PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

New Year's resolutions, who needs them? Women do. At AAUW we promote women's issues, education, career, equality and breaking down *gender* barriers. And, what is at the center of moving forward these important issues, accomplishing our goals and fulfilling our mission you ask, our action and our BRAIN!

So, for 2017 I have one resolution, yes, only one and I owe it to myself—maintaining a healthy brain. Because recently my mother became a resident of an assisted living facility that specializes in memory loss, I began to develop a keener understanding of the importance of a healthy brain. I am grateful for the stimulus AAUW offers me and for each of you intelligent and thoughtful women. You help me and my brain stay healthy!

WOMEN'S MARCH ON SATURDAY JANUARY 21, 2017

The AAUW CA website gives complete information on the Women's March to be held on Saturday, January 21 in Washington, DC and in many cities throughout the U.S. including Los Angeles and Pasadena. It will be held in Los Angeles from 9 AM to 4 PM from Pershing Square to City Hall and back. The one in Pasadena will be at 9 AM at City Hall, and those who wish can then proceed via the Gold Line to Los Angeles. Below is their mission statement:

OUR MISSION: We stand together in solidarity for the protection of our rights, our safety, our health, and our families — recognizing that our vibrant and diverse communities are the strength of our country. In the spirit of democracy and honoring the champions of human rights, dignity, and justice who have come before us, we join in diversity to show our presence in numbers too great to ignore. We stand together, recognizing that defending the most marginalized among us is defending all of us. We support the advocacy movements that reflect our multiple and intersecting identities. We call on all defenders of human rights to join us. This march is the first step towards unifying our communities, grounded in new relationships, to create change from the grassroots level up. It was their penance, as both Catholics and Ojibwe. From this shocking and painful beginning, Louise Erdrich spins an amazing, complex tale of love, family, and obligation.
