#### **IMMIGRATION STORIES FROM OUR MEMBERS - 2017**

One focus of study of the International Concerns Section has been the issue of global immigration. At the March 4<sup>th</sup> Branch Meeting, we asked members to write about the immigration story of their family. Although our histories are varied and diverse, one thing that every narrative shared was the promise of hope and opportunity that the United States provided. It was also about hard work and the value of education combined with a determination.

#### By Helen Jewell, Chair of International Concerns:

My grandparents (on my father's side) emigrated from Sweden in 1907. I am a second generation American.

My grandfather and grandmother came to Northern California in 1920 from Guanajuato, Mexico-the same place as Diego Rivera. My mother was born in Westwood, CA. I thank my grandparents for their journey and their wonderful example of being decent, hard-working human beings.

My maternal grandparents came up through the mountains from Mexico to Los Angeles. My grandfather fought with Pancho Villa and lived with the Indians on their way here. I loved the stories my grandpa told me when I was a child.

My grandfather is from Guanajuato, Mexico and worked for the railroad in Mexico. The U.S. government brought him to the USA, made him a citizen so that he could work for the USA railroad and use his inventions. My grandpa was the inventor of the corn tortilla maker currently being used all over the USA.

I'm a 4<sup>th</sup> generation Californian...but my family immigrated to escape potato famine in Ireland and from Germany for religious reasons. I had women ancestors who were missionaries in Europe and suffragettes here in the United States.

My father came to this country, by himself, at the age of 13. He came from Lithuania through Ellis Island and was sponsored by his uncle, who lived here. We were able to obtain a photo of the book he signed upon entry to Ellis Island. He later became a naturalized citizen while maintaining much of his culture and traditions. We still enjoy the special pancakes he made for us.

My maternal grandparents came from Norway as young adults, separately, to join their family in North Dakota where they met. My paternal ancestors came on the Mayflower. I'm related to Constance Hopkins, daughter of Stephen Hopkins.

My ancestors came from Wales in 1640 as indentured servants. After landing in Nevis (West Indies) and completing 5 years of servitude, they moved to Maryland where they started their family.

I am the daughter of an immigrant. My mother met my father in England during WWII-he was a US GI working on planes as a mechanic. He swept her off her feet and she moved to the US after the war. My father's folks were potato famine Irish who worked the coal mines of Pennsylvania for generations and suffered hard during the Depression. Through the GI Bill, my father earned an engineering degree and was very proud to have a long career in the aerospace industry.

My maternal grandparents emigrated from Bohemia in the 1870's. My grandmother learned to read <u>after</u> her husband died. In the Austro-Hungarian Empire, girls were not educated.

My father was born in the Netherlands. His father was a graduate of University of Amsterdam and came over as an officer in the Salvation Army and was stationed in the Citadel Building in downtown Detroit. My Dad was born in the Netherlands and became a citizen when I was young. Becoming a citizen was quite an occasion in our family.

Both of my parents were born and raised in Denmark. My father went to sea at age 13. He came to America when he was in his late 20s. My mother came to America around the same time. They met at the Danish Lutheran Church and the Danish Cheer Committee. My parents belonged to the DCC for years and were presented to the king when he came to L.A.

My grandparents are from Ireland. My grandfather came to America and worked for 3 years to pay for my grandmother's passage. When she landed they went to the Catholic Church and were married right away. They lived together until my grandmother died-always talking about the struggle they had to come together and the joys of living in America.

My grandfather fled Latvia and my grandmother fled Romania because they were rounding up Jews. They went to Canada where my father was born. Father joined the air force because he wanted to pay back the U.S.A. for coming to America. He met my mother in England. I was born in England and came to the U.S.A. when I was 6 months old. I became a U.S. citizen when I was 18 years old. Love the U.S.A.!

#### **PUBLIC POLICY**



Lisa Maatz, Vice President of Government Relations, has sent the following letter regarding AAUW's stance on Planned Parenthood.

As evidenced in our member adopted Public Policy Program AAUW is a longtime supporter of reproductive rights. We know Planned Parenthood values the health and safety of its patients above all else, and has high-quality standards for their lifesaving tissue donation programs. To show our support, AAUW joined 92 organizations in signing a letter to Congress informing them that we stand with Planned Parenthood and the women they serve every day. AAUW has also joined 96 organizations on a coalition letter opposing congressional efforts to defund Planned Parenthood, and sent our own letter to the Hill urging a "no" vote. We will be scoring this vote in our AAUW Action Fund Congressional Voting Record.

Planned Parenthood has been the most trusted women's health care provider in the nation for nearly 100 years. These community clinics are the only source of health services for many uninsured and under-insured people, especially for poor women and women of color. In fact, one in five women rely on its services at some point in her lifetime. Defunding Planned Parenthood would be a devastating blow to the 2.7 million women that have come to rely on the clinics' preventative healthcare services. AAUW stands with our friends at Planned Parenthood Federation of America, and we will stand strong against any attempts to defund critical healthcare services for women.

#### **SCHOLARSHIPS**

GWA-AAUW prides itself on doing many important things to support educational opportunities for girls and women. Providing scholarships to allow women who face hardships in continuing their educations is one of the most rewarding. Here are short biographies of the remarkable women awarded Myra Long Scholarships this year. Please come and welcome them at the June 10 luncheon.

Oralia Alcorte is a single mother of six children, ages 6-16. She will graduate from Rio Hondo Community College (RHCC) with a degree in social work. Her plan is to attend Whittier College and major in sociology. Oralia has overcome many obstacles in her young life, including molestation as a child, rape, and substance abuse as a result of those traumas. The turning point for her was the loss of her children. She decided that her life had to change and she enrolled in school. Oralia regained the custody of her children in the spring of 2015 and continued on her educational path, maintaining a 3.60 GPA in her major. "My past has inspired my future. Working with many selfless and gifted social workers along my path has inspired me to major in social work...impacting families in a positive way as other have done for me."

Sandra Herrera is a married woman with five children three of whom are in college, one full time. She returned to RHCC after twenty-five years and will graduate in May with a degree in sociology. Without a great deal of emotional support, she acknowledges that she is on this path alone. Sandra has been on the dean's list for three semesters. Through the years she has been involved in her community, working as a teacher's aide and holding various PTA offices. Sandra also became involved with the Veteran's Hospital of Long Beach when her husband needed checkups and therapy. As a result, when she becomes a social worker, she wants "to make a difference in veterans' lives by connecting them to important resources." She will attend Cal State Los Angeles in the fall, majoring in sociology.

**Leah Nolden** is a single mother of two children, ages 10 and 12. She will graduate in May with two degrees, one in social work and one in drug studies. Leah has maintained a 3.94 GPA, all the more remarkable when you consider that for the last five years she has been fighting to regain the custody of her children from their abusive father. After borrowing money from a family member, she was able to afford an attorney. Previously, she had represented herself against her husband's lawyer in an Arizona court. Leah now has custody of her children, but continues to face challenges from the children's father. She also pays for counseling for her two youngsters. Leah will enter Cal State San Bernardino in the fall, majoring in sociology, determined to succeed.

"Kathleen Grissom, New York Times bestselling author of the highly anticipated <u>Glory Over Everything</u>, established herself as a remarkable new talent with <u>The Kitchen House</u>, now a contemporary classic. In time, Lavinia is accepted into the world of the big house, caring for the master's opium-addicted wife and befriending his dangerous yet protective son. She attempts to straddle the worlds of the kitchen and big house, but her skin color will forever set her apart from Belle and the other slaves.

Through the unique eyes of Lavinia and Belle, Grissom's debut novel unfolds in a heartbreaking and ultimately hopeful story of class, race, dignity, deep-buried secrets, and familial bonds."
