NOVEMBER 13 BRANCH MEETING SPEAKER

Yvonne Zhang, AAUW Fund International Fellowship Winner

We are fortunate to have as our speaker for our November 13th branch meeting, Yvonne Zhang, a recipient of the AAUW Fund International Fellowship for 2020-21.

Yvonne is an artist and filmmaker based in Los Angeles and Glasgow, Scotland. She is currently a Directing Fellow at the American Film Institute Conservatory, having received funding and support from Fulbright, BAFTA Los Angeles, American Association for University Women, P.E.O. International and AFI.

Yvonne was raised by a fiery single mother in a post-industrial, working-class district of London made up primarily of immigrant communities. Her work focuses on the diasporic experience, exploring the ways in which race and migration shape identity, belonging and power. Her goal is to create modern myths and folktales for immigrants, often combining live action and animation to tread the line between social realism, visual poetry, and dream logic.

Yvonne's work finds hope in our often alienating, fractured and globalized world in fleeting moments of human connection. She believes there to be power and grace in the smallest acts of care—and it is this belief that forms the foundation of her stories.

She holds a Foundation in Fine Art from Central St. Martins School of Art and Design, and a bachelor's degree in English Literature from the University of Edinburgh. She has exhibited at several film festivals and has won numerous prizes and awards.

AAUW FUND

Each year AAUW selects outstanding scholars and activists to receive Fellowships and Grants. You may have been able to attend one or more of the AAUW Fund Events that were held by Zoom on October 23 or 30 to hear some of the 37 winners from California this year. You may still have time to register for the one on November 7 by going to our October Newsletter or to aauw.org. Our speaker this month, Yvonne Zhang, was one of the recipients of the International Fellowship for 2020-21.

We hear about the different kinds of fellowships and grants that are awarded, but perhaps you are not aware of the specific requirements and amounts that are available. Below is the information. Most of the deadlines are in November or December—so think ahead for next year to notify those you know who may be eligible, or for our own members who may seek a grant. Complete details are available at aauw.org. This is a summary of what is available each year:

American Fellowships: \$6,000-30,000 (Deadline November 1)

Given for those completing their dissertation or doing post-doctoral research.

<u>Career Development Grants</u>: \$2,000-\$12,000 (Deadline November 15)

Those with a BA or BS who wish to advance or change careers. Primarily given to women of color.

Community Action Grants: \$3,000-\$10,000 (Deadline December 1)

Given to individuals, AAUW branches or community-based non-profits that promote education and equity to encourage girls to select physical science or engineering courses. (Long Beach AAUW Branch won this award last year.)

International Fellowships: \$18,000-\$30,000 (Deadline November 15)

Given to full time students in U.S. for women who are not U.S. Citizens or permanent residents.

International Project Grants-: \$5.000-\$7,000 (Deadline November 1)

For International Fellows who have returned home to their native countries.

Research Publication Grants in Engineering, Medicine and Science: \$10,000-\$35,000 (Deadline Dec. 1)

For women with Ph.Ds. in these fields.

PUBLIC POLICY

Our Public Policy article this month comes courtesy of Kathi Harper, Co-Chair of Public Policy at AAUW-CA:

Abortion Justice

Although the constitutionally guaranteed right to an abortion has been systematically under attack for decades, it is currently in danger of disappearing altogether. As AAUW National recently noted, "Every person should have the ability to make their own informed decisions regarding their reproductive life. It is beyond time for abortion to be secured legally, funded fully, and equitably available for all who need it, when they need it, without shame or stigma." With the recent refusal of the U.S. Supreme Court to intervene in the onerous Texas case, it is clear that we can no longer count on the courts to protect this critical right. Congress must pass the Women's Health Protection Act. Watch for Action Alerts from National, use them to keep pressure on your representatives, and sign-up now for the 2-Minute Activist if you haven't already done so by clicking here https://www.aauw.org/act/two-minute-activist/.

Be sure to let us know if members from your branch participated in the Rally for Abortion Justice on October 2nd, along with Beach Cities, Palos Verdes, San Fernando Valley, Pasadena, Alameda, Carlsbad-Oceanside-Vista, Los Altos-Mt. View, San Jose and Morgan Hill, and send pictures if you have them to publicpolicy@aauw-ca.org.

Legislative Updates

Our last five priority bills that were awaiting the Governor's signature have been acted on, here are the results:

SB 62 (requires fair pay, instead of "by the piece" payment, for garment workers) **SIGNED**AB 367 (free menstrual products must be provided in girls/women's bathrooms in schools) **SIGNED**AB 887 (allows domestic violence restraining orders to be filed electronically) **SIGNED**AB 123 (increases paid family leave benefits to 65 – 75% of regular pay) **VETOED**AB 1074 (requires hotel and janitorial workers who have lost their jobs due the pandemic to be prioritized for hiring as businesses reopen) **VETOED**

Economic Equity

October 21st is Latina Equal Pay Day – the day Latina women, who are paid just 57 cents to every white male's dollar, finally catch up from the previous year. To help raise awareness, our coalition partner Stronger California is hosting a Latina Equal Pay Day & Essential Women Workers Virtual Summit. THE HODGE FOUNDATION

The members of the Greater Whittier Area AAUW honor our members who have passed away by donating \$50 to the Hodge Foundation of the Whittier Public Library, or to the local library of members who do not reside in Whittier. Since most of our members do reside in Whittier, we wanted to share more information about the Hodge Foundation and about recent donations.

The mission of the Hodge Foundation as explained by the Whittier Public Library is that "it is a public endowment fund whose income is dedicated to supplementing the library's budget for books and other printed materials.

The Hodge Foundation was created in 1966 by Marian Hodge in honor of her late husband, Vernon. Both Marian and Vernon Hodge were educators. In 1941 she was appointed superintendent of the Whittier Union High School district, the first woman to head a school district in California.

A memorial donation to the 'The Hodge' has become a popular way to pay lasting tribute to a loved one. If the Donation is \$50 or more, the library may buy a book in a field of the donor's choosing. The book is added to the collection with a bookplate bearing the name of the person being honored."

"This novel features an amateur sleuth, the twelfth-century Benedictine monk Brother Cadfael. Unrivaled in contemporary crime writing for both sagacity and grace, Cadfael, a former Crusader and man of the world, has settled into the monastic life as an accomplished herbalist whose lively intelligence and keen powers of observation help him solve an array of crimes in the town of Shrewsbury, England. *A Morbid Taste for Bones*, the first Brother Cadfael mystery (1977) unfolds around his abbey's mission to recover an obscure relic, the bones of St. Winifred. Someone is willing to kill to keep the relic where it is, and Brother Cadfael must set some clever traps to eventually get all the bones--and bodies—into the right places."

Set in the 1950s during the holiday rush, this novel focuses on four saleswomen, uniformed in professional garb of stylish black, who staff Ladies Dresses at Goode's Department Store in Sydney, Australia. The women are glamorous Magda, a Slovenian émigré who runs the highend gowns department; Patty, who longs for a child and a revived marriage; Fay, who dreams of marriage; and Lisa, the shy teen whose life is changed by these women. This pitch-perfect comedy of manners is set during a pivotal era when Sydney is on the cusp of modern promise, and it is a testament to the timeless importance of female friendship. Susan Coll of the NYT Book Review wrote, "Laced with a fierce intelligence that captures the limited options for women and postwar xenophobia views, it's also a love letter to department stores of yore." Hilary Mantel calls this "the book I most often give as a gift to cheer people up," and Maureen Corrigan included it in her NPR Fresh Air report on books that offer solace in troubled times. Gwen Woirhaye will lead our discussion.


