#### Whittier Women You Will Want to Know

Our February program will feature one of Whittier's own historians, Tracy Wittman. Wittman will be speaking about two Historic Whittier women: Rebecca Bailey and Harriet Russell Strong. Bailey was one of the Quaker pioneers and was a typical woman of her time. Strong, on the other hand, was a most remarkable woman of her time (1844-1926), and would be notable in any time as a social activist, inventor, businesswoman and conservationist.. It will, no doubt, be an enlightening talk!

Wittman, a fourth generation Whittierite, was born in Whittier and has resided in Whittier for most of her life. She likes to describe her working life as a career in three parts. After receiving her BS from UCLA, she worked as an engineer at Rockwell and Boeing for seventeen years where she had the privilege of working on the Space Shuttle program. Her second career was as a homeschool mom, teaching her daughter from first to twelfth grade. Now retired, Wittman leads an active life in the Whittier community as a volunteer. She serves on the board of the Whittier Historical Society and enjoys writing about local history and curating exhibits. Wittman is also a docent at the Bailey House and leads tours in the local hills with Habitat Authority. She is married to Dave Wittman, a Boeing engineer, and has one daughter, Sydney.


A list of past awardees is in the branch yearbook on pages 24-28. Generally, we give the award to someone who has not received it previously.

### PUBLIC POLICY Voting Rights Imperiled

This is a hard day to be writing a Public Policy piece. As I sit at my computer, it is Martin Luther King Day – a day when we should be embracing diversity and how far we have come in protecting Civil Rights for all people. Yet, everywhere we look, the right most fundamental to our (or any) democracy– the right to vote – is under attack.

This quote from the Brennan Center website sums up the situation for 2021: "Between January 1 and December 7, at least **19 states passed 34 laws restricting access to voting**. More than 440 bills with provisions that restrict voting access have been introduced in 49 states in the 2021 legislative sessions. These numbers are extraordinary: state legislatures enacted far more restrictive voting laws in 2021 than in any year since the Brennan Center began tracking voting legislation <u>in 2011</u>. More than a third of all restrictive voting laws enacted since then were passed this year. And in a new trend this year, legislators introduced bills to allow partisan actors to interfere with election processes or even reject election results entirely." The Brennan Center goes on to say this attack will likely continue, unabated in 2022.

The Supreme Court eviscerated the Voting Rights Act in 2013 (Shelby County v. Holder), paving the way for this onslaught. The Freedom to Vote Act would correct this, however opponents of this bill claim it is a partisan power grab that denies the States their right to arrange their voting laws as they wish. However, historian Heather Cox Richardson explains in her January 16, 2022, essay that Constitution allows for the Federal Government, at any time, make laws to alter State regulations.

From the comfort of our 21<sup>st</sup> century lives, we need to remember that people fought and died for the right to vote. Many were brutally murdered by people who considered any person of color to be "less than" white people. Some of these people would still murder to maintain their version of white supremacy.

The Constitution was amended in 1870 (15<sup>th</sup> Amendment) to state: "[t]he right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State on account of race, color, or previous condition of servitude." In that same amendment, it provided that "[t]he Congress shall have the power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation."

Unless we start refusing to reelect persons who will not wholeheartedly support the right of all our citizens to vote, and until we hold those elected officials who continue to perpetuate the "Big Lie" of the 2020 accountable, we risk getting to a point where what Congress does to protect the right to vote will be irrelevant. The authoritarian powers we will have turned our democracy into an autocracy and shame on all of us for allowing it to happen.
