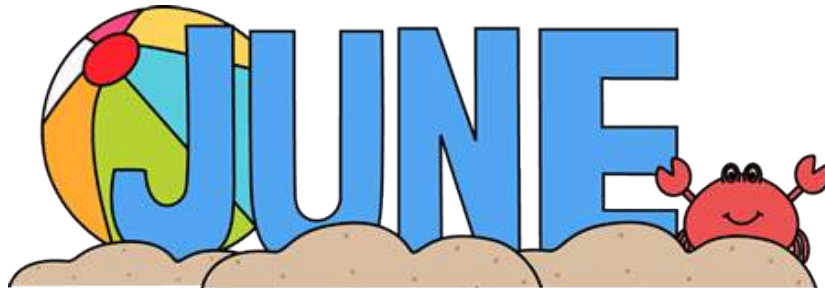

AAUW Public Policy Priorities Proposal National Voting Results - 97.6% Pass

Every two years, AAUW members vote on revisions to our Public Policy Priorities. The Public Policy Priorities establishes our organization’s federal action priorities, as well as guidelines for state and local action. Thanks to all members who took time to vote online.

In addition to electing new leaders, 99% of California's members voted a resounding YES to approve the **Public Policy Priorities**.

AAUW-California is fortunate to have talented and dedicated members who will step up to serve our state organization. The continuity of leadership is critical to the successful execution of our advocacy, programs and projects. New members provide our state leadership team with the important ingredients of energy, enthusiasm and engagement.

There are many ways to serve AAUW and our Mission; standing for election takes a special kind of member – one who is willing to lead. Thank you to all the candidates who ran in 2019, and continued success to our new board members.

PUBLIC POLICY

The other day, I asked a few of our members if they had any ideas for a Public Policy article and got some very good ideas. This morning when I woke up and tried to decide, the only thing on my mind was the absolute rage I felt about the anti-choice measures in Alabama, Georgia, Texas and a few other states.

I've written before about the critical importance of "choice" and how AAUW supports this fundamental right. One of the things I found interesting is that almost all of the suggestions tied back in one way or other to reproductive choice and the impact that lack thereof has on a woman's ability to be achieve her dreams, her destiny and her place in the world.

One member suggested that I write about the failure to reauthorize the Violence Against Women Act. It seems to me the **ultimate** violence is for anyone outside of the woman herself to try and exert his/her will on that woman. Equal Pay or the Equal Rights Amendment was also suggested. Tell me, please, how does a human being attain equality when a segment of the population believes they can control her actions based on *their* own, rather than *her* own, metaphysical beliefs? What equality can there ever be when biology is destiny and the State claims a right to control your body?

Want another tie-in to violence? While vehemently anti-choice rally goers are screaming complete lies about the heartbreak and tragedy of late term abortions, I fear, and, I think you should as well, that some less than stable individual will take the lies to heart and open fire on medical personnel in clinics or hospitals thinking he is saving the babies.

Make no mistake, these laws, draconian as they are, are not intended to become law. They have one purpose and that is to find the right test case so that the Supreme Court can, with its newfound justices, overturn *Roe v. Wade*. That is what the anti-choice extremists want. It's what they have always wanted. Not that it will end abortion – those have been happening since women could become pregnant. No, it will severely hamper access to safe and legal abortion, particularly for poorer woman.

When Margaret Atwood's novel, *The Handmaid's Tale*, became a popular TV show, I warned my daughter that extremists would begin using it as an instruction manual, rather than a cautionary tale. I usually enjoy being right. Not this time.

OK, Sisters, you know what to do. Get educated; learn the facts not the hype. Look in to how the entire abortion issue became a convenient wedge for political purposes. Write your representatives and those in other states as well. And, as always, make good choices when you vote.

Las Distinguidas

Congratulations to our Greater Whittier Area-American Association of University Women's 2019 Las Distinguidas honorees. These three remarkable women were honored and presented at the Branch luncheon on Saturday, April 13th. Please see a synopsis of the presentation.



Presbyterian Intercommunity Hospital Health Volunteer Service nominated **Deborah Garza**, where she has volunteered for 10 years. She interviews volunteers and is a New Volunteer Orientation Instructor. Through her collaboration with PIH Health Volunteer Services and the Education Department, some of PIH Health employees are directly benefitting from her volunteer service.

After graduating from California State University of Fullerton with a degree in Sociology, Deborah taught at the Whittier Adult School and also taught 20 years in the Norwalk-La Mirada School District. After completing her Masters degree in School Management at University of La Verne, she became a principal at Lake Marie Elementary School in the South Whittier Elementary School District. Deborah is currently retired but you certainly wouldn't know it.

In 2011, Deborah taught a Vocational English class for Spanish speaking PIH employees contracted through Whittier Union High School District. After teaching the class for 7 years, she learned the funding was no longer available, and she approached the

Volunteer Services with the idea of continuing the class and serving as a volunteer instructor. Many employees have benefitted through the curriculum, lessons, and classes Deborah developed and taught. The class has been beneficial to the employees and PIH Health. With enhanced communication skills, employees are better able to understand their assignments, and the communication with their supervisors, fellow employees and patients improves. Productivity increases and employees become more promotable.

Deborah currently is serving as the 3rd year president of Meals on Wheels in La Mirada.



Kaye Kidwell was nominated by GWA-AAUW. Growing up in Klamath Falls, OR, Kaye graduated from the University of Oregon with a major in Journalism and was tapped for Phi Beta Kappa at graduation. She received a teaching assistantship for graduate school and was on the University faculty for a couple of years before moving to Seattle, WA.

After JFK encouraged young people to serve their country, Kaye entered Federal Service. Her 6-month job turned into a 30-year career, with the Department of Health, Education & Welfare (now known as Health & Human Services). She served as an Indian Officer working on reservations and with the urban social service in WA. Kaye was the point person for 11 agencies to help

the Dept. of Defense regarding military construction funds for the Trident submarine base. Kaye spent 20 years evaluating programs such as Medicare reimbursement for a number of varied services. These assignments took

her all over the world. The last 13 years of her Federal career were spent as the Regional Inspector General headquartered in San Francisco, combating fraud, waste, and abuse & saving taxpayers money.

When Kaye retired, she moved to Whittier to be close to her family. An active member of Plymouth Church, Kaye has served as Trustee for 5 years, chaired the pre-school care advisory committee, taught financial management to young adults and been a member of the Bell Choir. Additionally, she is a member of Philanthropic Educational Organization (PEO) and has served as its Treasurer for 6 years, and is active in the Whittier Republican Women Federated also serving as Treasurer and voter volunteer.

Kaye's special accomplishments in GWA-AAUW include her tireless work on the articles of Incorporation for GWA-AAUW and serving numerous Board positions including Membership, Tech Trek & MLSF Treasurer, Recording Secretary and serving as President for two separate terms.



Ruri ‘Peanuts’ Pierre was nominated by SOLA (Special Olympics Los Angeles) Lions Club where she has volunteered for 10 years. SOLA's mission is to help provide sports and training programs for any individuals with intellectual disabilities and thereby improve the lives of everyone they touch. Ruri graduated from California State University in Fresno, earning a B.S. in Recreational Therapy and began her career working with individuals with special needs. The Fresno/Madera Arc that provides individuals with intellectual or developmental disability the opportunity to succeed in a supportive environment hired her. In 1978, Ruri moved to San Diego and worked with developmentally disabled adults at the San Diego Arc and was instrumental in coordinating a statewide Special Olympics Floor Hockey competition with the San Diego Special Olympics Area that grew from 6 teams to 60 teams by 1980. After moving to Azusa in 1981, Ruri worked as Recreational Therapist in a skilled nursing facility with non-ambulatory developmentally disabled individuals. She added several new programs including Special Olympics. During this time, Ruri began working part time for the City of Whittier Parks, Recreation and Community

Services. In 1984, Ruri was hired full-time with the City of Whittier as Community Services Supervisor of the Therapeutic Recreation Program that provided recreational and social opportunities for developmentally disabled teens and adults. For over 35 years, Ruri has volunteered and coached individuals with developmental disabilities for Special Olympics and helped to establish Special Olympic Los Angeles (SOLA) where she is a Charter Member. Ruri served as vice presidents in 2017 and 2018 and will be named president in July of this year.

In addition, Ruri has served as a member of California Parks and Receptions Society, Women in Leisure Services (received the President's Service Award), Whittier Coordinating Council (Interagency Youth Committee), Whittier Area Parents Assoc. for the Developmentally Disabled, TAPER (Teen Pregnancy Epidemic Reduction). She serves as a Board member of SKILLS (Supporting Kids in Learning Living Successfully), REACH (Resource, Education, Advocacy and Housing) for adults with special needs, and volunteers with HOSPICE. Ruri received the "Women of the Year" award presented by Assemblyman Ian Calderon.

As you can see, 2019's Las Distinguidas Honorees are truly women who have had a powerful impact, both in their chosen fields of work and in their chosen areas of volunteering. Congratulations Deborah, Kaye, and Ruri.

Myra Long Scholarship

The Myra Long Scholarship Committee, consisting of Ann Chambers, Dolores Gonzalez-Hayes, Helen Jewell and Carole Restovich, is pleased to share with you a bit about each of our three 2019 Myra Long Scholarship recipients: Angelica De Leon, Samantha Gutierrez and Linda Martinez. They are all recent graduates of Rio Hondo Community College and are excited about their new adventures in education come this fall.

Angelica De Leon is planning to attend the University of California at Irvine with a major in Chicano Studies. She is the middle child of a family of seven. Three of her siblings will graduate from college this spring. At times, she has doubted herself especially after being severely impacted by the abusive relationship one of her sisters endured. But, through support of her hard-working parents, college professors and counselors, she has forged on and is determined to pursue a career in helping students attain higher education. “Community is something that I value greatly and I believe it is our duty to watch out for and help one another.”

Linda Martinez is a single mother of two, one of whom is 13 and lives at home. Linda will attend Cal State University at Los Angeles with a major in sociology. She is a survivor of domestic abuse, both from a partner 7

and in her home life growing up. She stayed in the personal relationship due to economic insecurities and the lack of an education, which prevented her from receiving pay high enough to support her daughters. She has faced homelessness. Having left high school without a degree, she later completed her high school education because “I would never be able to tell my daughters to finish high school, if I had not finished it myself.” After participating in a domestic violence support group, she was encouraged to attend college. Again, she thought “If I want my daughters to attend college one day, I need to put myself through college.” Government assistance, which she used to be ashamed to mention, has helped her attain her goal thus far.

Samantha Gutierrez is a single mother of two young boys and is heading for Cal State University at Fullerton to study nursing. “I am a role model for my boys and I am blessed to be able to guide them and still make it to college without family or a spouse to sometimes help us.” She intends to pursue a master’s degree in nursing after graduating from Fullerton. Samantha went through the Fire Academy at Rio Hondo, but never received a job interview. She was told that it was probably because she had two young children. At one point in her Rio Hondo career, her car broke down and she dropped two classes since she had to take six buses daily to drop her boys at day care and then continue on to college. Despite a number of setbacks, Samantha has persevered, especially for the sake of her boys. “College is an opportunity, but my kids are my priority.”

We salute these women who have often faced major obstacles in pursuing their education, but who continue to work toward their goal of attaining a Bachelor’s Degree.
