

Five remarkable women from Rio Hondo Community College will benefit this fall from Myra Long Scholarships.

She has been interning and volunteering locally in the television field. Bea became a U.S. citizen in 2016. She spoke no English upon arriving here and works daily to improve her language skill. She hopes to become the first in her family to graduate from a four-year college.
- **Brenda Coronel** will enter UCLA this fall with a major in sociology. She is a single parent of a three year-old daughter who is her motivation to better their lives through education. Despite having endured a horrific automobile accident and an abusive personal relationship, Brenda has maintained good grades and is determined to succeed.
- **Yarisma Rocha** will enter USC this fall and major in Business Administration/Human Resources. She is a single mother who will become the first college graduate in her family. Yarisma's six-yearold daughter was diagnosed with leukemia at age 1. PUBLIC POLICY

June – the time for graduations, new beginnings and, of course, weddings. I'm willing to bet, that like you, when I think of weddings, I'm not picturing the bride as barely pubescent, and, even if I were, I might assume that was a third world problem. The percentages of marriage for girls under 18 in the third world is staggering. According to <u>https://www.icrw.org/child-marriage-facts-and-figures/</u> :

- One third of girls in the developing world are married before the age of 18 and one in nine are married before the age of 15.
- In 2012, 70 million women ages 20-24 around the world had been married before the age of 18.

That does not mean, however, that the problem does not exist in the US. I was shocked to discover that only one state in the country, Delaware, has outlawed marriage under the age of 18 and that only occurred in **May 2018.** According to the Pew Research Center, "Although child marriage is not very common in the U.S., it is legal in almost every state. Nearly every state technically prohibits people younger than 18 from marrying, but each of these jurisdictions has exceptions to these laws. In at least 36 states, for example, minors can marry with judicial consent. In 34 states, 16- and 17-year-olds can marry with their parents' permission. Two states, Massachusetts and New Hampshire, allow 12- and 13-year-old girls respectively and 14-year-old boys to marry with parental and judicial permission. A few states have no minimum age for marriage with parental and/or judicial permission.

These marriages are almost exclusively young girls married off to older men. Sometimes these men have raped them; other times parents have religious or cultural beliefs that preclude anything other than marriage or child-rearing as a viable option for girls. While opposition to the practice is growing, some push-back comes from both likely and unlikely sources. For example, both the ACLU and most anti-reproductive choice organizations are opposed to laws forbidding teenagers to marry.

While we know from the research that early marriage and child-bearing are the greatest obstacles to educational achievement for women, even AAUW does not have a clear policy on the issue, and the most recent UN goals and objectives do not include anything on child-marriage.

This is one of those articles without an admonition to do something, except be aware and educate yourselves. I recommend the Frontline article, <u>https://www.pbs.org/wgbh/frontline/article/in-fight-over-child-marriage-laws-states-resist-calls-for-a-total-ban/</u>, and the website, <u>http://www.unchainedatlast.org/laws-to-end-child-marriage/</u>. Both help with understanding a complex issue.

AAUW FUND

THE YEAR IN REVIEW:

This year there have been many opportunities to inform our membership about the work that is done through AAUW Fund with newsletter articles, board reports, and announcements at Branch meetings. The September newsletter article highlighted programs such as Tech Savvy, Start Smart and Work Smart, the Legal Advocacy Fund, NCCWSL and the National Convention and fellowships. (Who can remember the words indicated by the letters NCCWSL?)

In October, eight members of our Branch attended the AAUW Fund Luncheon in Seal Beach at which we heard inspiring stories from six recipients of the fellowships granted by AAUW.

Members were encouraged to make end of the year donations individually to AAUW Fund with donation envelopes provided at our November luncheon. This resulted in nearly \$5,000 being donated by our members whose names were recognized in a future newsletter. (Members also donate \$2.00 each as part of their Branch dues.)

In February, Rozanne Child arranged for Donna Lilly, past AAUW CA President, to speak about "Start Smart", another project supported by AAUW Fund. Rozanne also introduced the student from Whittier College, Piper Lowinger, who will attend NCCWSL with funding from the Myra Long Scholarship Fund.

Featured speaker at our April meeting was SabinaVajarca, recipient of the AAUW Career Development Grant, with arrangements finalized by Program VP, Earlyne Clemons. Her description of her escape from Bosnia and subsequent work in film at USC reminded us of the value of these grants from AAUW.

In April, the AAUW Named Gift Honoree, Ann Chambers, was presented at the Branch meeting, after being selected by committee, based on nominations from Branch members.

The Legal Advocacy Fund (LAF) celebrated the ruling by the 9th District Court in April which ruled in favor of Aileen Rizo establishing that prior salary could not be used to determine future salary, a big win in the fight for gender equality in salaries. This is another example of how money donated to AAUW Fund is used.

And now AAUW is excited to announce 245 awards and \$3.8 million in funding for fellows and grantees in the 2018-19 award year! This exceptional group of recipients will pursue academic work and lead innovative community projects to empower women and girls.

For 130 years, AAUW has been a leading source of funding for graduate women, providing more than \$100 million in fellowships and grants to more than 12,000.

It has been my pleasure to serve as AAUW Fund Vice President this past year. As a 46-year member of AAUW, I am committed to the work done by this important organization for the advance of women and girls!

Bring Rube Goldberg donations to the **June Branch meeting**. We will have a vehicle parked on the upper level of the parking structure at the entrance to the hotel from <u>10:45 AM -11:45 AM</u>. Modern Trends in Literature

Modern Trends will meet Thursday, June 28, 7 PM, at the home of Myra Weiss. Gen'nel Walters is co-hostess and Marcia Orr will lead the discussion on *Lincoln in the Bardo*, a moving and original father-son story featuring none other than Abraham Lincoln, as well as an unforgettable cast of supporting characters, living and dead, historical and invented.

February 1862. The Civil War is less than one year old. The fighting has begun in earnest, and the nation realizes it is in for a long, bloody struggle. Meanwhile, President Lincoln's beloved elevenyear-old son, Willie, lies upstairs in the White House, gravely ill. In a matter of days, despite predictions of a recovery, Willie dies and is laid to rest in a Georgetown cemetery. "My poor boy, he was too good for this earth," the president says at the time. "God has called him home." Newspapers report that a grief-stricken Lincoln returns, alone, to the crypt several times to hold his boy's body.

From that seed of historical truth, George Saunders spins an unforgettable story of familial love and loss that breaks free of its realistic, historical framework into a supernatural realm both hilarious and terrifying. Willie Lincoln finds himself in a strange purgatory where ghosts mingle, gripe, commiserate, quarrel, and enact bizarre acts of penance. Within this transitional state—called, in the Tibetan tradition, the bardo a monumental struggle erupts over young Willie's soul.

Lincoln in the Bardo is an astonishing feat of imagination and a bold step forward from one of the most important and influential writers of his generation. Formally daring, generous in spirit, deeply concerned with matters of the heart, it is a testament to fiction's ability to speak honestly and powerfully to the things that really matter to us. Saunders has invented a thrilling new form that deploys a kaleidoscopic, theatrical panorama of voices to ask a timeless, profound question: How do we live and love when we know that everything we love must end?
