GWA-AAUW SUPPORTS LOCAL LIBRARIES

Did you know that when a member in good standing passes away, GWA makes a \$50 donation in her name to her local public library? The funds are used to purchase books in a subject area of special interest to our member.

In Whittier, our donations go through the Hodge Foundation of the Whittier Public Library. Marian Hodge was a past president of the Greater Whittier Area branch (1935-36), Superintendent of the Whittier Union High School District, avid reader and Friend of the Library. Upon her passing in 1996, she bequeathed \$200,000 to the Foundation named for her.

The terms of the endowment provide for the Board to reflect various segments of the community. GWA-AAUW has a permanent seat on the Board. Our current representative is Dr. Lorayne Horka.

In 2016, donations honoring deceased members Beth Greulich, Ruth Miller, Phyllis Thompson and Lucille Howe were made to Hodge. A donation honoring Charlotte Eiser was made to the Montebello Public Library.

Voter Guides

The AAUW Action Fund voter guides provide nonpartisan information about candidates' positions on issues like equal pay, education, campaign finance, and reproductive rights. Candidates' positions on the issues are determined using their voting records, public statements, and campaign position papers, as well as information posted by trusted sources on the Internet. All campaigns are contacted via e-mail in advance of publication.

AAUW Action Fund voter guides are provided as a public service and are not intended to be an endorsement of any candidate or political party. No AAUW policy position is implied by the descriptions of these issues.

AAUW has not provided Voter Guides for any of the California election candidates, but has done so for President and Vice-President. Google "AAUW Action Fund Voter Guides" to access the information online.

DON'T BE CONFUSED

KNOW THE RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN THE BRANCH AND THE MLSFC AND WHERE AAUW FUND FITS IN

You hear these terms all of the time – GWA; the Branch; GWA-AAUW, Myra Long; MLSF; and AAUW Fund. Are you confused? How does it all fit together? Let's do the easy stuff first; GWA-AAUW and the Branch are one and the same. We used to be known as the Whittier Branch, but with the closing of some local branches and the absorption of their members, we became *Greater Whittier Area Branch* or GWA-AAUW.



Here's where it gets complicated:

- AAUW national had, and still has, a fund raising arm called the Education Fund, which provided fellowships and grants. That is now renamed AAUW Fund which does the grant, fellowship, research and advocacy for the national organization. GWA members have always supported AAUW Fund and continue to do so. That work is central to our national missions and goals.
- Prior to 1999, members expressed a desire to raise funds for investment and use the interest to fund **local projects:** Tech Trek, Math/Science Day and Local Scholarships. (Note: interest rates at that time were high enough to make the goal feasible.) The funds raised were placed in the Myra Long Scholarship Fund (MLSF).
- In 1999, the MLSF received an IRS designation as a 501(c) 3, but it did not incorporate.
- The MLSF Directors invested and managed the funds. Over time, interest rates dropped, making prudent investments and further yearly fund raising (e.g., our GWA-AAUW non-event fund raiser) a necessity.
- In 2012, the MLSF incorporated in the State of California as a 501(c) 3 organization and absorbed the Greater Whittier Area Branch within it. The corporate name was changed to GWA-AAUW and the Myra Long Scholarship Fund became the Myra Long Scholarship Fund Committee. In accordance with the Articles of Incorporation, it is the responsibility of the elected directors of the MLSC all of whom are directors of the GWA-AAUW Board to manage the investment funds, separate from the funds used to manage the branch, and to keep the entire Board fully apprised of the MLSC financial status.

If you have any questions about the relationships, overlaps or simply who does what, do not hesitate to ask GWA-AAUW President Dolores Gonzalez-Hayes or Myra Long Scholarship Fund Chairwoman, Patricia Cuocco. Either will get you the answers.

RULES FOR SUBMITTING NEWSLETTER ARTICLES

Your newsletter articles are very welcome and important for keeping our members up to date on GWA-AAUW activities. As you can probably guess, the creation of a newsletter is time-consuming and detail oriented. The manner in which articles are submitted can help or hinder the process enormously, so I am asking for your help.

For the future, PLEASE adhere STRICTLY to the following:

- 1. Articles are due by the close of business, <u>5 PM</u>, on the 15th of every month, August through May. A few late articles can delay putting the whole thing together and can mean our members don't get timely information.
- 2. All articles MUST be in a Word Document, in Times New Roman font and 12 point type and in BLACK.
- 3. <u>**DO NOT**</u> submit article text in an email. WHY? Because all email systems (some more than others) introduce some "weirdness" (a technical term) when you cut and paste the text into WORD. For example, quotes can become numbers; random paragraphs appear; formats do not port and fonts change. So, even if your article is two sentences long, submit it as a WORD document attached to your email
- 4. When submitting an article, PLEASE title the ARTICLE WITH THE SUBJECT (e.g. Memories, AAUW Fund, etc.) and make sure to do the <u>same for the email you send</u>. Having 20 emails and 20 attachments all named "Newsletter Article" makes organization very difficult.
- 5. Forget that there is a TAB key on your keyboard. Tape over it, ignore it I do not care. Just do not use it EVER. If you need to create a column or line up numbers or have a list of items or whatever in your document, use the appropriate indent or column tools in Word. If you don't know how to do that, call me and I'll walk you through it. Or, just type the information in the document and put instructions about formatting in the email. Using the TAB key creates a mess you cannot even believe unless you have ever tried to fix it.
- 6. Some conventions:
 - a. Time 5 PM not 5:00 PM. Spell out days of the week and months of the years.
 - b. Random Capitalization drives Sane people Crazy. I hold on to sanity by a VERY thin thread, so please watch what you capitalize.
 - c. Names of books and should be italicized and underlined.
 - d. If you quote, attribute. Since our articles are short, in general it is best to keep the attribution in the body of the text, rather than in a footnote.
 - e. Despite recent changes to the NY Times style sheet, sentences do not end in prepositions nor are infinitives ever split at least not in the AAUW Newsletter.
 - f. Avoid contractions whenever possible.
 - g. Do NOT indent the first word of paragraphs.

EVERYONE IS INVITED TO ENJOY THIS END OF SUMMER ISLAND GET AWAY



Activities to enjoy on Catalina Island:


