A 2016-17 recipient of AAUW's Career Development Grant, Sabina currently is pursuing a Masters of Fine Arts at USC's School of Cinematic Arts. Her life's goal has been to direct movies, and she is succeeding.

Sabina fled the war in Bosnia at age 14 and wound up in Florida through our country's refugee resettlement program. When she shared that, my heart stopped for a moment. I have a 14-year-old granddaughter and cannot imagine what it would be like to try to save her life in the midst of war with my family as a target of the military. Sabina reminded me that I have so much for which to be thankful. I am going to give my granddaughter an extra hug when I pick her up from school.

Back to Sabina – a strong, resilient, creative, articulate woman with an infectious smile and a twinkle in her eyes. She already has had a successful theater career in New York – writing, directing and producing plays at The Lincoln Center and other venues. She began her film career in 2005 when she produced and directed the award-winning documentary *Back to Bosnia*. Her resume is impressive. I, for one, will be cheering for Sabina when she is nominated for a "Best Director" Oscar!

## **TECH TREK**

GWA AAUW is sending ten girls to the Whittier Camp that begins on Sunday, June 24, and ends on Saturday, June 30. The girls and guests will attend the May luncheon.

For the first time we conducted interviews and selected one girl from each K-8 school in the El Monte City School District. El Monte provides funding for six scholarships. Arcadia Branch used to facilitate the selection following the AAUW Tech Trek criteria. Since the Arcadia Branch no longer exists, GWA AAUW volunteered to do the interviews and select campers from the school district.

Bring Rube Goldberg donations to the **June Branch meeting**. This year the project <u>will focus on</u> <u>physics</u>. The campers will be building simple machines. Types of items to collect in varying sizes include wedges, spools, toy wheels, pieces of board such as tongue depressors or larger for inclined planes, springs, gears, switches, levers and other items you might find in a simple machine. Some other items may be useful such as dominos, rulers, balls of all different sizes, pvc piping, rubber bands, string and marbles. We will be collecting egg cartons, plastic containers and lids, paper toweling rolls, toilet paper rolls or wrapping paper rolls in a limited amount. (We overdid it last year in collecting these last items.)

Please separate items you save in separate bundles, individual bags, containers or rubber bands. This was very helpful last year. If you are unable to bring donations to the June meeting contact Kaye Kidwell or Pat Dudley after that meeting to make other arrangements.

We invite all our Branch members to attend Visitation Day. This is great opportunity for you to see how the Whittier Camp has evolved under new directorship and to meet members from other branches. Date, time and check-in location will be in the June newsletter.

# **PUBLIC POLICY**

While doing some research for a talk on AAUW that I was asked to give the local Whittier United Nations Alliance, I had the opportunity to reread much of our Public Policy literature. Our young people are getting ready to review the year's educational content in preparation for final exams. It seems a good time for us to do some reviewing and refreshing of our own.

AAUW is a mission-driven organization. We strive to "advance equity for women and girls through advocacy, education, philanthropy, and research and speak to women's needs, aspirations, and concerns across the life span." Our mission <u>drives our principles</u> and our <u>principles drive the actions</u> we take (both organizationally and as individual members within the organization) to effect policies at the federal, state and local levels. The principles are summarized below. I took some liberties with wording for the sake of space. However, I urge you all to read through these at <u>https://www.aauw.org/resource/principles-and-priorities/</u>.

- Understanding that true equity requires a balance between individual rights and the needs of the community. AAUW opposes all forms of discrimination and supports constitutional protections for the civil rights of all individuals.
- Belief that high quality, appropriately funded PUBLIC education is the foundation of a democratic society and the key to gender equity. We believe this education must be free of harassment, censorship and bias. We believe in increased access to education and in closing the achievement gap that disproportionately impacts the poor.
- Promoting the economic, social and physical well being of all persons. Inherent in this principle is an entire list of issues AAUW deems critical including an economy that supports a living wage; affordable health-care (including reproductive care) and dependent care; a clean, healthy, sustainable environment; opposition to efforts to undermine Social Security, Medicare and Medicaid through privatization and/or block-grant proposals; and, the recognition that gun violence is a public health crisis.
- Belief in the right to privacy and freedom from violence; separation of church and state; a fair and balanced judiciary; and, meaningful campaign finance reform.
- Supporting efforts to improve racial, ethnic and gender justice and creation of a diverse culture.
- Belief that global interdependence requires national and international anti-human trafficking policies. Support for the civil and human rights of all immigrants, including a fair and just path to legal status. AAUW supports a strengthened United Nations and its affiliate agencies.

There is much more to read including action priorities in support of each of these principles. It's always good to remember that AAUW stands for great things.

We are reading and discussing The Zookeeper's Wife, by Diane Ackerman, at our next meeting on Monday. June 4. This is an amazing true story in which the keepers of the Warsaw Zoo saved hundreds of people from Nazi hands, and was made into a 2017 movie. After their zoo was bombed, Polish zookeepers Jan and Antonina Zabinski managed to save over three hundred people from the Nazis by hiding refugees in the empty animal cages. With animal names for these "guests," and human names for the animals, it's no wonder that the zoo's code name became "The House Under a Crazy Star." Bestselling naturalist and acclaimed storyteller Diane Ackerman combines extensive research and an exuberant writing style to re-create this fascinating, truelife story—sharing Antonia's life as "the zookeeper's wife," while examining the disturbing obsessions at the core of Nazism. The Tea Girl of Hummingbird Lane by Lisa See

"From #1 New York Times bestselling author Lisa See, "one of those special writers capable of delivering both poetry and plot" (The New York Times Book Review), a moving novel about tradition, tea farming, and the bonds between mothers and daughters.

"In their remote mountain village, Li-yan and her family align their lives around the seasons and the farming of tea. For the Akha people, ensconced in ritual and routine, life goes on as it has for generations—until a stranger appears at the village gate in a jeep, the first automobile any of the villagers has ever seen.

"The stranger's arrival marks the first entrance of the modern world in the lives of the Akha people. Slowly, Li-yan, one of the few educated girls on her mountain, begins to reject the customs that shaped her early life. When she has a baby out of wedlock—conceived with a man her parents consider a poor choice—she rejects the tradition that would compel her to give the child over to be killed, and instead leaves her, wrapped in a blanket with a tea cake tucked in its folds, near an orphanage in a nearby city.

"As Li-yan comes into herself, leaving her insular village for an education, a business, and city life, her daughter, Haley, is raised in California by loving adoptive parents. Despite her privileged childhood, Haley wonders about her origins. Across the ocean Li-yan longs for her lost daughter. Over the course of years, each searches for meaning in the study of Pu'er, the tea that has shaped their family's destiny for centuries.

"A powerful story about circumstances, culture, and distance, The Tea Girl of Hummingbird Lane paints an unforgettable portrait of a little known region and its people and celebrates the bond of family."
