PUBLIC POLICY

Sexual Assault Standards are Lowered

More and more women in the workplace are coming forward to expose the behavior of highly visible men, who, taking advantage of their position of influence, have assaulted and abused women simply because they thought they could. Appalling as it is, in many cases, people around them knew about the abuse but rather than condemn it, chose to condone, excuse or ignore ongoing reprehensible behavior.

It is, then, more perplexing that Title IX laws designed to protect victims of sexual assault at colleges and universities have been put in jeopardy by the lowering of requirements for schools charged with reporting and investigating sexual violence cases on campus.

Victims of sexual assaults in college campuses fear that the lower standards by the current Secretary of Education Betsy DeVos will discourage students from reporting assaults, create uncertainty for schools on how to follow the law and make campuses less safe.

The following is AAUW National's position and response to the Secretary of Education:

"Secretary Betsy DeVos' decision to open up Title IX for changes represents a blatant intent to roll back protections for students. It is an action that is at direct odds with upholding the civil rights of all Americans.

Make no mistake: **Title IX remains the law of the land** and this announcement does not alter in any way schools' responsibilities. DeVos' speech noted many situations in which schools have failed to adhere to the law. The response to this challenge is to *enforce* Title IX *not* to undermine it. The Department is currently collecting comments on all of its regulations, and thousands of people have vocalized their support for Title IX, its regulations, and current guidance. Secretary DeVos can anticipate a continued call from survivors, students, and advocates for full enforcement of Title IX.

Now is also the time for schools to step up and demonstrate that they will do the right thing for their students even in the midst of potential rollbacks from the Department of Education. Considering that **89 percent of college campuses disclosed zero reported rapes last year** — despite the fact that we know incidents are far more frequent — we should move forward and build on past progress not walk back current protections.

The American Association of University Women stands with survivors and <u>remains committed to protecting</u> <u>and defending Title IX</u>, and to pursuing its vigorous enforcement. We must ensure our nation's dedication to full and equal educational opportunities for all students. After all, students' access to an education is on the line. Schools, and the Department of Education, owe it to them to uphold their civil rights, a promise today's announcement fails to reaffirm."

On Sunday, October 15, our Branch was well represented at the AAUW Fund Fall Luncheon in Seal Beach by our eight members who attended: Elizabeth Baca, Rozanne Child, Earlyne Clemons, Dolores Gonzalez-Hayes, Lucinda Halley, Sharon Heck, Kaye Kidwell, and Dolores Seidman. As one of our members commented, looking around the room at the nearly 100 attendees of members and fellowship recipients, "You see a lot of brightness, happiness, and joy!" This was truly a joyous occasion as we celebrated AAUW's fund-raising efforts that resulted in \$3.7 million dollars being awarded to 250 fellowship and grant recipients in the United States with 26 recipients studying or directing projects in California.

We were fortunate to hear from six of these recipients who were studying American Studies, Sociology, Biology, Engineering, and Urban Development. This is a highlight of the AAUW year, as we see the living proof of what is accomplished through our fund raising efforts and are able to meet and interact with these talented, extraordinary young women, many of whom have overcome many hardships to reach this level of achievement. The future is theirs, and AAUW has helped make this happen! And we are all a part of this through our contributions.

As of this writing, twenty-five schools have signed on to participate. Each school will bring fourteen girls and one teacher, so we can handle twenty-six schools. One lucky school needs to let me know they want to participate.

The speakers have been very good at replying to my invitations to speak, and we have fifteen firm replies. I expect to have all twenty speakers by the time you receive your newsletter.

The speaker list is sent to each school so each girl can choose five speakers they would like to hear. I then construct the classrooms.

Dolores Seidman has again agreed to gather volunteers for this event. We need lots of help, so contact Dolores if you are able to help.

I am excited about this STEM (science, technology, engineering, mathematics) event, as it is so worthwhile for these talented young women. January will be here before we know it.

The Handmaid's Tale, Margaret Atwood

The Handmaid's Tale is a novel of such power that the reader will be unable to forget its images and its forecast. Set in the near future, it describes life in what was once the United States and is now called the Republic of Gilead, a monotheocracy that has reacted to social unrest and a sharply declining birthrate by reverting to, and going beyond, the repressive intolerance of the original Puritans. The regime takes the Book of Genesis absolutely at its word, with bizarre consequences for the women and men in its population. The story is told through the eyes of Offred, one of the unfortunate handmaids under the new social order. In condensed but eloquent prose, by turns cool-eyed, tender, despairing, passionate, and wry, she reveals to us the dark corners behind the establishment's calm facade. as certain tendencies now in existence are carried to their logical conclusions. The Handmaid's Tale is funny, unexpected, horrifying, and altogether convincing. It is at once scathing satire, dire warning, and a tour de force. It is Margaret Atwood at her best

We are reading and discussing It Can't Happen Here by Sinclair Lewis this month. It Can't Happen Here is the only one of Sinclair Lewis's later novels to match the power of Main Street, Babbitt, and Arrowsmith. A cautionary tale about the fragility of democracy, it is an alarming, eerily timeless look at how fascism could take hold in America. Written during the Great Depression, when the country was largely oblivious to Hitler's aggression, it juxtaposes sharp political satire with the chillingly realistic rise of a president who becomes a dictator to save the nation from welfare cheats, sex, crime, and a liberal press. Called "a message to thinking Americans" by the Springfield Republican when it was published in 1935, It Can't Happen Here is a shockingly prescient novel that remains as fresh and contemporary as today's news. Please join us on Monday, November 27, at 10 AM, as Gwen Woirhave leads us in discussion. The meeting is at Ann Topjon's, and Linda Harris will provide refreshments.























