Inspired by hearing from AAUW Fund Fellow Yvonne Zhang at our November Branch Meeting, I undertook some research into former Fellows who have achieved prominence in their fields after receiving this award. We all know of probably the most famous former fellow, Scientist Marie Curie. But there are many others so here are just a few:

#### **Tererai Trent**

Tererai Trent, Ph.D., is one of today's most internationally recognized voices for women's education and empowerment. Distinguished as Oprah Winfrey's "All-Time Favorite Guest," Trent is a scholar, humanitarian, motivational speaker, educator, author, and founder of Tererai Trent International, whose mission is to provide quality education in rural Africa. She received a 2001–02 AAUW International Fellowship.

#### **Faith Ringgold**

Faith Ringgold, internationally renowned artist, educator, and social activist, has used her art to draw attention to racism and gender inequality. She is best known for her story quilts — painted narratives on fabric. Her work has been exhibited all over the world and in the permanent collections of the Solomon R. Guggenheim Museum, the Metropolitan Museum of Art, and the Museum of Modern Art. She received the 1976–77 AAUW Creative Arts Award, given in conjunction with the National Endowment for the Arts.

#### **Melissa Harris-Perry**

Melissa Harris-Perry is an award-winning author, expert news commentator and professor of politics and international affairs at Wake Forest University. Her books have earned national acclaim, including the 2005 W.E.B. DuBois Book Award and the Best Book Award from the Race and Ethnic Politics Section of the American Political Science Association. Harris-Perry was a 2001–02 AAUW American Fellow.

# **PUBLIC POLICY**

#### Status of the Equal Rights Amendment

"Equality of rights under the law shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any state on account of sex."

That is it! That is the full text of the proposed Equal Rights Amendment to the Constitution. Part of the reason for the lack of passage is that many Americans think that equality of the sexes is already guaranteed in the Constitution. It is NOT. Whatever progress has been made on gender equality in our country is a hodgepodge of federal and state legislation, any of which can be overturned without the full protection a constitutional amendment provides.

Let me provide a brief overview of how the process towards true equality has played out.

- It's been **101 years** since the 19th Amendment granted women the right to vote.
- It's been 98 years since the Equal Rights Amendment was first introduced in Congress.
- It's been 49 years since the ERA was passed by Congress.
- And it's been more than **one year** since the ERA was ratified by the required 38 states.

The ERA is still not part of the Constitution because of an ambiguous and legally questionable deadline imposed at the beginning of the process, per the League of Women Voters. However, on March 17, 2021, the House of Representatives voted, with bipartisan support, to remove the deadline for ratification of the Equal Rights Amendment. This critical resolution moved to the Senate and is awaiting approval.

Even though the Constitution does not give any power to the Executive Branch during the amendment process, the Trump Administration improperly weighed in on the merits of what is still pending congressional action. That is why the ERA Coalition and others are petitioning the Biden Administration to undue this overreach.

AAUW is clearly and forcefully behind efforts to move the ERA to a constitutional amendment. The action you can take is to call or write your Senators about the importance of this issue. Letters to the Editor and taking action to sign petitions are all good ideas. We really cannot wait another century for true equality.

As the November 8, 2018 Paradise Camp Fire anniversary nears, those of us who received so much help from AAUW members in California and elsewhere, want to give an update and renew our thanks.

One small plea posted on the AAUW California website and a few emails asking for help brought tens of thousands of dollars in gift cards, offers of housing, furniture, and, in the case of a member who couldn't get her garage door open and had no replacement insurance—a car.

The Paradise board, all of whom (except yours truly) lost everything, gathered frequently to sort mail and distribute the contributions to 35 of our 40 members. After their needs were fulfilled, we gave cards and checks to our Tech Trek families, most of whom also lost everything and often had fewer resources. We offered gas money to the son of Suzy and Paul Ernst, the couple who were trapped by the fire and spent many months in the U.C. Davis Burn Center. There were so many ways everyone's contributions helped.

# **MORNING BOOK**



We will not meet in December.

We start the new year by reading <u>Olive Kitteridge</u>, by Elizabeth Strout. At times stern, at other times perceptive, at other times in sad denial, Olive Kitteridge, a retired schoolteacher, deplores the changes in her little town of Crosby, Maine, and in the world at large, but she doesn't always recognize the changes in those around her: a lounge musician haunted by a past romance; a former student who has lost the will to live; Olive's own adult child, who feels tyrannized by her irrational sensitivities; and her husband, Henry, who finds his loyalty to his marriage both a blessing and a curse. As the townspeople grapple with their problems, mild and dire, Olive is brought to a deeper understanding of herself and her life, sometimes painfully, but always with ruthless honesty.

<u>Olive Kitteridge</u> offers profound insights into the human condition- its conflicts, tragedies and joys, and the endurance it requires. Winner of the Pulitzer Prize, the story "animates the ordinary with astonishing force... [The author] makes us experience not only the terrors of change but also the terrifying hope that change can bring: she plunges us into these churning waters and we come up grasping for air."
