PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

2017 flew by with the speed of light and was filled with both joys and sorrows. Some of us welcomed new family members—daughters-in-law, sons-in-law, and grandbabies. Some of us said goodbye to loved ones and friends.

As I look back, I also realize that the year was jam-packed with so many accomplishments. As I look forward, I see that we have so much more to do.

We AAUW women are learners and doers. We don't just sit idly and watch the world pass by. We work hard to help others and improve ourselves.

- In 2017, we awarded \$8,000 in scholarships through the Myra Long Scholarship Fund to three deserving women who graduated from community college and now are attending four-year universities. In our 2018 budget, we have increased the amount to \$12,000.
- In 2017, we sent 12 girls from three middle schools to the weeklong Tech Trek Camp at Whittier College. In 2018, we will send ten girls from two middle schools. In addition, we now are working with the El Monte School District to send six more girls to Tech Trek.
- In 2017, we hosted 390 eighth-grade girls and teachers from 27 middle schools at our annual Math/ Science Conference. In 2018, we will celebrate a quarter century of hosting this wonderful conference—with upwards of 390 students and teachers from 25 schools.
- In 2018, we are adding a new educational leadership project. We are awarding a scholarship to a Whittier College student to attend the National Conference for College Women Student Leaders (NCCWSL) at the University of Maryland.
- In 2017, we had interesting and inspirational programs at our Branch meetings. We will continue these outstanding programs in 2018.
- In 2017, our 12 Branch sections met regularly to read and discuss great books, dine on sumptuous foods, study international issues, attend interesting movies, create and perform mini-plays, nurture gardens, enjoy nature's beauty, and simply enjoy each other's company. In 2018, we will continue these fun and worthy activities.

Thank you for your support. Thank you for what you have done, what you are doing and what you will do as we move forward to accomplish our great mission.

PUBLIC POLICY

Every time I sit down to write about reproductive rights, I get a pain in the pit of my stomach because I'm virtually certain that someone, somehow will take offense at the proposition that woman are the *only* ones who should have any say in their reproductive choices. You only need to look at the news to know this is true.

Since 1977, AAUW has stated that it "trusts that every woman has the ability to make her own informed choices regarding her reproductive life within the dictates of her own moral and religious beliefs." Further, AAUW believes that these deeply personal decisions should be made without government interference.

Living in California, we often take these rights for granted since there is little organized opposition with enough power to force their point of view on women here. However, this is not true in other states. This year, 2017, has seen any number of attacks on women's rights to make their own decisions about their bodies, their health and their families.

In the Public Policy section of the AAUW website, our organization reports that "In the last four years, states have enacted a total of <u>288 abortion restrictions</u>, and more than half of U.S. women of reproductive age currently <u>live in states</u> that are hostile or extremely hostile to abortion rights." Between January and June 2017, six states introduced measures to ban all abortions and 28 introduced bans on abortion in some circumstances.

As is usually the case with anti-choice legislation, lower income woman bear a disproportionate burden from "waiting" rules that require multiple days of missed work to complete the procedure to limited access in many states that requires those seeking to exercise their rights to travel hundreds of miles (with all the expense and inconvenience to the families that this entails).

Unfortunately, there is not the space to delineate all of the attacks on reproductive freedom. Some are so egregious as to require a husband's permission or burial of an aborted fetus and any number of such actions. I urge you to do some research. The AAUW website is a great place to start. We all have daughters, granddaughters and other young women in our lives for whom we want these hard won freedoms to remain in place. It is important to know what is happening nationally.

Hillbilly Elegy, by J. D. Vance

From a former marine and Yale Law School graduate, this is a powerful account of growing up in a poor rust-belt town that offers a broader, probing look at the struggles of America's white working-class.

Hillbilly Elegy is a passionate and personal analysis of a culture in crisis—that of white working-class Americans. The decline of this group, a demographic of our country that has been slowly disintegrating over forty years, has been reported on with growing frequency and alarm, but has never before been written about as searingly from the inside. J. D. Vance tells the true story of what a social, regional, and class decline feels like when you were born with it hung around your neck.

The Vance family story begins hopefully in postwar America. J. D.'s grandparents were "dirt poor and in love," and moved north from Kentucky's Appalachia region to Ohio in the hopes of escaping the dreadful poverty around them. They raised a middle-class family, and eventually their grandchild (the author) would graduate from Yale Law School, a conventional marker of their success in achieving generational upward mobility.

But, as the family saga of *Hillbilly Elegy* plays out, we learn that this is only the short, superficial version. Vance's grandparents, aunt, uncle, sister, and, most of all, his mother, struggled profoundly with the demands of their new middle-class life, and were never able to fully escape the legacy of abuse, alcoholism, poverty, and trauma so characteristic of their part of America. Vance piercingly shows how he himself still carries around the demons of their chaotic family history.

A deeply moving memoir with its share of humor and vividly colorful figures, *Hillbilly Elegy* is the story of how upward mobility really feels. It is an urgent and troubling meditation on the loss of the American dream for a large segment of this country.

Morning Book

Our first book for discussion this year is Aline Ohanesian's debut novel, Orhan's Inheritance, in which she delves into what the march of the Armenian people into the Syrian desert looks like from the eyes of an elderly survivor as well as a young Turk learning to come to grips with the truth of both his family's and his nation's history. Orhan's investigation into the rationale behind his grandfather's last will and testament takes him on both a physical and emotional journey that represents how such understanding leads to the healing necessary to mend the wounds of history. Places and things stay with us, and sometimes we stay with them. Remembering the past can be a tricky business, and for those who experienced dark times in history the memories they may most want to forget are the very ones that future generations insist that they share. Orhan's Inheritance begins in a small village in Turkey, with the death of a patriarch, Kemal, who bequeaths the family home to a woman his heirs have never heard of. Kemal's grandson, Orhan, finds her across the world in a home for elderly Armenians and their meeting leads to a long-buried account of two people deeply in love, torn apart by war and terrible sacrifice. The novel is rich in emotion, and its roots run deep and wide, tapping into a largely neglected time in Turkish history, spanning decades, and honoring the resilience of the human spirit. The author draws from her family's own dark history to create a tender, powerful story of love and reclamation. Orhan's Inheritance is a breathtaking and expansive work of historical fiction and proof that the past can sometimes rewrite the future. This book is the Whittier Reads book for 2018 with events such as an author talk and field trips planned for the month of April.

Murdered Artists -- Masterful Forgeries -- Art Crime at its Worst

As an insurance investigator and world renowned expert in nonverbal communication, Dr. Genevieve Lenard faces the daily challenge of living a successful, independent life -- particularly because she has to deal with her high-functioning autism. Nothing -- not her studies, her high IQ or her astounding analytical skills prepared her for the changes about to take place in her life.

It started as a favor to help her boss' acerbic friend look into the murder of a young artist, but soon it proves to be more complex. Forced out of her predictable routines, safe environment and limited social interaction, Genevieve is thrown into exploring the meaning of friendship, expanding her social definitions, and for the first time in her life be part of a team in a race to stop more artists from being murdered.
