#### Thank you

June marks the end of our 2021-2022 GWA-AAUW Branch year. I want to give a huge thank you to all of the elected and appointed board members, committee members and volunteers. # **Diversity, Equity, Inclusion (DEI)**

# **MYRA LONG SCHOLARSHIP FUND**

This year MLSF has had good news and disappointing news. The disappointments are due to the economic state of our nation. We all know that when there is inflation our investments are affected.

The good news is \$800 was sent in by Myra Long's daughter in honor of her Elgin, Illinois AAUW branch's birthday.

**Scholarships:** This year MLSF budgeted \$28,000 for scholarships. The high school scholarships have gone smoothly with four in-person interviews at California High School and two former Tech Trek candidates were interviewed via zoom. MLSF is awarding \$13,000 to the six high school applicants.

We are experiencing a continuing problem communicating with Rio Hondo Community College despite numerous attempts to reach the school. This year there were no scholarship applicants from Rio Hondo. MLSF is offering additional scholarship money to continuing students who attend college full-time, according to the criteria of their four-year college, and who maintain at least a 2.25 GPA.

**Special Projects Fund:** Sharon Heck reported that money for a special project has gone to three great teachers. The MLSF Board is considering a suggestion to contact principals of local middle schools about the availability of special funds for use by math/science teachers during summer school.

We are grateful for the over \$6,000 donations received from the non-event fundraiser this spring. A big thank you to all who have donated or intend to make a donation in 2022.

The Myra Long scholarship committee was thoroughly impressed with the dedication of this year's senior high school girl scholarship recipients. Their poise, devotion to schoolwork and service to community are testaments to their deserving this honor. Here is a brief biography of each.

- Evelyn Gomez would like to become a physical therapist. She has been involved in numerous sports at Cal High while maintaining a 4.0 GPA. Her counselor comments, "I have always been impressed with Evelyn's mature attitude and her ability to communicate effectively." She is the youngest of five children.
- Elizabeth Guzman is a Cal High student who lives with her grandparents. "My family's experiences with cancer and poverty have encouraged me to prevent others from these experiences." One summer she worked with peers across the region and nation in a National Youth Leadership Forum in Medicine. She volunteers at PIH and works on the school newspaper. Elizabeth wants to become a registered nurse and work with UNICEF.
- Alani Morales, a senior at Whittier High and former Tech Trekker, hopes to become a physician's assistant. Alani has volunteered over 160 hours at PIH, tutors at the Boys and Girls Club, and founded Destined Doctors, a zoom club featuring speakers in the medical field. Her PIH coordinator says, "Alani has the heart for serving others."
- **Katelyn Perez** from Cal High wants to become an engineer. She volunteers at her church, has participated in school sports, and is a member of the drafting club. Her church Outreach Coordinator says, "She reflects the best that society has to offer." Katelyn will attend Cal Poly San Luis Obispo.
- Anett Pajuelo attends Wilson High in Hacienda Heights and is also a former Trekker. She plans to study speech/language pathology. Her inspiration is her grandfather who had speech difficulties and passed away last year. She tutors at the Boys and Girls Club, has a 4.02 GPA. and is a member of the Spanish Honor Society. Anett recalls being nervous as she waited for her Tech Trek interview when someone whispered, "Hold your head up high and keep going." She uses that saying often.
- Jade Zubiate, a straight-A student at Cal High, would like to become a doctor. She is a member of the Link Crew where she promoted Kindness Week, has taken part in sports, and in numerous clubs. Her Spanish teacher commented, "No matter what I say about Jade's amazing qualities, this paper will never match her exceptional personality."

Two of the recipients mentioned their Tech Trek experiences. The committee decided to extend the scholarship program to those who took part in Whittier's Tech Trek camp in 2018. It was a deeply moving experience to help them, along with the others, in reaching their academic goals.

#### **PUBLIC POLICY**

There are so many disturbing things going on in the world that it was difficult to pick a topic for my last Public Policy article. Between the rise of fascism and the dangers it poses to our democracy; the echo-chamber of disinformation flying around the internet and rampant on social media; the economic stress that the combination of COVID, the Russian invasion of Ukraine; and corporate greed has wrought on Americans, it was difficult to choose. So, since this has always been a hot-button issue with me, I opted for the assault on Reproductive Rights.

AAUW's position on Reproductive Rights is simple – without them women cannot reach their full potential. Without the right to control the time and manner of our reproduction and the size of our families, all other rights are moot. Yet, 26 states are primed to ban abortions in part or completely if Justice Alito's majority decision draft is enacted.

It feels personal to us because it is personal. Whether you are a woman like me who fought this battle once and, on many days, feels too tired or disheartened to fight it again, or a young mother with daughters terrified of the anti-woman nature of the anti-choice attacks, it is highly personal because it removes our bodily autonomy in a way no other public-policy decision can.


In the years that I have been researching abortion policy, I have heard every argument for government interference in this most personal of health decisions. Starting with the ludicrous notion that the fetus is a separate entity, to the idiotic idea that a newly fertilized, microscopic egg is a person with as many or more rights than the women forced to carry it to term to the ultimate absurdity that the anti-choice minority is pro-life, the lies abound. Please talk to me about how "pro-life" these anti-choice fanatics are when voting against the child tax credit, nutrition programs for children, and, just recently against the president's use of emergency measures to ensure an adequate supply of infant-formula.

I've also heard every argument for the right of women to make their own decisions, from privacy to the fact that outlawing abortion does not curb abortions; it increases women's death from illegal, unsterile, and unsafe abortions, and to the fact that these bans fall hardest on poor women and women of color. All of this resonates with me, but I have concluded that none if it matters. Does that surprise you? Let me explain.

At the crux of the matter is bodily autonomy. I do not care what anyone's opinion is on abortion. I simply am not concerned about anyone's point of view, except the woman in whose body the fetus must grow to survive. In no other medical situation can you be forced to use your bodily resources for the benefit of another human. You cannot be forced to donate blood to save lives; it matters not if you are the perfect organ match for someone who will die without that donation, you cannot be coerced. Heck, your organs cannot even be harvested *after your death* without your prior permission or the permission of your heirs. No states require that you put yourself in danger (mortal or otherwise) for the sake of someone else, even your closest relations or your child. So, how can it be that a woman can be coerced into carrying a pregnancy to term by our government.

One more thing to note. If you think these bans will stop with state legislatures, think again. The Anti-Choice minority will not stop until there is a national ban on all abortions from the moment of conception on, with no exceptions for rape or incest, and, quite possibly, not for the life of the mother, either. When Margaret Atwood was writing *The Handmaid's Tale*, she put it aside several times thinking the premise was too farfetched. She was wrong!


