PUBLIC POLICY

Just as I was thinking about a topic for this month's Public Policy article, an email arrived from AAUW Executive Officer, Kim Churches, on the topic of the Equal Rights Amendment. If you recall, I wrote about this a few months ago. Kim's note was dated 2/13/20 and stated:

Yesterday I had the honor of joining Speaker Nancy Pelosi and other distinguished members of Congress to call for the full ratification of the Equal Rights Amendment. With the powerful work of our members in Nevada, Illinois and Virginia over the last few years, we've reached the tipping point – 38 states have ratified the ERA! Now it's time for Congress to act and lift the deadline for ratification.

Today, the full House of Representatives will vote to lift the arbitrary deadline to ratify the ERA. Your representative needs to hear from you. <u>Urge them to vote YES on H.J.</u> <u>Resolution 79.</u>

The text of the ERA is simple: "Equality of rights under the law shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any state on account of sex." But the impact would be enormous: The ERA would clarify that sex discrimination – whether in employment, health insurance, Social Security, education, or elsewhere – is a violation of our constitutional rights as Americans. Women in the United States won't wait any longer for the ERA to be fully ratified. We

must act now. Tell your representative to vote YES on H.J. Resolution 79.

Well, they did, and the bill passed along a mostly party line vote. Now it is in the hands of the Senate and it will NOT be easy. Senate Majority Leader McConnell is not a supporter and even Ruth Bader Ginsburg thinks we should start from scratch. Her reasoning is along the lines of if states are allowed to approve after the deadline, what about States who want to rescind their approval (there are five: Kentucky, Nebraska, Tennessee, South Dakota and Idaho).

Additionally, there is rumbling that this will get tied up in the abortion debate. Conservatives fear that the ERA would enshrine abortion rights in the Constitution, though how, exactly is not clear. To quote Bette Davis in *All About Eve*, "Fasten your seat belts. It's going to be a bumpy ride."

I know most of us are at an age where we thought we had fought the battles for our daughters and granddaughters. Apparently not. I don't know about you, but I'm getting tired of fighting the same wars. I'll keep you posted on the progress.

AAUW FUND

Welcome, Ladies, to the "luckiest" month of the year. This month of March we celebrate St. Patrick's Day! Isn't that the day we all feel a wee bit Irish! **** Two other special days occur in March: (1) Daylight Savings time commences on Sunday, March 8. Whoopee do! We have an extra hour of sunlight at the end of the day! 😇 (2) spring begins on March 19, the very day the swallows are due back at Mission San Juan Capistrano!

In the California legislative session for 2019, AAUW demonstrated it has significant clout because of your support. Such bills that affected women's issues that were passed were: AB(Assembly Bill) 9, 51, 170, 218, 381, 443, 543, 749, 809 and 922. Then there was SB (Senate Bill) 24 and 142, totaling 12 bills altogether. Now that is a lot of legislation to solicit support for and then to carefully and persistently follow through the legislative processes. It's somewhat like attentively following a pregnancy. And that was done for each of the bills listed above. Quite a task! And this accomplishment was all thanks to the AAUW California Public Policy Commission along with our Legislative Advocate, Shannon Smith-Crowley, and again your support!

However, SB 171 that would have required payroll data to be broken down by gender, race, ethnicity and job category with this information being reported to state agencies is to be continued into the next legislative session. That is a way of saving a bill by making it a two-year bill. This is an important bill as it will allow state agencies to note patterns of wage disparities, thus allowing enforcement of California's equal pay laws.

Another two-year bill is SB 493 which would have commenced a process for higher education institutions to prevent, respond and investigate sexual harassment claims along with implementing procedural protections. This bill also requires the instruction for employees engaged in the grievance processes to be aware of trauma-informed best practices as well as being trained on implicit bias.

Together we are a "mighty" force advocating for women's issues!

MATH/SCIENCE CONFERENCE FOR 8TH GRADE GIRLS

Whittier College was again the site of our 27th Math/Science Conference for 8th Grade Girls. We welcomed 372 students and 28 advisers to Shannon Center at 9:15 AM, on January 29, 2020. AAUW Branch President Rozanne Child oriented the attendees, and Eva Sevcikova, Vice President for Development for Whittier College, gave the keynote presentation.

The students and advisers were then given a snack on the way to the first of their three workshops. They heard six steam (science, technology, engineering, art, and mathematics) women in varied careers. The attendees then returned to their schools at 12:45 PM.

I want to thank the many branch member volunteers who helped make the conference such a success. It does take a team to have a conference run so smoothly. I am very grateful for your assistance. Our speakers are all volunteers also, and I did send thank you notes by snail mail to each of them.

The students and advisers are asked to complete an evaluation form which is collected at the end of the third workshop. There is a rating scale for each speaker and space for comments at the bottom of the page. Several students commented on their favorite speaker. Here is an example. "Every session was very interesting to learn about. My most favorite was Dr. Willner because I want to become a Midwife." Others were more general. "All the topics were interesting and I appreciate the amount of effort each presenter put in their lecture." "I enjoyed all the lectures so much! I learned so much and am so grateful for the chance to participate in this amazing conference!" This comment was sweet. "Encouraged me to pursue my future dreams." She then drew a small heart.

A very nice note was written by an 8th grade mathematics teacher from Granada Middle School, Mini Bajwa. "Thank you for giving girls this wonderful opportunity. It was during one of these conferences where my daughter, Alisha Bajwa, discovered a passion for science and medicine. Alisha is in her second year of residency at UCSF (Pediatrics)."
