Mr. Hernandez has focused the after-school programs around STEM -- science, technology, engineering and math -- activities that align with the state's academic standards. This will be a very informative program.

#### **PUBLIC POLICY**

#### **Information from AAUW-CA- Website:**

Last session Stronger California Advocates Network of which AAUW CA is a member was instrumental in the passage of SB 358, the Fair Pay Act. However, the Governor vetoed two other bills related to Equal Pay. These two have been reintroduced this session with AAUW CA as cosponsor:

- **AB 1676 Campos**, would limit an employer from seeking salary history information about an applicant for employment, and will codify case law declaring it illegal for an employer to rely solely on one's prior salary when establishing the new rate.
- **AB 1890 Dodd**, requiring large state contractors to submit plans for fighting gender pay inequities to the state, including the Commission on the Status of Women and Girls for analysis by their new California Pay Equity Taskforce.
- A third **Pay Equity bill**, co-sponsored by AAUW CA, is **SB 1063 Hall**. Black and Latina women continue to earn considerably less than Caucasian women, and SB 1063 would prohibit wage disparities based on race or ethnicity in addition to wage disparities due to "opposite sex" covered by SB 358 (Jackson, 2015).

Additional 2016 bills on which AAUW CA has taken positions can be found at aauw-ca.org. This site is updated daily so that members can follow the progress of these bills that are important in working to achieve equity for women and girls.

You can participate in the legislative process by signing up for Action Alerts which are direct messages sent to legislators when bills are up for critical votes, or are going to the governor. Go to www.aauw.org to sign up for Action Alerts, which will enable you to receive notices to act from both national AAUW and AAUW CA.

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#### **AAUW Fund News**

AAUW has a long and distinguished history of advancing educational and professional opportunities for women in the United States and around the globe. Here is a list of the awards.

**American Fellowships:** Who may apply: Women pursuing full-time study to complete dissertations, conducting postdoctoral research full time, or preparing research for publication for eight consecutive weeks.

**Funding:** \$6,000–\$30,000

Career Development Grants: Who may apply: Women pursuing a certificate or degree to advance their careers, change careers, or reenter the workforce and whose bachelor's degree was received at least five years before the award period.

Funding: \$2,000-\$12,000

**Community Action Grants:** Who may apply: Individuals, AAUW branches and states, and nonprofit organizations to fund innovative programs or non-degree research projects that promote education and equity for women and girls.

**Funding:** One-year grant, \$2,000-\$7,000; Two-year grant, \$5,000-\$10,000

**International Fellowships:** *Who may apply:* Women pursuing full-time graduate or postdoctoral study in the United States who are not U.S. citizens or permanent residents.

Funding: \$18,000–\$30,000

**Opens:** August 1 **Deadline:** December 1

**International Project Grants:** *Who may apply:* Alumnae of AAUW's International Fellowships program who are living in their home countries and pursuing community-based projects to improve the social advancement and economic empowerment of women and girls.

Funding: \$5,000–\$7,000

**Selected Professions Fellowships:** *Who may apply:* Women pursuing full-time study in a master's or professional degree program in which women are under-represented, including STEM, law, business, and medicine.

Funding: \$5,000-\$18,000

**Opens:** August 1 **Deadline:** January 10

#### **AAUW Fund Names and Numbers by Program Area**

9110 — The AAUW Fund goes to where the need is greatest. Unrestricted gifts to this fund support existing programs and give AAUW the dexterity to act quickly and responsibly in the wake of any new challenges facing women and girls.

**4339** — The Leadership Programs Fund supports programs that develop women's potential to lead in their schools, communities, and country. It supports all the following tax-deductible programs:

- 2505 National Conference for College Women Student Leaders (NCCWSL) attendees develop their leadership skills, networks, and ambition at this three-day conference held annually in the Washington, D.C. area. Donations to this fund provide financial assistance to young women who would be otherwise unable to attend the conference.
- 2515 Campus Action Projects award grants to campus leaders who deliver programs guided by AAUW research to address a gender-based issue in their campus communities.
- 2522 Elect Her teaches young women leaders to run for student government and future office. This program has increased the number of women running for and winning campus positions.
- 4338 Start Smart. These salary negotiation workshops provide college women who are approaching the job market with the knowledge and skills to negotiate salaries and benefits.

**4336** — The Educational Opportunities Fund supports educational and lifelong learning opportunities that give women a chance for a lifetime of success. Donations to this fund support the following tax-deductible programs:

- Fellowships and Grants. To support a specific named fellowship or grant, refer to our directory at www.aauw.org/resource/fellowship-and-grant-fund-directory for the appropriate fund name and number.
- 4371 Tech Trek educates and inspires rising eighth-grade girls across the country in science, technology, engineering, and math through weeklong camps.

**9170** — The Eleanor Roosevelt Fund supports AAUW research to provide analysis, data, and accurate information about issues that are important to women and girls. Past reports include *Solving the Equation: The Variables for Women's Success in Engineering and Computing* (2015) and *Graduating to a Pay Gap: The Earnings of Women and Men One Year after College Graduation* (2012).

**3999** — The Legacy Advocacy Fund supports the protection of the legal rights of those who are facing sex discrimination. Donations to this fund support the following tax-deductible programs:

- 9310 Case support protects LAF plaintiffs by supporting workplace sex discrimination cases.

## HOW TO MAKE YOUR AAUW ELEVATOR PITCH WITH POWER!

An elevator pitch is a brief, persuasive speech that you use to spark interest in what your organization does. Elevator pitches should be interesting, memorable, and succinct. They also need to explain **what** makes your organization unique and **why**. Here is our simple guide to writing your own speech. Once you're done, you'll have a personalized tool to use next time you're talking to a potential member!

1. Write down four things about AAUW that you would like to share. What makes AAUW memorable to you? What projects or issues is AAUW championing that are important to you?				
2. <b>Pick the three most important points you wrote down.</b> Why are they the most important points? Condense your answer to the question into two or three sentences.				
3. Add your full name and where you're from before these two or three sentences to serve as your introduction and opening remarks.				
4. <b>Make sure to also make an "ask" at the end.</b> Every elevator pitch should conclude with a question that needs a definitive answer, whether it's "Would you like to be a part of our organization?" or "Will you attend our event on Saturday?" or "Can we add you to our newsletter list?"				
5. Here's your chance to pitch with power! Write out your AAUW elevator pitch below.				

**6.** Now try your elevator speech with a fellow member. Each of you should share what really inspires you and what could be better. Keep practicing until you are comfortable inviting someone to be a member of the AAUW community.

#### AAUW Math/Science Conference for 8th Grade Girls

Our 24th Annual Math/Science Conference for 8th Grade Girls will be on Wednesday, January 25, 2017 at Whittier College. We are unable to use Villalobos Hall because of student orientation, so we have rented The Shannon Center for one hour for our opening session, and it seats 400 people. I believe this will be a great improvement.

I have contacted the schools and have 26 schools committed to attend with up to 14 students from each school. The student total will be 360 and with the advisors there will be 386 in Shannon. We will be able to use some of the classrooms in the newly renovated Science Building. I have signed a contract with Whittier College and with The Shannon Center.

Twenty speakers have been contacted as of this writing, and eight have responded positively. In mid November I will be sending the list of speakers to each school advisor so that they can send me their student's names, and their choices of five speakers each. I try to give them 3 of their choices. They will return their lists to me in early December so I can set up the 30 workshops. Each young woman and advisor will hear six speakers.

Dolores Seidman will again be in charge of recruiting volunteers. She will have a list at our November 12 Branch meeting, so please let her know your willingness to serve. Her email address is: deeseidman@gmail.com.

I truly believe this will be another wonderful STEM event for these young women from our surrounding communities.











