Nina Revoyr, author of <u>Southland</u> and <u>Wingshooters</u>, will be our guest speaker on Saturday, March 5th. She was born in Japan to a Japanese mother and a Caucasian American father and grew up in Tokyo, Wisconsin, and Los Angeles. Her second novel, <u>Southland</u> was a Los Angeles Times bestseller and "Best Book of 2003", a Book Sense 76 pick, an Edgar Award finalist, and the winner of the Ferro Grumley Award and the Lambda Literary Award. Nina's fourth novel <u>Wingshooters</u> was published in 2011. It was a Booklist Editors Choice for 2011 and O: Oprah Magazine's "Book to Watch For," and has won an Indie Booksellers Choice and the Midwest Booksellers Choice Award

Nina is executive vice president and chief operating officer of a large nonprofit organization that serves children affected by violence and poverty in Central and South Los Angeles. She has also been an Associate Faculty member at Antioch University and a Visiting Professor at Cornell University, Occidental College, and Pitzer College.

As you can see this is going to be an outstanding meeting, one you don't want to miss. Nina will have books for sale and will gladly autograph them.

Membership Reflections

We had a great turnout at our January Meet & Greet meeting. Forty-four people attended, including ten new women, one of whom had been a member in the past. An extra thank you to all of our members who attended and brought a dish to share.

Membership would like to reflect on our numbers for the past year. Last year at this time 1/15/15 we had 133 members + 28 Life Members = 161. This year as of 1/23/16 we have 123 Members + 25 Life Members = 148. We lost 12: 2 died; 1 developed Alzheimer's; 1 moved out of state (Hawaii); 1 man did not rejoin; 3 college students did not rejoin; and, a few others never responded to numerous phone call and emails. Sooooo....if the 10 women who were at the Meet & Greet join, we'll be closer to last year's numbers. Remember it takes all of us to recruit new members. Please invite new guests to our monthly luncheons and to our various enrichment groups. Who knows? It might be time to start a new outreach group for young professional women or stay-at-home moms.

PUBLIC POLICY

Jump in and Become an AAUW Advocate

Greater Whittier Area AAUW February newsletter outlined AAUW-CA its public policy priorities. After publication, the AAUW-CA announced that public policy committee will meet March 19 to determine and prioritize the Bills and Resolutions that need AAUW support. Legislative updates related to AAUW-CA policy will be included in the April newsletter.



Meanwhile, in 2015 AAUW-CA sponsored or co-sponsored three Equal Pay bills; one was passed and signed into Law by Governor Brown. SB 358 sponsored by Senator Hannah-Beth Jackson (D Santa Barbara) and co-sponsored by AAUW-CA and the Chamber of Commerce, clarifies employer defenses to pay discrimination claims and prohibits employers from discriminating or retaliating against employees who are involved in proceedings to enforce these protections. Many AAUW families attended the governor's signing.

The other two bills that would strengthen California Equal Pay Law, but were vetoed by the governor, are AB 1017 and AB 1354. The first would prohibit employers from asking about a potential hire's prior salary and the second requires contractors working in the state to comply with a pay nondiscrimination program. Both will be reintroduced this year, most likely with a number change.


