I am so happy to welcome everyone back to begin the 2021-2022 year with GWA-AAUW. I hope you have had a good summer break. By the end of June we had received the vaccine, stay-at-home orders had been lifted and many of us were able to travel a little and visit family. We are safer than before; however, there is currently an increasing trend in the Corona-19 delta virus. Currently, our ability to resume in-person branch meetings is uncertain. We have made plans for an in-person meeting in September, but it may have to be cancelled. You will be notified by September 1 whether the meeting will be in-person or by ZOOM.

A Day of Remembrance: Our next branch meeting will occur on September 11, 2021, the 20th anniversary of the terrorist attacks on our country. We cannot forget the tragedy of September 11, 2001. Following those events, "Americans came together to lift each other up, help communities heal and make our country stronger. September 11, the National Day of Service and Remembrance, pays tribute to those we lost. Since that day, millions have united to honor and commemorate September 11 through volunteer service (ssa.gov). Let this be a reminder in these new times of loss and division that we can pull together in common cause for the good of us all. One of the best ways to pull together is to exercise our right to vote. Please remember this during the upcoming California election on September 14, 2021, and do not neglect to vote.

June Meeting: At the June branch meeting, scholarships were presented to nine outstanding women, five from Rio Hondo College and four from California High School. Each scholars accepted her award with an inspirational story and much appreciation. Our scholarship program is gratifying for us and supports our mission as members of AAUW.

Sheryl Crockey and Barbara Gile installed the new officers for 2021-2022. I was pleased to be installed as president and announced a theme for this year, "Embracing One Another". In that spirit hopefully we can resume some in-person activities this year. However, even if we must continue remotely, I want to make sure we all feel connected and involved and support one another. I hope to encourage more participation in volunteering and will have a sign-up sheet at the meetings.

The new board met during the summer for an annual board retreat to plan for the coming year. Expect more great programs, membership outreach, and activities to further our mission. It is still uncertain whether many of our activities will be in-person again but stay flexible and we will keep you informed as conditions change. We did a great job last year staying connected remotely. If we need to meet on ZOOM again this year, consider inviting members who don't have computer access to join you in a small safe setting.

GWA-AAUW Business: The board reviewed and adopted two items for approval by membership. The first item is the 2021-2022 budget. The second item is a revision to the GWA-AAUW Standing Rules and Policies. The national dues were increased by AAUW last year and our standing rules need to reflect the change. You will receive a copy of the budget and revised standing rules for your review prior to the meeting. We will vote on both items at the September branch meeting.

AAUW News: AAUW board chair Julia Brown announced to members in July that CEO Kim Churches will step down this fall. The board and staff are sad to see Kim go but wish her well in her new role as president/CEO of the Washington Center. The board has a robust continuity plan in place and will meet to determine next steps shortly. Stay tuned for more information.

AAUW has announced a new Five-Star National Recognition Program for AAUW affiliates starting July 1, 2021. The Five-Star program is designed to help us focus on the AAUW mission and strategic plan. GWA-AAUW helped qualify AAUW California to earn Five-Star Recognition last year just doing what we always do including our scholarships and programs aligned to the national strategic plan. The board is reviewing the new plan and will keep you informed. Where it makes sense, we will roll out new activities and opportunities for members to participate.

AAUW FUND

What is the AAUW Fund? As you know AAUW is a national organization with headquarters in Washington, DC. There are also state organizations and, of course our local branch, The Greater Whittier Area AAUW. The national organization solicits and uses the AAUW Fund for its many projects, which will be detailed in our monthly newsletter articles. Our branch, of course, solicits contributions for local projects such as Tech Trek, Math/Science Conference, Local Scholarships, etc. through the Myra Long Scholarship Fund. We support both these funds and encourage our members to do so.

In the past members were encouraged by National to donate to specific areas; at this time, they encourage donations to the AAUW Greatest Needs Fund (9110). This gives them the flexibility to respond rapidly to new and emerging challenges facing women and girls and to use the gift where it's needed most. But members can choose to donate to the fund they wish, which include The Education and Training Fund (4450), Economic Security Fund (4449), and Leadership Fund (4452). All contributions are fully tax-deductible and can be made directly online at aauw.org/contribute or by check through our branch. Just to make things more interesting (!) AAUW Fund operates on a calendar year basis from January 1-December 31 unlike the rest of AAUW which is on an academic calendar year from July 1-June 30. So, if you wish to make your donation for tax purposes, the deadline this year is December 30. I promise to remind you of that frequently!

Meanwhile, we can look forward to the following AAUW Fund events this year:

- October 23 & 30, and November 6- Hear from among the 37 Fellows and Grant Recipients throughout the state on 3 different dates on ZOOM. This will take the place of the usual AAUW Fund Luncheon held throughout California in person. Details to access coming soon! (There will be different speakers at each event.)
- <u>November 13</u>- Our GWA Branch Program will feature **AAUW Fellow Yvonne Chang**, of the American Film Institute.
- May 14—AAUW Named Gift Honoree(s) from our branch announced at our Branch Meeting.

PUBLIC POLICY

Our AAUW Mission Statement reads as follows: To advance equity for women and girls through research, education, and advocacy. All of the statement is very important, but two words have great meaning for me, EQUITY and ADVOCACY.

Women have been fighting for equity all of lives for a very long time. There is a difference between equity and equality. Everyone could be given a regular two-wheel bicycle to ride and that would be equality. Instead, a senior person is given a large tricycle, a child is given a smaller bicycle, a tall man is given an extra-large bicycle, and a woman is given a regular bicycle; this is equity.

Equity in wages for women is a fight that AAUW champions with our elected officials and with employers. A research paper by AAUW examines how decades of systemic racism —including discriminatory employment practices, inadequate legal protections, and persistent stereotypes — have contributed to a gender pay gap that remains far wider for women of color than for white women. It takes the typical black woman 19 months to be paid what the average white man takes home in 12 months. Black Women's Equal Pay Day was marked recently on August 3, 2021. Over a 40-year career, black women lose almost \$1 million to the wage gap.

The U.S. Congress should pass the Paycheck Fairness Act, which would update and strengthen the Equal Pay Act of 1963; the Pay Equity for All Act, which would prohibit employers from using salary history to set pay; and the Fair Pay Act, which would require employers to provide equal pay for jobs of equivalent value to help reduce the impact of occupational segregation. Policymakers and employers must take the lead in closing the wage gap.

This leads me to my second word: advocacy. Advocacy is to plead the cause of another. We can do this in a great many ways as we try to influence decision makers. Visiting our elected officials and creating a relationship with their staff, is the best way to show your strong interest in particular legislation. Writing letters or emails is another good way. Send letters to District offices, because mail in Washington DC is delayed to check for anthrax.

AAUW provides a very easy way for you to be an advocate. Go on the website at AAUW.org, go to Public Policy, and sign-up for the Two-minute Activist. You will be notified when you need to sign on to a letter to our senators, or your representative concerning a topic close to our mission statement such as the pay gap. This is very easy to do and is very quick. I urge everyone to stay informed concerning equity, and to be an advocate for public policy.
