# **PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE**

We had an outstanding Branch meeting on ZOOM February 13, to commemorate Black History Month. The speakers were so excellent as they shared their experiences growing up, being educated, and being employed as African American females. We owe a debt of gratitude to Laura Guillory, Shonda Buchanan, and Dr. Linda Oubre. They were so open in sharing their lives and experiences; we learned a great deal.

National AAUW Board has increased their per member dues by \$3.00 for the coming year. They have reduced staff and cut other expenses, but there is still need of more revenue. They have a large endowment, but it is designated for grants and other purposes and cannot be used for their everyday expenses. We will be passing this \$3.00 increase on to each of you. Our Branch dues and the California State dues will remain the same, so dues for 2021-2022 will be \$106. Our treasurer, Kay Clark, will be accepting your checks after March 15, or you may pay online at the AAUW.org website.

The National AAUW Board has proposed a change to the Bylaws of the organization. They wish to remove the requirement that you have a degree in order to be a member of AAUW. Some of the reasoning given is that it is the right thing to do. We are excluding women without degrees and this makes us an exclusive organization. AAUW has been denied grants because of the degree requirement for all members. This decision requires a vote of the membership which will be held online between April 7 and May 17, 2021. Watch for more information about this vote in our April newsletter.

A nominating committee has been formed for the Branch. For 2021-2022 several positions need to be filled, so if someone calls you, please give thoughtful consideration to serving our AAUW Branch. We have a wonderful group of women in our Greater Whittier Area Branch of AAUW. I have thoroughly enjoyed serving with them, even in this year of the pandemic, and look forward to continue serving on the Board as Past President. ### **Public Policy News from National**

On February 2, 2021, my co-chair Sue Miller and I met via ZOOM with AAUW Public Policy Director Kate Nielsen and her assistant Robin Lucas, along with state public policy chairs across the nation, to get updates on changes to the public policy landscape with the a new administration and Congress. Here is a summary of what we thought members would like to know:

- 1. AAUW Public Policy team sends notice of our priorities for the new year
  - a. Letter to the President, focused on
    - i. Women's Economic Security
    - ii. Education Access
  - b. Letter to 117th Congress
    - i. Passing the Paycheck Fairness Act
    - ii. Passing the Equity in Education Act
  - c. Both found at aauw.org/resources/policy/documents
- 2. Also outlined Admin and Congressional Priorities
  - a. Biden-Harris in the  $1^{st} 2$  weeks 41 Exec orders
    - i. Covid, including student-debt relief and opening of schools
    - ii. Anti-discrimination, including removing barriers, DACA relief and a Task Force to reunite families
    - iii. Protecting women's health at home and abroad, including access to abortions
  - b. Coming Legislation from Congress
    - i. Covid relief 1.9 Trillion package
      - 1. Paid sick & family leave extended thru Sept (14 weeks)
      - 2. Increase min wage to \$15
      - 3. Assistance to those at risk of losing jobs &/or their homes
      - 4. \$3B to help women with food relief for their families
      - 5. \$25B emergency fund for child care providers

Our membership numbers have decreased slightly this year - a couple of women have moved out of the area and we sadly have had several deaths (Shirley Campbell, Rose Mary Yetter, and Kathy Luciano). We currently have 125 members listed: 103 members to 6/30/2021; 22 members Life Members.

We are looking at possibly having a Meet & Greet summer meeting. This would be an event to invite potential new members. The Meet & Greet will depend on the recommendations from the California Department of Public Health and Governor Newsom. We'll keep you posted.

The following is from the national AAUW Board of Directors, taken from AAUW.org website.

"The AAUW Board of Directors strongly supports elimination of the degree requirement for membership and will put the requirement up for a membership vote this spring. This important change is a critical step in bringing AAUW's bylaws and membership requirement in line with our mission of advancing equity for women and girls. While AAUW is fiercely committed to the educational attainment of all women, given our commitment to inclusion, this is simply the right thing to do.

"Proposals to eliminate the degree requirement for membership have come before the membership for vote a number of times. The Board feels very strongly that while the degree requirement made perfect sense at AAUW's inception, this requirement is now counter to our mission, and limits our ability to build the capacity needed to increase our impact as an organization.

Voting will open on April 7, 2021, and close May 17, 2021 5 PM ET."

"Some Talking Points for Elimination of the Membership Requirement.

- The reasons we should drop the education requirement are simply:
  - 1. Because it is the right thing to do
  - 2. Because it is in keeping with our mission to advance gender equity.
- Eliminating the degree requirement will bring AAUW membership criteria in line with its mission-to advance gender equity.
- Greater diversity can only strengthen AAUW and our ability to advance equity.
- Times have changed and society has changed. AAUW strives to meet our mission and society's needs today.
- AAUW empowers women. How does keeping the membership requirement help you empower women?
- Just like our founding mothers, we can be role models for positive change in the world. But we cannot have the impact we seek when our membership criteria don't match our mission and values.
- AAUW is unique due to our breadth of programming, research, policy and advocacy, fellowships & grants, and most importantly, a grassroots membership that can be mobilized to fight for what we believe in. We should open this powerful grassroots network up to all who want to join the fight.
- Education comes in many forms. Those who do not have degrees can still be strong advocates for our mission.

### **MLSF's ANONYMOUS ANGEL**

It is with a heavy heart and a lot of tears that I write this article. Leeba Lessin, my beloved friend and MLSF's **Anonymous Angel**, died on January 25, 2021 from leukemia.

Leeba was one of a kind: brilliant, inquisitive, loving, kind, humble, generous and a woman of profound faith. I first met Leeba at church and got to know her when I joined a Bible study group she led. She was a scholar, philosopher, teacher, leader, friend, helper, comforter, listener, world traveler and so much more. She left an incredible legacy, most of which no single person knows. She was a health care expert and visionary who impacted health care delivery systems nationally and served as Vice President of *PacifiCare* and Founder/President of *CareMore*. Many Whittierites knew her as the owner of *Aunties Café/Bakery, Lift Coffee Roasters and Four Bricks*. She was a lover of the arts and founded *ArtForms Whittier* in 2013. She also served on the *Los Angeles Master Chorale* board of directors.

Over the years, Leeba and I periodically met for breakfast or lunch to "catch up" and have some girl-time. In March 2017, I told her how MLSF funds scholarships and educational projects for women and girls and what we do to raise money to support these efforts. Leeba soon emailed me and offered to match the money we raised. She never wanted to draw attention to herself and asked for confidentiality and anonymity until "later." Thus, she became our **Anonymous Angel** who matched our fundraising efforts dollar-fordollar in 2017, 2018 and 2019.

Leeba was diagnosed with leukemia in May 2019. She fought and fought. We all prayed and prayed that the treatments and stem cell transplant would beat the dreaded disease. She received wonderful care at City of Hope, but leukemia won. We lost our precious Leeba.

## THE SPOTLIGHT

The Math-Science Conference for Eighth Grade Girls did not take place this year because of COVID-19. This is the first year since 1994, when I was president, it has not occurred. Did you notice?

I went to Minneapolis, Minnesota for the1993 National AAUW Convention. I sat down for coffee one morning and started talking to a woman. Since I was the incoming president, I asked about their special branch activities. That is when I learned about a Math-Science Conference. I thought it a terrific idea and brought it back to our Branch. I asked Ginny Ball and Dr. Ellen Larson to help me with speakers and middle schools. With info in the newsletter, there was an overwhelming response from the members to help. It was called "Potential Unlimited."

Our big problem was the venue, as Whittier College kept putting me on hold. Finally, as time was getting tight, I said I would contact Rio Hondo. Whittier said yes- finally. We could start to print information. In the beginning, we paid for lunches and snacks as well as made arrangements for buses to transport students and teachers. We had 218 students and 28 speakers with two in each room making three presentations. Sound familiar? Ginny came to my home and we brainstormed clever titles for the speakers. (A lot of work so the title idea was dropped.) Some of the professional women have returned many years. We had morning refreshments and members brought salads for a speaker luncheon. The speakers would not always be in the same groupings so it was fun to see them greet each other enthusiastically in following years. Ruth White introduced Dr. Dawn Terashita, LA County Epidemiologist, the first year she came and said, "I have to practice how to say that word." This year how many times with the pandemic have you heard the word epidemiologist?

After I retired, I returned to chair for about five years when we went to Rio Hondo because of construction at Whittier College.With a new venue, it was like starting all over again with the planning. Then one year, when sitting on the podium listening to the keynote speaker, the president turned to me and said we could not come back the next year because of future construction. So, we are now back where we started at Whittier College with much improved technology than from the '90's.

When I was chairing, I decided, since I like to make my choice of speakers, I would let the girls also. I promised one speaker choice but usually gave them two of their three choices. It takes a lot of sorting on a big dining room table to accomplish and I am ever so grateful to Sharon Heck, chair, who has continued doing this. Now she can probably computer sort number of room chairs with choices.

Why did I latch onto the M/S idea I heard over coffee? Well, I have a B.S. from the University of Minnesota, but the real reason is my high school chemistry teacher. He didn't think the four girls, in his chemistry class, should be there; he only thought boys should. He ignored us. Without my lab partner, Glenn, to help me figure out what was under the microscope I would have struggled.

So, Mr. Pulver, you have no idea how your treatment of four girls in the high school chemistry class was the impetus for the M/S Conference. It has allowed many eighth grade girls to hear amazing math, science, and technology speakers and help encourage their selection of classes in high school.

I wanted to pay tribute in this "Gap" year to all of our members who have chaired the conference and have helped with the many details since 1994. This has been a year of respite for the members. I hope that we will return strong in 2022 to have once again a fantastic Math-Science Conference.

She had just entered into hospice in mid, January, however had been on oxygen for the last number of years. Kathy will definitely be missed."



# **MORNING BOOK**

Join us in discussing *The Dutch House*, by Ann Patchett, on Monday, March 22, at 10 AM. It has been described as Ann Patchett's most powerful novel to date: a richly moving story that explores the indelible bond between two siblings, the house of their childhood, and a past that will not let them go. It's the story of a paradise lost, a tour de force that digs deeply into questions of inheritance, love and forgiveness, of how we want to see ourselves and of who we really are. At the end of the Second World War, Cyril Conroy combines luck and a single canny investment to begin an enormous real estate empire, propelling his family from poverty to enormous wealth. His first order of business is to buy the Dutch House, a lavish estate in the suburbs outside of Philadelphia. Meant as a surprise for his wife, the house sets in motion the undoing of everyone he loves. The story is told by Cyril's son Danny, as he and his older sister, the brilliantly acerbic and self-assured Maeve, are exiled from the house where they grew up, by their stepmother. The two wealthy siblings are thrown back into the poverty their parents had escaped from and find that all they have to count on is one another. It is this unshakeable bond between them that both saves their lives and thwarts their futures. Set over the course of five decades, **The Dutch House** is a dark fairy tale about two smart people who cannot overcome their past. Despite every outward sign of success, Danny and Maeve are only truly comfortable when they're together. Throughout their lives they return to the well-worn story of what they've lost with humor and rage. But when at last they're forced to confront the people who left them behind, the relationship between an indulged brother and his ever-protective sister is finally tested. Janice Geiger will lead our discussion.

We will be meeting again via ZOOM, and the invitation will be sent a few days prior to March 22.
