PUBLIC POLICY

Well, it is November, so politics and voting are on everyone's mind (or should be). In a country already divided about everything else, it is not surprising that there is an ideological divide between those concerned about the vote being adulterated by people voting fraudulently (i.e., having no legal right to vote) and the vote being suppressed by a group to help ensure that their candidate wins by making it hard or impossible for voters of a different ideology to exercise their right.

A little bit of research into the issue proved interesting. First, let us deal with Voter Fraud. This was such a concern that after the November 2016 election, the President formed a blue-ribbon committee to investigate the issue. The committee was disbanded in January 2018 after being unable to uncover evidence of fraud. Please look at the Brennan Center for Justice analysis, which lists a variety of research that finds little to no measurable voter fraud, including a Dartmouth analysis of the past election, which concluded that the upper limit on double voting in the 2012 election was 0.02%. The paper noted that the incident rate was likely much lower, given audits conducted by the researchers showed that "many, if not all, of these apparent double votes could be a result of measurement error." The Brennan Center also cites a 2014 study by the non-partisan Government Accountability Office, which reflected a literature review of the existing research on voter fraud, noted that the studies consistently found "few instances of in-person voter fraud."

The Heritage Foundation, a conservative think-tank, issued a paper headlined saying voter fraud is real. That study claimed 1100 instances over 47 states. Let's assume they all happened in 2016 (they did not). If 123,000,000 million votes were cast, the fraud rate is 0.00000894 %. I've spent a good portion of my career doing research and analysis. That rate is known as a "rounding error" or "statistically insignificant".

On the other hand, the American Civil Liberties Union website states: Voting rights are under attack nationwide as states pass voter suppression laws. These laws lead to significant burdens for eligible voters trying to exercise their most fundamental constitutional right. Since 2008, states across the country have passed measures to make it harder for Americans—particularly black people, the elderly, students, and people with disabilities—to exercise their fundamental right to cast a ballot. These measures include cuts to early voting, voter ID laws, and purges of voter rolls.

The AAUW website has numerous articles on the harm that Voter ID and other suppression techniques do the minorities and the elderly. AAUW cites an Associated Press study that found 11 percent of voting-age Americans don't have ID. That's 21 million people! The numbers are scarier for the elderly and women: 18 percent of people over the age of 65 don't have a current ID, and only 66 percent of women voters have proof of citizenship that reflects their current name.

Our right to vote is sacred. Our foremothers were beaten and jailed fighting for it. We all know the horror stories associated with African-Americans trying to exercise their franchise in the South. We have to be vigilant and never permit political expediency to usurp our rights in the name of a virtually non-existent problem.

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
