April is not only the deadline to pay our federal and state income taxes, but it also turns out to be a big month for voting on AAUW issues.

GWA AAUW members will vote on two important issues at the April 14, 2018 annual meeting. First, we will vote on the 2018-19 slate of officers that was presented at the March Branch meeting. Second, we will vote on the Branch dues structure following AAUW's increase in national dues.

The AAUW Board of Directors is proposing the following amendments to the national bylaws:

- 1. Creating three-year staggered terms for national board members,
- 2. Opening up service on the national board to people who are not AAUW members and
- 3. Eliminating the degree requirement for AAUW membership

#### **DUES INCREASE**

**BACKGROUND:** AAUW has increased the national dues to \$59, effective March 16, 2018. This amounts to an increase of \$10 for all members who pay national dues (i.e., Life Members and Honorary Members do not pay national dues annually).

The GWA AAUW Board voted nine to six (9 to 6) to pass the increase on to the GWA AAUW membership without any other change in the dues structure, resulting in total dues of \$103 for regular members. The membership will be voting on this recommendation at our Annual Meeting on Saturday, April 14, 2018. A two-thirds vote of the members present at the Annual Meeting is required to pass a motion affecting dues.

**ISSUE:** Should GWA AAUW dues be increased to \$103?

The following table shows the difference between the old dues categories and the proposed new categories for a regular member who pays the full dues.

### TECH TREK

During March, interviews were held at Katherine Edwards Middle School in the Whittier City School District and Los Nietos Middle School in Los Nietos School District. The committee will facilitate interviews for six campers funded by the El Monte City School District. Selected campers will be notified in April.

All branches sending girls to the Whittier camp are being asked to support the Rube Goldberg Machine Project by collecting items. This year the project will focus on physics. The campers will be building simple machines. Types of items to collect in varying sizes include wedges, spools, toy wheels, pieces of board such as tongue depressors, or larger for inclined planes. Springs, gears, switches, levers and other items you might find in a simple machine are welcome. Some other items which may be useful are dominos, rulers, balls of all different sizes, pvc piping, rubber bands, string and marbles. We will be collecting egg cartons, plastic containers and lids, paper toweling rolls, toilet paper rolls or wrapping paper rolls in a limited amount. (We overdid it last year in collecting these last items.)

Please separate items you save in separate bundles, individual bags, containers or rubber bands. This was very helpful last year.

Drop off of items will be at the June luncheon. After that date call Kaye Kidwell or Pat Dudley to make other arrangements.

### **PUBLIC POLICY**

### **Gender and Technology**

This month I bring attention to a new Harvard Kennedy School's (HKS) Women and Public Policy Program (WAPPP). Full disclosure, the Kennedy School is my alma mater and so I am particular pleased that the school continues its innovative approach in addressing issues of today, affecting not only us nationally but others around the world.

Late last year WAPPP launched a program with a focus on Gender and Technology. More specifically, it is a research portfolio named "What Works: Designing Gender Equality for and by the Tech Sector". Made possible by funding from Melinda Gates, the portfolio "will fund projects that use insights from behavioral science and technology to gain a greater understanding of how to remove gender bias in the tech sector and beyond. The aims of the research are 1) to develop interventions that address challenges women face over the length of their careers, from recruitment to promotion to leadership, and 2) to harness technological tools to bring these interventions to scale across sectors. Using an intersectional approach that considers race and ethnicity as well as gender, projects will also gather data to better understand specific challenges for women of color, who often are doubly disadvantaged in the workplace." It is likely that other institutions of higher learning will follow HKS and more research is conducted to find solutions that narrow the gap, or better yet, eliminate gender and equity disparities.

We at GWA AAUW do our share to address and encourage equity through our scholarship and Tech Trek programs, opening the minds of young girls to the world of technology and the sciences, and by providing financial assistance to women facing economic challenges in pursuing a college education.

### **AAUW FUND**

This month, as you have read in the program article, we are having as our speaker **Sabrina Vajraca**, a recipient of the 2016-17 Career Development Grant. This will give us an up close look at one of the programs sponsored by the AAUW Fund, which is supported by your donations. Below is more information about what this grant entails.

Career Development Grants provide funding to women who hold a bachelor's degree and are preparing to advance or change careers or reenter the workforce. Primary consideration is given to women of color and women pursuing their first advanced degree or credentials in nontraditional fields.

Applicants must be U.S. citizens or permanent residents whose last degree was received before June 30, 2013. Funds are available for tuition, fees, books, supplies, local transportation, and dependent care.

Grants provide support for course work beyond a bachelor's degree, including a master's degree, second bachelor's degree, certification program, or specialized training in technical or professional fields. Course work must be taken at an accredited two or four-year college or university in the United States, or at a technical school that is fully licensed or accredited by the U.S. Department of Education. Funds are not available for doctorate-level work

For the 2017–18 academic year, 250 women, and community projects serving women and girls, will receive \$3.7 million from AAUW.

This level of funding for women's education and projects has a tremendous impact on women and their communities by expanding women's potential and supporting their future promise.

By easing the pressure of financing their academic and community work, AAUW's awards help women tackle the growing burden of <u>student debt</u> and focus their efforts on the task at hand: developing the skills and confidence they need to excel in their fields.

### **Modern Trends in Literature**

Modern Trends meets Thursday, April 26, 7 PM, at the home of Gen'nel Walters. Georgine Sweeney will lead the discussion on *Bad Ass Librarians of Timbuktu* by Joshua Hammer.

To save ancient Arabic texts from Al Qaeda, a band of librarians pulls off a brazen heist worthy of *Ocean's Eleven* in this "fast-paced narrative that is...part intellectual history, part geopolitical tract, and part out-and-out thriller" (The Washington Post).

In the 1980s, a young adventurer and collector for a government library, Abdel Kader Haidara, journeyed across the Sahara Desert and along the Niger River, tracking down and salvaging tens of thousands of ancient Islamic and secular manuscripts that were crumbling in the trunks of desert shepherds. His goal: to preserve this crucial part of the world's patrimony in a gorgeous library. But then Al Qaeda showed up at the door.

"Part history, part scholarly adventure story, and part journalist survey....Joshua Hammer writes with verve and expertise" (*The New York Times Book Review*) about how Haidara, a mild-mannered archivist from the legendary city of Timbuktu, became one of the world's greatest smugglers by saving the texts from sure destruction. With bravery and patience, Haidara organized a dangerous operation to sneak all 350,000 volumes out of the city to the safety of southern Mali. His heroic heist "has all the elements of a classic adventure novel" (*The Seattle Times*), and is a reminder that ordinary citizens often do the most to protect the beauty of their culture. This story is one of a man who, through extreme circumstances, discovered his higher calling and was changed forever by it.

We need to select a chair and co-chair for next year and be thinking about books to recommend for 2018-2019.
