. We are so thankful for these wonderful women who volunteer their time to try to convince bright young women to stick with STEM studies in their high school classes, and to consider attending college to study for a STEM career.

We had about 40 of our members volunteer as moderators to introduce the career women, as greeters to meet the buses, as registration workers, as a nurse, as packet stuffers and as workers in so many ways. Thank you to everyone who helped, and special thanks to Dolores Seidman who gathered our volunteers. We are also thankful to Mayor Cathy Warner and to Whittier College Vice President Charlotte Borst who served as keynote speakers at our opening sessions.

This was our 22nd Annual Conference and I truly hope we will continue this wonderful tradition next year. Please join us on Monday, March 23, at 10 AM, to discuss Night in Shanghai, by Nicole Mones. Many of you may have heard her speak at the annual "Meet the Authors and Bookfair" at the Shannon Center. Set in pre-World War II in Shanghai, the novel is centered around two young people, African-American musician, Thomas Greene, escaping the Jim Crow laws in the U.S. to lead a jazz orchestra of fellow African-American expats, and Song Yuhua, a refined and educated woman who has been bonded since age eighteen to Shanghai's most powerful crime boss in payment for her father's gambling debts. Outwardly submissive, she burns with rage and risks her life spying on her master. Based on true episodes and peppered with the lives and experiences of actual characters from the worlds of politics, music, the military and the government, Mones' engrossing historical novel illuminates the danger, depravity, and drama of this dark period with brave authenticity. It is late summer in the year 1270 and England is as weary as its aging king, Henry III. Although the Simon de Montfort rebellion is over, the smell of death still hangs like smoke over the land. Even in the small priory of Tyndal on the remote East Anglian coast, the monk and nuns of the Order of Fontevraud long for a return to tranquil routine. Their hopes are dashed, however, when the young and inexperienced Eleanor of Wynethorpe is appointed their new prioress over someone of their own choosing. Nor are Eleanor's own prayers for a peaceful transition answered. Only a day after her arrival, a brutally murdered monk is found in the cloister gardens, and Brother Thomas, a young priest with a troubled past, arrives to bring her a more personal grief. Now she must not only struggle to gain the respect of her terrified and resentful flock but also cope with violence, lust and greed in a place dedicated to love and peace.
