#### HOW TO MAKE YOUR AAUW ELEVATOR PITCH WITH POWER!

An elevator pitch is a brief, persuasive speech that you use to spark interest in what your organization does. Elevator pitches should be interesting, memorable, and succinct. They also need to explain the **why** and the **what** that make your organization unique. Here's our simple guide to writing your own speech. Once you're done, you'll have a personalized tool to use next time you're talking to a potential member!

1. Write down four things about AAUW that you would like to share. What makes AAUW memorable to you? What projects or issues is AAUW championing that are important to you?
2. <b>Pick the three most important points you wrote down.</b> Why are they the most important points? Condense your answer to this question into two or three sentences.
3. Add your full name and where you're from before these two or three sentences to serve as your introduction and opening remarks.
4. Make sure to also make an "ask" at the end. Every elevator pitch should conclude with a question that needs a definitive answer, whether it's "Would you like to be a part of our organization?" or "Will you attend our event on Saturday?" or "Can we add you to our newsletter list?"
5. Here's your chance to pitch with power! Write out your AAUW elevator pitch below.

6. **Now try your elevator speech with a fellow member.** Each of you should share what reallly inspires you and what could be better. Keep practicing until you are comfortable inviting someone to be a member of the AAUW community.

## **PUBLIC POLICY**



In April, AAUW along with 16 other major organizations sponsored a nation-wide telephone conference with Senator Elizabeth Warren on the state of the US Supreme Court vacancy. Over 4,000 participated in the call. The next day the Capitol Switchboard was overloaded with attendees asking to be connected to their senator's office to explain why the Senate should act to insure the Supreme Court has all nine judges. Senator Warren said the country deserves a national conversation to consider Judge Merrick Garland's qualifications and the Senate needs to begin the constitutional process to fill the seat. She pointed out that if the Senate does not perform its constitutional duties, the Supreme Court would not have a full complement of justices for the bulk of two court terms - well over a year - with potentially dangerous consequences. You can go on-line or call the Capitol Switchboard at (202) 224-3121 and ask your senators to rise above the partisan fray and fairly and expeditiously consider the president's nominee.

At the last LACIC meeting, Nancy Mahr promised to send an AAUW CA Action Alerts article to branch newsletters. And here it is:

#### TAKE ACTION - JOIN AAUW'S ACTION NETWORK

One easy way for AAUW members to take action is to respond to the state Action Alerts and national Two- Minute Activist messages. Each call for action includes background information on the issue and language for you to use in sending your message. You can use only the language provided, or you can add text of your own. Then just click on a button and you have taken action.

It's easy to become part of AAUW's Action Network. Just go to the national website (<a href="www.aauw.org">www.aauw.org</a>) and click on What We Do. Then select Public Policy from the sidebar menu on the left. And select Two-Minute Activist from the sidebar on that page. You will see an invitation to subscribe. Put in your email and click on Sign Up. When you sign up, give your address or zip code and you will automatically be subscribed to the AAUW California Action Alerts and well as to the national Action Network.

With AAUW's strong membership, we have the power to generate hundreds of messages in California and thousands nationwide. Sign up and make use of this effective action tool. It really does only take two minutes!

In a recent article, Kathleen Doty wrote that equity is still an issue but we make strides toward equity every day because we belong to a community that breaks through educational barriers so that all women and girls have a fair chance. The California passage of SB 358 is the strongest Equal Pay legislation in the nation and AAUW was right there on the Capitol doorstep helping to make this happen. Become part of this powerful advocacy group that can make positive change for women and girls.

#### TECH TREK REPORT

Tech Trek is a science and math camp designed to develop interest, excitement and self-confidence in young girls who will enter eighth grade in the fall. It features hands-on activities in science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) and related subjects. This summer our Branch will be sending ten girls to Whittier College for one week from June 26 through July 2. Six members from the Greater Whittier Area Branch (Ann Chambers, Rozanne Child, Patricia Cuocco, Pat Dudley, Linda Gatons, and Maura Greely) interviewed 19 girls who had been nominated by a math or science teacher from their school and had submitted an essay on their choice of a STEM career.

The Myra Long Scholarship Fund (MLSF) provides the funds to send girls to Tech Trek. Money is raised from a variety of activities such as the Pasadena Showcase House docent shifts; grants; outreach; investments; and the generosity of GWA-AAUW members. Our ten campers have been invited to attend the May luncheon with a guest. Campers from East Whittier School District (*East Whittier Middle School in Whittier*): Isabella Bracamonte, Karissa Cisneros, Isabel Garcia, Natalia Interiano, and Jacqueline Salguero. Campers from Los Nietos School District (*Los Nietos Middle School*): Mariana Fuentes, Jessica Hernandez, Wendy Mendoza, Berenice Poblano, and Kayla Waugh-Vasquez. As each girl is introduced your will learn of her career choice and something about here interests, activities and accomplishments.

The Sweetness at the Bottom of the Pie: A Flavia de Luce novel by Alan Bradley

It is the summer of 1950—and at the once-grand mansion of Buckshaw, young Flavia de Luce, an aspiring chemist with a passion for poison, is intrigued by a series of inexplicable events: A dead bird is found on the doorstep, a postage stamp bizarrely pinned to its beak. Then, hours later, Flavia finds a man lying in the cucumber patch and watches him as he takes his dying breath. For Flavia, who is both appalled and delighted, life begins in earnest when murder comes to Buckshaw.
