PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



Our GWA AAUW Branch held their first meeting by ZOOM on Saturday, September 12, 2020, and it was wonderful. There were 29 attendees, and we celebrated our 95th birthday as an AAUW Branch. We heard from Ginny Ball about what is happening in Whittier; we passed a Branch budget for 2020-2021; we gave Named Gift Honoree certificates to Paula Ocampo and Rozanne Child, and we watched a PowerPoint presentation about our Branch Sections narrated by Ann Topjon. Our meeting concluded with a series of slides showing early Whittier and a history of our Branch which was put together by Susan Halliday. It was a very good meeting for our first try at a virtual meeting on ZOOM. Thank you to Patricia Cuocco and Susan Halliday for ironing out the technical details for us.

Our new Branch Yearbook is being distributed on several member porches this year. National AAUW and California AAUW have been offering some great webinars for us to watch. I recently participated in one titled "Archeology of the Self: Sustaining Racial Literacy in the Movement for Change." Dr. Yolanda Sealy-Ruiz was the speaker and she began with this definition. "Racial literacy asks that teachers take action against injustice in their school settings once they recognize it." We were encouraged to do a deep excavation and exploration of our beliefs, biases, and ideas that shape how we treat others regarding race. It was aimed especially at public school teachers who are 79% white and 76% female. The average age of public school teachers 42.4 years. The speaker stated that critical love – love that is tied to profound ethical commitment to caring for the communities in which we work – is essential. There are three things we need to do: "1) Question assumptions about race. 2) Engage members in critical conversations about race and speak openly. 3) Emphasize reflexivity and disrupt assumptions." I recommend these webinars to everyone.

PUBLIC POLICY

The Electoral College

As I write this, we are seven weeks out from the General Election. As you most likely remember from your U.S. History classes, the United States does NOT have direct election of the president. When you vote, per the 12th Amendment to the Constitution (1804), you are voting for a slate of electors committed to voting for a specific candidate on the designated date.

Why do we have such a system? For one thing, the Founding Fathers did not trust the people to vote for President. They preferred the election in the hands of "Enlightened Statesmen." For another, the system of slavery complicated the issue in that suffrage was greater in the Northern States because slaves had no rights, let alone the right to vote, and a large proportion of the South's population was comprised of enslaved people subject to the 3/5 Rule. Like much of the United States' founding rules, this issue was, at least in part, a compromise between "free" and "slave" states.

Why is this an issue? There is a concerted effort of the part of Progressives to abolish the Electoral College and an equally vigorous attempt by Conservatives to keep it. Since AAUW has not taken a policy position, I feel comfortable only in summarizing the major arguments (which I have taken from Wikipedia. I have left the annotations, it you are interested).

Supporters of the Electoral College argue that it is fundamental to American <u>federalism</u>, in that it increases the political influence of small states by the "plus two" Senate count over the number of state Representatives. The geographic dimension of the Electoral College requires candidates to appeal to voters outside large cities. Parties must form national coalitions with moderating appeals, contributing to stability of the two-party system.

Critics of the Electoral College argue that the Electoral College is less democratic than a national direct popular vote and is subject to manipulation because of <u>faithless electors</u>.^{[12][13]} Opponents argue that the system is antithetical to a democracy that strives for a standard of "<u>one person, one vote</u>" because it can thwart a presidential choice by the voters with a national majority.^[14] There can be elections where one candidate wins the popular vote but another wins the electoral vote, as in the <u>2016 election</u>.

It's worth noting that Five times a candidate has won the popular vote and lost the election. Andrew Jackson in 1824 (to John Quincy Adams); Samuel Tilden in 1876 (to Rutherford B. Hayes); Grover Cleveland in 1888 (to Benjamin Harrison); Al Gore in 2000 (to George W. Bush); Hillary Clinton in 2016 (to Donald J. Trump).

Like much in today's divided world, where you come down on the issue depends largely on your political point of view. Do you care whether candidates appeal to voters outside of the cities? Do you think geography is or should be totally irrelevant and every person's vote should count equally?

As I said, this paper does not take a position, because AAUW does not. I urge you to do some reading. Whatever side you are on, you can read supporting, and much more importantly, critical arguments of your point of view. Isn't that what educated women are supposed to do?

AAUW WEBINAR REPORT

AAUW WEBINAR: COVID 19 AND THE LABOR ECONOMY: WHAT'S NEW

As Sharon Heck mentioned in her President's Message, National AAUW has been offering many webinars on ZOOM on subjects vital to our organization with the advent of the pandemic. Members are notified via e-mail and it is easy to sign up for these free programs.

The one on September 9 was about the effect of Covid 19 on the Labor Economy and especially on women. It featured our President Kim Churches in conversation with Diane Lim, an economist and author of "Economist Mom Blog." She pointed out that this pandemic recession is a "She" session as opposed to the great recession which affected mostly middle aged white men in industry whose jobs did not come back. Women did better then because they were service providers and thus had lower unemployment.

The present pandemic has affected service providers in jobs mostly held by women, especially those earning lower incomes and less well educated. The recovery will be different now especially because school aged children are at home and whether women work or not will depend on their family situation. Asian women will have higher unemployment rate because they are unlikely to leave the supervision of their children's education to others.

She believes that there has to be more value put on care givers and that government has to fill the gap. She notes that the pandemic has given more appreciation to the stresses of working mothers.

Members can access any of the AAUW webinars about a week after shown by accessing the aauw.org website. I urge our members to either watch them live or recorded in order to take advantage of all that AAUW has to offer us nationally.
