
LOS ANGELES COUNTY INTERBRANCH COUNCIL (LACIC)

More Work Needed to Pass Pay Equity and Fairness Compensation Legislation

A top priority for National and CA AAUW is for all women to achieve economic self-sufficiency through pay equity and fairness in compensation. Recently the Governor vetoed two of CA AAUW priority bills on equal



A third equal pay bill was signed by the Governor and chaptered. SB 358 prohibits wage discrimination based on gender. The National Organization of Women (NOW) is leading an effort to expand SB 358 and add to the classes covered by its protection. AAUW is considering joining with NOW in this effort.

AAUW FUND- Q& A



The article in the October issue of our newsletter explained that in our present dues structure \$2.00 per member is designated for AAUW Fund. This amount was established nearly 50 years ago. In addition members have been encouraged to make tax-deductible donations individually.

At this time I am happy to report that the AAUW Board has passed a motion unanimously that will allocate 30 percent of the boutique profit of \$3,790 this year rounded up to \$1200 to be added to the \$300 we would send AAUW Fund as our normal \$2 per member contribution, making the GWA-AAUW Branch contribution to AAUW Fund for 2015 a total of \$1,500 in addition to individual donations. A full report on our total donations will be made early in 2016 as the AAUW Fund report is based on the calendar year, ending December 31.

Thanks to those who made individual donations—an Honor Roll will be published in a future newsletter article. And, special thanks to those who worked so hard at organizing the boutique as well as those who supported it.

MYSTERY MAVENS

Raven Black: Book One of the Shetland Island Quartet by Ann Cleeves

Set in the remote Scottish Shetland Islands, Cleeves's taut, atmospheric thriller, the first in a new series, will keep readers guessing until the last page. Det. Insp. Jimmy Perez investigates the murder of teenage Catherine Ross, found strangled on a snowy hillside shortly after New Year's. While the police and citizens alike are quick to lay the blame on local eccentric Magnus Tait, who was not only the last person to see Catherine alive but also the prime suspect in the disappearance eight years earlier of another girl, Perez has his doubts. He's soon drawn into an intricate web of lies as he unearths the long-buried secrets of everyone from a roguish playboy to Catherine's only school friend.

Cleeves masterfully paints Perez as an empathetic hero and sprinkles the story with a lively cast of supporting characters who help bring the Shetlands alive. When the shocking identity of the murderer is revealed, readers will be as chilled as the harsh winds that batter the isolated islands.

Gardens of Water is an enthralling story of two families, and two faiths in Turkey at the time of the cataclysm of 1999. It tells of Sinan, whose daughter, Irem, dreams of escaping the confines of her family and the duties of a devout Muslim woman. She sees in Dylan, an American boy, the enticing promise of another life. But then a massive earthquake forces Sinan and his family to live as refugees in their own country and leads to a dangerous intimacy with their American neighbors, as Irem and Dylan fall in love. When Sinan finds himself entangled in a series of increasingly dangerous decisions, he will be pushed toward a final betrayal that will change everyone's lives forever. Powerful and beautifully written, Alan Drew's Gardens of Water marks the debut of a brilliant new American writer.
