# **PUBLIC POLICY**

#### **CIVIL RIGHTS? MORE LIKE UNCIVIL WRONGS!**

To say this has not been a particularly good time for Civil Rights would be a vast understatement. Two bedrock AAUW priorities are very much under attack. The first is a woman's right to make her own reproductive choices and the second is the very right to vote, itself. Our AAUW website is quite clear on our beliefs and priorities on both issues:

"AAUW trusts that every woman has the ability to make her own informed choices regarding her reproductive life within the dictates of her own moral and religious beliefs. Further, AAUW believes that these deeply personal decisions should be made without government interference. AAUW members have made the protection of reproductive rights a policy principle since 1977."

"Because our democracy only works when everyone can fully participate. AAUW is committed to open and fair elections, nonpartisan voter education efforts that will promote equitable political participation and representation in appointed and elected office, and the expansion of voting rights."

The recently enacted, completely draconian, Fetal Heartbeat Act in Texas was constructed to delay judicial review by "deputizing" citizens to act instead of government officials. These same citizens can then gain monetarily for being vigilantes and bounty hunters. Add to this the myriad of bill enacted in gerrymandered state houses throughout the nation which seek to curtail, rather than expand, voting rights and you have a concerted effort to deny access to constitutional rights to women and minorities.

It is not likely that the actual constitution will be amended to suppress or deny voting rights, but, since the Voting Rights Act of 1965 (which, BTW, passed the Senate by 98-0) was gutted, states have been free to pass laws which have the effect of making it harder for people, particularly poor people, and people of color, to vote. In *Shelby County v. Holder*, a 5-4 SCOTUS majority mothballed the law's Section 5, which required states with a history of racial discrimination in voting to get certification in advance, or "pre-clearance," that any election change they wanted to make would not be discriminatory (Brennan Center for Justice).

It is also unlikely that many states with Progressive majorities will pass laws undermining the protections in Roe v. Wade, even if the Supreme Court overturns that precedent, which seems at least possible, now. This will result in "Abortion Tourism" or another way of saying that women of means will be able to exercise their rights and those less fortunate will be at the mercy of people who believe that their version of religion and morality must be the prevailing one. I don't know about you, but I am not seeing much difference between this point of view and the Taliban's.

When you curtail access to a civil liberty, you deny it. It really is that simple. If only those with means have access, then the civil right really does not exist. Urge your legislators to protect voting rights for all citizens and to ensure that women can always make their own decisions about their bodies.

# WRITING FOR THE NEWSLETTER

I thought I would review a few of our writing conventions and I'm putting it here, in the middle of the SECTIONS (an unexpected place), in the hopes that you will see it.

- The first time it appears in any article, please use the member's whole name.
- To designate time, we use 9 AM or 6:30 PM, not 10:00 a.m. or 7PM.
- Names of books are italicized and underlined. For example, T*he Grapes of Wrath* by John Steinbeck.
- ZOOM is ZOOM, not zoom or Zoom.
- Remember, if a quote ends a sentence, the ending period goes before the final quotation mark. For example: I have always believed that "forgiveness is easier to obtain than prior approval."
- Please, avoid contractions.
- Despite the Associated Press style sheet, we do not end sentences in prepositions, nor do we split infinitives. We write like the educated women (and men) that we are.
- Brevity is the soul of wit (per the Bard); it is also the soul of good writing.
- It is not always possible, but please minimize the use of the passive voice. For example: "The film was viewed by the members at the last meeting" is a passive construction. It is far crisper to write: "The members viewed the film at the last meeting."
