

PUBLIC POLICY

Educators often spend a little time reviewing basics after summer recess. I thought I might do the same. For AAUW members, Public Policy is critical. As our national website states: "AAUW's policy work connects and rallies advocates at the local, state, national, and global levels to empower women and girls. With the member-voted <u>Public Policy Priorities</u> as our guide, AAUW uses lobbying and grassroots efforts to push forward policies that break through educational and economic barriers for women."

As we are approaching the more than year-long upcoming campaign season, we should think carefully about our AAUW priorities and public policy stances, about how important they are to us personally and where they fit in our value system and evaluate all of the candidates on their stances regarding them.

From an AAUW perspective the most important policies fall into four categories: Civil Rights, Education, Economic Security and Title IX. Throughout the year we will explore different issues within those categories. For a start, let's talk about health care – one of the most critical issues for women. We cannot pursue educational advancement and a better life for our families if we cannot afford basic healthcare for them and ourselves. Here are some interesting statistics from the national website:

The implementation of the ACA (Affordable Healthcare Act) has begun to make significant progress in reducing the number of uninsured Americans.

- In 2009, <u>50.7 million Americans</u> were uninsured—nearly 17 percent of the nation.
- In 2015, the uninsured rate hit a historic low; only <u>9.1 percent of Americans</u> remain uninsured.
- The ACA is making progress in reducing ethnic disparities in health care access, with <u>5.2</u> percent more young women, <u>5.1 percent</u> more black women, and <u>6.5 percent</u> more Hispanic women gaining access to a regular source of care.

I urge you to look at the website and see the particulars of how the Affordable Care Act has impacted women and imagine the consequences of its repeal. Also look at the Medicare and Privitization sections to get a better understanding of why attempts to weaken Medicare and permit privatization through block grants could have potentially draconian impacts on all of us.

Going forward this year, I would like to make this column more interactive. If you have a question or a different point of view, please share it with me and I will do my best to answer your question or concern.

Welcome back and here is to a wonderful 2019/20 AAUW Year.
