Diversity, Equity, Inclusion (DEI)

The American Association of University Women is the nation's leading organization advocating **equity** for women and girls.

Every member is aware that **equity** is the focus of AAUW. It is stated explicitly in the AAUW Mission Statement: To advance **equity** for women and girls through research, education, and advocacy.

Yet, there is a need to look deeper at the term. Equity and Equality are often used interchangeably. Though they come from the same root they have different meanings that directly affect our understanding of what is equitable.

As defined on the AAUW.ca website:

Equity Refers to fair and just practices and policies that ensure all community members can thrive. Equity is different from equality in that equality implies treating everyone as if their experiences are exactly the same. Being equitable means acknowledging and addressing structural inequities, both historic and current, that advantage some and disadvantage others. Equal treatment results in equity ONLY if everyone starts with equal access to opportunities. Many of you are aware of my passion for shoes. I thought a shoe story might illustrate the difference between equitable and equality:

A small village population needs to walk to a nearby town on a rough, gravel road to access the shops, schools, churches, and services each individual needs. None of the men, women or children in the village has a pair of shoes so the town is inaccessible to them. A good Samaritan offers to provide shoes to the villagers so they can reach the town. The shoes arrive, 200 pair of size 7 sneakers. This is **equality**; every villager now has the exact same pair of shoes. But can all now reach their destination to access the services of the town? The answer is obvious. The same size shoe does not provide the same accessibility to travel to the town. To be **equitable** each villager needs a shoe that fits them to enable them to walk on the road. Shoes would need to be available in appropriate sizes, widths, even some with orthopedics to provide the same opportunity to each villager. That means some shoes may cost more than others or be a different style, but the difference is necessary to provide all villagers access to the town.

This gives new meaning to the phrase "If the shoe fits....."

Sexual Assault on College Campuses

College campuses should be safe spaces where students can study, learn, pursue academic goals and engage in social activities. Unfortunately, college campuses have also long been places where students can face sexual violence. A 2019 study conducted by the Association of American Universities found the rate of undergraduates who experienced rape or sexual assault through physical force, violence, or incapacitation to be 26.4 percent for females, 23.1 percent for transgender, genderqueer, or nonconforming (TGQN) students, and 6.8 percent for males.

A crucial first step toward solving problems is accurate reporting and measurement. While numerous studies show that campus rape is common, an analysis by AAUW found that the vast majority (89%) of 11,000 American college and university campuses reported zero incidents of rape. This speaks to the inadequacy of reporting structures rather than the frequency of assaults. Only 1 in 5 female undergraduates report their sexual assault to authorities, with victims often reluctant to notify officials because they worry that they won't be believed or might face retaliation. Many schools make it difficult for students to come forward, and a majority fail to properly report incidents of sexual violence when they occur.

Further exacerbating the problem, in 2017 the U.S. Department of Education, led by then-secretary Betsy DeVos, rescinded a number of sexual harassment protections under Title IX. The DeVos rule expanded protections for those accused of sexual misconduct. It subjected sexual abuse claims to higher standards of evidence than other claims. It gave the accused the rights to a live hearing and to cross-examine accusers, which was not previously allowed. And it released schools from investigating incidents that occur off campus. As a result of these changes to Title IX, it has become even more challenging to report sexual assaults through official university channels.

In March 2021 President Biden signed an Executive Order directing Secretary of Education Miguel Cardona to suspend, revise or rescind the DeVos-era rule, or begin the process of collecting comments to draft a new rule. The Department of Education started that process in June 2021 and announced in December that it will unveil new proposed Title IX rules in April 2022, a month earlier than initially expected. The Department has indicated that it intends to propose major revisions to the current Title IX rules, including the definition of sexual harassment and how schools must respond to complaints of sexual harassment. Further, the Department has stated that it will prioritize protections for students based on sexual orientation and gender identity. The AAUW CA Public Policy committee will be looking out for the Department 's new proposed Title IX revisions in the spring and will provide updates as they become available.

Once critical protections for students are restored and further protections established, additional focus will be needed to fully enforce Title IX and to provide oversight of schools' compliance with the laws. AAUW will continue to defend Title IX and promote its effective enforcement as a key to fair and equitable education for women and girls in the United States.

NOMINATING COMMITTEE

AAUW Whittier Tech Trek Summer Camp at Whittier College is in GREAT NEED of DORM MOMS, and a few Professional Women working in STEM fields (Professional Women's Night) at Whittier College for the week of June 19-25.

In order to operate the camp, we need to have enough staff. As of 3/15/22, we have enough Core Teachers. What we don't have are enough dorm moms. To accommodate 100 girls, we need one Dorm Mom per ten girls. We need 3 more Dorm Moms. Think of recently retired members/younger members; college students; relatives: prospective members; teachers; neighbors, etc. This can be great opportunity for recruiting members.

It is certainly wonderful that branches raise money and (want to) send girls to Whittier Tech Trek, however, each year we struggle to find enough Dorm Moms (age 21 or older & eligible for AAUW membership). We hope branch members will step up and volunteer to be Dorm Moms! It is exceptionally rewarding. And, to emphasize again: to accommodate 100 girls we MUST have three more Dorm Moms.

Dorm Moms: DMs receive a small stipend, room and board and lots of joy. DMs are responsible for a small group of Tech Trek campers, provide emotional support, and respond to camper's questions and concerns throughout the week. DM's will hold daily meetings with their dorm groups, keep track of their whereabouts throughout the day, and accompany girls to campus activities and field trips. They will help with the enforcement of camp rules and policies. Training and support are provided!!

It's SPRING – YAY! OK, so it's been cold and snowy in my neck of the woods and I'm looking forward to my first taste of Mountain Springtime.

I have it on good authority that Barbara Gile gave a wonderful presentation on AAUW to the Whittier Rotary Club members and their president, Ms. Laura Dryjanska, on Friday March 4. Nadine Wilcox assisted as media tech for a presentation to the group at the Roadhouse Grill in person and on ZOOM. Way to go, Barbara!

Kristine Yeseta welcomed first grand baby; a little girl named Makayla Charlotte. All the best wishes in the world for this new little one and her loving family.

Karen Van der Baan provided this: Patricia mentioned *The Gilded Age* in the last newsletter. I have been watching it and its depiction of that time period's high society in New York. In my younger days I read Edith Wharton's *Age of Innocence* and *House of Mirth*. This series seems to be spot-on in highlighting the very rigid rules of conduct in the upper echelons of society, the difficulty breaking into it and how easily one can fall from grace - not to mention the lack of kindness and empathy displayed by the 400. But it is very entertaining! Karen, I also understand that the costumes are fabulous!

Mandy Knight reports the proverbial good news/bad news scenario: It felt so great to pack a suitcase again! Traveling to and through the Copper Canyon in Mexico involved 40 wonderful people, one knowledgeable tour guide and an ever so cautious bus driver! Our journey of 1,500 miles began and ended in Phoenix; we traveled through the states of Chihuahua, Sinaloa and Sonora crossing desert, climbing into mountains and then back down to sea level to the Sea of Cortez. We stayed in 5 wonderful towns along the way and stayed immersed in the culture and customs of each region. The "jewel" of the trip was the Copper Canyon!

Seven times larger than the Grand Canyon, the Copper Canyon is a spectacular natural attraction in Northern Mexico. The Teleférico de las Barrancas del Cobre had us at bird's-eye level in a matter of minutes; this Swiss-style cable car cruises over the rugged canyon walls to reveal panoramas of the deep chasm below. Not a fan of a swaying cable car? We boarded the El Chepe railroad which claims to be one of the most scenic railroads in the world. It took 89 years to complete. There are 32 trestles and more than 86 tunnels covering the 420-mile journey from the coast to the Chihuahuan desert. It was a spectacular ride! It was so wonderful to be traveling again!

Unfortunately, as Mandy reports, "Not so fun was being back only 4 days to find water seeping up through the planks of the floor in the kitchen. Here's the short version of what I expect to be a long story: ice maker line to the refrigerator.... water mitigation.... the contents of my kitchen, living, dining and half of my family rooms are in my garage.....followed by the demolition of walls/floors/cabinets/countertops and 24/7 fans providing very own sleep noise machine! LA CUISINE

Décontracté (laid back) French dinner. Most of the recipes are simple, but delicious.
