PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

WELCOME BACK TO OUR NEW YEAR (2022-23) FOR GWA-AAUW MEMBERS!

I am honored to be your new President, and look forward to this coming year. My theme for the year is **INCLUSION OF ALL MEMBERS:** *engaging and including all new and returning members to our board and branch, in as many ways as possible.* We as your Board leadership would like to engage with you personally in whatever way pulls you into a more active role as a member in our local AAUW branch. Whether you participate in-person, or when hybrid ZOOM meetings are available (depending on your comfort level of attendance to section and general meetings, etc.), as well as by phone or in other ways personally that resonate for you as an ongoing or new member.

PUBLIC POLICY

When Women Vote, We Change the Conversation!

Since 1881, AAUW has been a leading voice promoting education and equity for women and girls. AAUW encourages women voters to get involved in the political process and gain a better understanding of the impact legislative action can have on our lives.

The recent US Supreme Court *Dobbs* decision on abortion has stimulated action in many states across the nation, including California. Our legislature passed and Governor Newsom signed **AB 1666 which will enable a woman coming into California to receive an abortion to be protected from la**wsuits originating in her home state. This bill was co-sponsored by AAUW CA! A further step protecting a woman's right to make personal medical decisions is a **Constitutional Amendment, Proposition 1,** which will be on the November 8 ballot. It would amend the California Constitution to prohibit the state from denying or interfering with an individual's reproductive freedom in her most intimate decisions, which includes the fundamental right to choose to have an abortion and the fundamental right to choose or refuse contraceptives. AAUW CA supports this Constitutional Amendment.

Congressional races are particularly important this November. Redistricting after the 2020 Census has changed the boundaries of many Congressional districts. In the current partisan climate, we need to be aware of what is at stake in both our national and state upcoming elections. For most of us our current member of Congress, Linda Sanchez, CD 38, is still on the ballot. Be sure to become informed soon on the candidates for Congress in your district, if you are not in CD 38. As you sort through all this, please reflect on priority issues affecting us, our daughters, and granddaughters, and evaluate candidates' positions on these issues.

In the Whittier area there will be elections for Whittier Union High School District, Rio Hondo College District, Whittier City School District, South Whittier School District, Lowell Joint School District, Montebello Unified SD, Norwalk La Mirada School District, El Rancho School District, plus cities of Santa Fe Springs, La Habra Heights, and Pico Rivera councils. In addition, there are judicial run-offs, Sheriff run-off, Central Basin Water District and Metropolitan Water District. Many candidates will have their qualifications and answers to questions posted on VotersEdge.org

MYRA LONG SCHOLASHIP FUND (MLSF)

September 2022

"MLSF is a standing committee with the purpose of receiving, investing, and distributing funds from corporations and individuals for the purpose of providing educational scholarships, programs, conferences and seminars consistent with the corporation goals and objectives." GWA-AAUW Bylaws

Fiduciary Responsibilities: The annual insurance premium of \$783.00 was paid. Tax preparation costs for 2020-21 of \$358.00 were paid. The Calton investment account was closed and \$84,654.22 was transferred to Edward Jones investment account in January 2022. A fund-raising letter was sent out in March on Myra Long's birthday. We are grateful for the over \$9,000 donations received from the non-event fundraiser this spring and \$2,193.00 from Ellen Larson's estate. A big thank you to all who have donated. Our committee meetings are held quarterly: February; May; August; and November. We are now meeting in the First United Methodist Church Board Room in Uptown Whittier at 9AM on the first Tuesday of the designated months. The meetings are open to all members. The committee will publish plans and activities in the GWA-AAUW monthly newsletter.

2021-2022 Update: This past year two of our directors moved from the Greater Whittier Area, and we know four of the directors were quarantined with COVID. Despite the many health and communication issues, money was raised, High School Scholarships were awarded to senior girls for 2022 fall college expenses, grants were distributed to Math/Science teachers, and six, middle school girls went to the Whittier College Teck Trek camp. A seventh girl was turned away due to lack of communication regarding the COVID restrictions. This means there is \$950 remaining in the State AAUW Special Projects Fund for next year.

Scholarships: This year MLSF budgeted \$28,000 for scholarships. The high school scholarships went smoothly with four in-person interviews at California High School and two former Tech Trek candidates were interviewed via zoom. MLSF awarded \$10,000 to the six high school applicants. Carole Restovich, Scholarship Chairperson reports that Rio Hondo Community College is now ready to disseminate the scholarship applications for 2022-23.

Special Projects Fund: Since Whittier College was not available for the annual Math/Science Conference, \$4,700.00 in grants was given to middle school Math and Science Teachers. Nine teachers applied and received awards. Principals of local middle schools were contacted regarding the availability of money for use by math and science teachers during summer school. Sharon Heck, Math/Science Coordinator is planning the Math/Science Conference in 2023. As always, we will need volunteers for the many tasks regarding this worthwhile program.

MORNING BOOK

Welcome to a new year of reading and discussion! We will meet on Monday, September 26, at 10AM, and our first selection is *The Lincoln Highway*, by Amor Towles. The novel begins in June, 1954, when eighteen-year-old Emmett Watson is driven home to Nebraska by the warden of the juvenile work farm where he has just served fifteen months for involuntary manslaughter. His mother long gone, his father recently deceased, and the family farm foreclosed upon by the bank, Emmett's intention is to pick up his eight-year-old brother, Billy, and head to California where they can start their lives anew. But when the warden drives away, Emmett discovers that two friends from the work farm have hidden themselves in the trunk of the warden's car. Together, they have hatched an altogether different plan for Emmett's future, one that will take them all on a fateful journey in the opposite direction—to the City of New York. Spanning just ten days and told from multiple points of view, Towles's third novel will satisfy fans of his multi-layered literary styling while providing them an array of new and richly imagined settings, characters, and themes. Set in the 1950s, *The* <u>Lincoln Highway</u> is filled with nostalgia as well as the gentle naïveté and hijinks of those who are young, optimistic, and on a mission. The story follows four boys who set out to travel the country in search of a fresh start: Emmett and Billy want to find their mother who left them when they were young, and Duchess and Woolly are on the hunt for a stashed wad of cash. Sometimes their dreams are aligned but often they are not. In other words, adventure ensues: There's train hopping and car stealing, and with that comes the inevitability of trouble sparked from both good and bad intentions. Each of these young men is chasing his dreams, but their pasts—whether violent or sad—are never far behind. Please join us at Linda Pomeroy's home: 1620 N. Cedarcrest Dr., Brea. I will provide refreshments.
