Greetings! Wishing you and your family a glorious holiday season. Our branch continues to support the mission of AAUW with our outstanding monthly meetings, programs and our Newsletter. We help shape the lives of the next generation of women through **Campus Initiatives** such as NCCWSL (National Conference for College Women Student Leaders). We fully sponsored a young woman from Whittier College to attend NCCWSL at the University of Maryland College Park in 2018 and again in 2019. We are leveling the playing field for women and girls in **STEM**. The Myra Long Scholarship Fund sponsors our Math/Science Conference and Tech Trek. We advocate for policies that advance equity. We provide **Educational Funding** for lifelong learning opportunities for women through the Myra Long Scholarship Fund which provides scholarships for women to pursue their higher education degrees. Lastly, the branch and individual members donate to the AAUW Fund to support National programs such as the American Fellowships, International Fellowships, Selected Professions, Career Development Grants, and the Community Action Grants.

Much has happened in planning future events. I submitted the Branch reservations for 8 girls to attend Tech Trek at Whittier College this summer. The MOU or Memo of Understanding which outlines the branches' responsibility for Tech Trek was submitted to Susan Negrete, State Tech Trek Coordinator, on November 7, 2019. PUBLIC POLICY

Bet you thought the Equal Rights Amendment (ERA) was dead and buried like some psychedelic dream from the 1970s. Well, maybe it is, but then again, maybe not. Here's why.

First, what is the ERA? It is a very simple amendment that states "Equality of rights under the law shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State on account of sex"—Simple enough, and for 20 years prior both parties had advocated for it. When Congress proposed the amendment in 1972, the resolution said it would become effective if approved by three-quarters of state legislatures "within seven years."

Unfortunately, the nascent religious right mobilized against it and the effort stalled at 35 states ratifying (it needs 38). It stayed stalled even though Congress extended the deadline to 1982. However, supporters developed a 3-part approach: Pass the resolution in 3 of the 15 states that haven't done so; Get Congress to extend the deadline and then start fighting to get it approved. Guaranteed, there will be court challenges and heaven know what else. However, there is still a chance.

Nevada (yeah!) and Illinois have ratified the ERA; Virginia very well may. The results of the 2019 elections bode well. If Virginia doesn't pan out, then supporters will concentrate on Arizona and North Carolina. There is an excellent article about all of this in the January 2019 issue of *The Atlantic*.

Why do we still need it; don't we have a 14th Amendment? The 14th amendment guarantees equal rights to all men. As crazy as it sounds, women's rights can still be abrogated by states or courts. From the AAUW website: "The lack of constitutional equality reaches every aspect of women's lives. The ERA would clarify, once and for all, that sex discrimination in employment, reproductive rights, insurance, Social Security, education, and more is a violation of our constitutional rights as Americans. The ERA provides the opportunity to seek legal recourse when an individual faces sex discrimination." AAUW supports passage of the Equal Rights Amendment.

So, if you have friends or colleagues in Virginia, start calling. It's OK to write letters to out-of-state legislators as well. We need to do everything we can to protect and ensure the right of all women. Keep your eye on this one, Ladies.

In an audacious attack, the London to Birmingham mail train is robbed and derailed, causing many casualties. Planned with military precision, this crime proves a challenge to Detective Inspector Robert Colbeck who fights to untangle a web of murder, blackmail and destruction.

As Colbeck closes in on the criminal masterminds, events take an unexpected turn when the beautiful Madeleine, daughter of the injured train driver, becomes a pawn in the criminals' game. With time running out, good and evil, new and old, battle against each other. But will the long arm of the law have speed on its side?

The Railway Detective is an action-packed dip into murky 1850s London. Full of historical detail, unexpected twists and memorable characters, this is a mystery that will surprise you at every turn.

We will start the year by reading *Where the Crawdads Sing*, by Delia Owens. Although this is the author's first novel, she long ago distinguished herself as a gifted writer. In the mid-80s, Owens co-wrote with her husband *Cry of the Kalahari*, which was a best-selling, nonfictional account of traveling and researching Africa's Kalahari Desert. One of the joys of that book was the Owens' description of the natural world, and *Where the Crawdads Sing* is immersed in the natural world as well. The story is set in the 1950s and revolves around a young woman named Kya Clark, who is from extremely rural North Carolina. Known by others as the Marsh Girl, she lives alone in nature - but the draw of other people, and specifically love, brings her into contact with the greater world. This novel has a mystery at its core, but it can be read on a variety of levels. There is great nature writing; there is coming of age; and there is literature. *Crawdads* is a story lovingly told—one that takes its time in developing its characters and setting and in developing the story.
