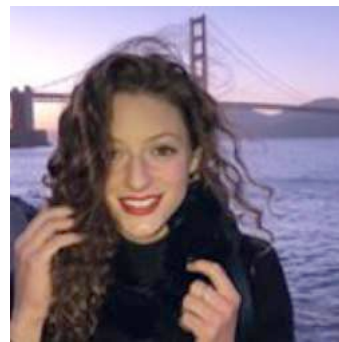

# PUBLIC POLICY

Last month I wrote about the difference having diverse voices in Congress and State Legislatures can make. Women at the table, change the conversation. I am particularly drawn to one of AAUW's catch phrases: "You provide the voice; we'll provide the megaphone." This is just one more way of saying how critical it is that we join with our sisters in raising our voices for what is right and fair.

High on the list of things for which we should advocate is the Paycheck Fairness Act, introduced in Congress on January 30, 2019. According to the AAUW website, the bill would: "take meaningful steps to update and strengthen the Equal Pay Act of 1963 to help close the gender pay gap, including:

- closing loopholes that have weakened the law over time to allow employers to justify paying workers unfairly,
- creating more robust remedies for those who have suffered discrimination,
- preventing employers from retaliating against workers who discuss or disclose their wages,
- prohibiting employers from relying on salary history to set wages, and
- providing much needed training and technical assistance, as well as data collection and research.

The gender pay gap is persistent and can only be addressed if women have the tools they need to challenge discrimination and employers have the incentives they need to comply with the law. It's time for Congress to make real change for all families by passing the Paycheck Fairness Act."

# MATH/SCIENCE CONFERENCE FOR 8<sup>TH</sup> GRADE GIRLS

Our 26<sup>th</sup> Math/Science Conference for 8<sup>th</sup> Grade Girls is now history. On Wednesday, January 30, 2019 we hosted 369 students and 26 advisers at Whittier College. Each of the 26 schools sent at least 14 girls and all attendees joined together for an opening session at The Shannon Center at 9:15 AM. They were greeted and oriented by Branch President Rozanne Child, and they heard a timely keynote address by Dr. Joyce Kaufman, a Whittier College Dean, and a member of our AAUW Branch.

The participants were given a snack of an energy bar, a piece of fruit, and a bottle of water on the way to their first workshop, which began at 9:50 AM. Each of the ten workshops lasted 55 minutes. A Branch member served as moderator, and two STEM speakers presented. The speakers repeated their 25-minute presentation in two more workshops. A ticket was required for anyone to enter the workshop, so a great deal of effort went into collecting the speaker choices from the participants, and assigning them to three workshops. We used one classroom in Hoover Hall, two classrooms in Diehl Hall, and seven classrooms in the renovated Science Learning Center. Our 20 speakers included physicians, law enforcement, veterinarian, engineers, physical therapist, planetary geologist, IT, microbial ecologist, chemistry professor, director of product quality, interior designer, food researcher, global treasury executive, medical technologist, and a habitat restorer. All of the speakers are volunteers and I sent a thank you note to each wonderful, talented woman. We brought box lunches to many of the speakers when the third workshop ended at 12:45 PM and some of them stayed to have lunch with the volunteers. Conversation time was great at the end of a successful conference.

Dolores Seidman did a fantastic job recruiting volunteers from our Branch to serve in so many ways. We are very appreciative of their services. The weather was beautiful (thankfully, no rain) and everything went very smoothly. I send email letters to a long list of area middle schools in September each year after I learn the available date from Whittier College. We take 26 schools on a “first come, first served” basis. This year we had three schools on a wait list as they responded too late. All of the schools showed up, and no one dropped out at the last minute to make room for a wait-listed school. The Shannon Center holds 400 people and our total this year was 395. It is a very good program and the schools have learned to sign up early.

The evaluations from the speakers, moderators, advisers, and students were very positive. I read every one of them and we learn how to improve for the coming year. In the comments line many students used words and phrases such as: very educational, wonderful, so much fun, interesting and inspiring experience, would love to attend again, enjoyed the “How did I get here?” stories, and loved being around successful women. My favorite of all the comments is this: “Ultimately, I vastly enjoyed all of the presentations I attended today. The way the presenters told about their jobs really sparked my interest in the medical and scientific fields, because I had my mind set on being an entertainer.”

# AAUW FUND

March traditionally is known as the month that “comes in like a lion and goes out like a lamb.” Considering our winter at the point of this writing (2/14/19), we have already had one drippy, wet lion! I received the report of our Branch’s donation to the AAUW Fund for the year of 2018. The total was \$3,330. Congratulations, ladies! Our Branch was very generous in 2018. Maybe, just maybe, we can do better in 2019.

In December 2017, the State of California filed a lawsuit similar to that of the state of Pennsylvania, challenging the proposed Interim Final Rules, which would roll back the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act concerning exempting the contraceptive mandate for organizations with religious or moral objections. Recently a federal judge in California ruled that the final rules would cause harm to 13 plaintiffs who were cited in the case of *State of California v. Health and Human Services*. A day later a similar suit in Pennsylvania resulted in a similar ruling. The AAUW supports the efforts to stop these exemption rules for the reason that no-cost contraceptive coverage is necessary for women’s ability to plan to enter, remain and grow in the workplace and or higher education.

We have a debate now before AAUW as to whether we will add an “A” to the STEM program and call it STEAM. The “A” is for the ARTS including the HUMANITIES. The justification for this concept is to incorporate both sides of the brain thus encouraging it to interact in a more complete capacity. The left side of the brain is associated with sciences and math while the right side is considered the creative side used in the arts. Personally I like being “whole brained”. I find it hard enough these days just to find my keys. It would help if all “pistons” were firing up together, then maybe those keys would not elude me so often! Does that mean it is time to get out that coloring book or crochet an afghan? Whatever helps!

## **MLSF RECIPIENTS**

At least 36 women have been helped by those who have given to the Myra Long Scholarship Fund in the last eleven years. Their ages have ranged from 25 to 56. All were graduates of Rio Hondo Community College and were accepted by a four-year university. Many were single mothers, often overcoming obstacles including drug addiction, physical abuse and family illness. Their dedication to their educational goals was evidenced by their minimum 3.0 GPA's.

It has been my privilege to be a part of the scholarship recipient committee for six years. There was a time when I wondered if it wouldn't be better to allot, say, \$8,000 to one person rather than divide it among three or four. Time after time I have been told by at least one recipient each year that we can never know how important it is that someone believes in them. They have had so little encouragement in their lives. Needless to say, my opinion has changed completely.

Be assured that your generous contribution to the non-event fundraiser will continue to support AAUW's important goal in furthering education among local women who are dedicated to bettering their own lives, and their family's, as well.
