Legal Advocacy: We challenge sex discrimination in higher education and the workplace.


**Educational Funding:** We provide educational and lifelong learning opportunities for women.

The shrine to my personal heroes began in my teens when I heard Eleanor Roosevelt speak on my college campus, and I began studying her accomplishments focused on helping the poor, fighting racial discrimination and supporting women's and children's issues. Years later, I started following the career of U.S. Representative Barbara Jordan who so eloquently represented her Texas district in Congress. I was mesmerized with Ms. Jordan calm, articulate participation during the Nixon impeachment hearings where she stated, "My faith in the Constitution is whole, it is complete, it is total. I am not going to sit here and be an idle spectator to the diminution, the subversion, the destruction of the Constitution." Over the years, my heroes corner has grown to include other outstanding women and girls like Maya Angelou, Margaret Thatcher, and Malala Yousafzai.

This leads to my new heroes corner. Many recent events led me to acknowledge that I am surrounded by heroes right here in SoCal! So, I want to honor my new hero—*Rozanne Child*. Rozanne is our GWA AAUW Program Chair and has arranged for outstanding presentations at our branch meetings. Among her many other major contributions to AAUW, Rozanne has served as the Director of the San Diego Tech Trek Camp for several years and has guided the camp's growth to one of the most outstanding in the state. Rozanne has advised us on many issues as we strive to improve the Whittier Camp. The week after she completed this summer's San Diego Camp, Rozanne fell and broke her knee cap. I expected her to endure weeks, if not months, of recovery and therapy. To my surprise, Rozanne called me a few days after her accident to follow up on the program planning for 2015-16. And she wasn't even on meds! The bottom line is that Rozanne is not only smart, industrious, generous, hardworking and dedicated, she is one tough cookie! She is my hero!

# **AAUW FUNDS-Questions and Answers**

AAUW Funds is the national level of philanthropy for our organization. It supports Educational Opportunities (fellowships and grants), The Legal Advocacy Fund, the Public Policy Fund and the Eleanor Roosevelt Fund. This is in addition to the specific local support that our branch gives through the Myra Long Scholarship Fund to Tech Trek, the Math/Science Conference, and local scholarships.

During the last AAUW year from September, 2014 to June, 2015 there was a newsletter article each month describing various aspects of AAUW Funds. Rather than repeat this information per se, this year there will be a slightly different approach. There is so much to know about AAUW both nationally, state wide and within our branch, that it is difficult for members, especially newer ones, to be familiar with all aspects. First, you can refer to the following resources on-line:

AAUW.org- (National), AAUW-CA.org- (State), or Whitier-ca.aauw.net- for our branch website. (Archives of the newsletters from last year are available which contain the monthly articles describing AAUW Funds.)

Another way to find out answers to your questions about AAUW Funds, is by sending an e-mail to Dolores Seidman who is the branch director in charge of AAUW Funds this year. This article will attempt to answer one of the first questions I received.

Q: "Does the Branch itself donate to AAUW Funds or is the money given by the members?"

A: Included in our present dues structure \$2.00 per member is designated for AAUW Funds. This amount was established many years ago. Therefore last year \$290 was sent by our branch for this purpose. Since this is such a small amount, emphasis has been placed in recent years on appealing to members to make individual contributions that are tax deductible. (In previous years, Whittier Branch held fund raising events specifically for AAUW Funds .) In 2014 Whittier Branch Members and friends donated \$4,692. (AAUW Funds operates on a calendar year basis.) There have been on-going informal discussions about ways in which to increase these funds. Do members have any suggestions?

I have received other pertinent questions I will address in coming months. Please keep your questions coming!
