Now that our first meeting of the new calendar year is past, we can look ahead to October's Branch meeting where we will gain some insights from our speaker and Public Policy expert, Margo Reeg. Margo is presently serving as co-President of the League of Women Voters of LA County with Nancy Mahr from Rolling Hills. Margo served as Government Director of the California League of Women Voters from 1995-1999. After that, Margo has been VP for Voter Service on the LA County Board, giving her time extensively. She is devoted to the importance of voting, having been a League member for 52 years. In addition to Voter Service, she has also been involved in a number of studies regarding environmental issues and governmental issues like the Electoral College, and National Popular Vote. Margo also follows redistricting and will be involved in the Whittier City redistricting this winter. Furthermore, Margo is presently a consultant on Voting Rights for LWVC (League of Women Voters of California) where she analyzes bills related to election procedures and voting.

At our October Branch meeting, Margo will be presenting two measures that AAUW and the League support, in addition to discussing a confusing proposition regarding gambling. Considering the impact some of these measures will have on all Californians, it is imperative to know what is at stake when we cast our ballot this November. PUBLIC POLICY



When Women Vote, They Change the Conversation

AAUW California supports the passage of **Propositions 1 and 28** on the November ballot in California. *Proposition 1.* The decision by the Supreme Court of the United States to overturn Roe v. Wade dealt a serious blow to the rights of women to make their own decision about their bodies. This spurred many state legislatures to act to ban abortion, some with no exceptions for rape, incest, or endangering the life of the mother. Abortion bans in other states have already taken effect. Yet polls in many states show a majority in support of protecting the rights of women to choose to have abortions. Currently, women are coming from other states to obtain abortions in California. An Abortion Access website is being formed in our state to enable and assist out-of-state women with travel arrangements, housing, medical appointments, and other matters.

California Legislators, recognizing the remote possibility that at some future time state legislation could ban abortions, took timely action in June to pass SCR 10. This put **Proposition 1, the Constitutional Right to Reproductive Freedom**, on the November ballot. Passage of Prop 1 will amend the California Constitution, stating "Section 1.1 is added to Article I thereof, to read: SEC. 1.1. The state shall not deny or interfere with an individual's reproductive freedom in their most intimate decisions, which includes their fundamental right to choose to have an abortion and their fundamental right to choose or refuse contraceptives. This section is intended to further the constitutional right to privacy guaranteed by Section 1, and the constitutional right to not be denied equal protection guaranteed by Section 7. Nothing herein narrows or limits the right to privacy or equal protection."

AAUW CA has begun a Social Media campaign to educate and encourage voters to support Prop 1. Weekly messages contain important facts. If you don't use social media, we urge you to email the messages to others who do!

Prop. 1 is also strongly supported by the League of Women Voters.

Proposition 28. In the context of AAUW CA's Public Policy Priorities in support of Education, AAUW CA supports **Proposition 28, The Arts and Music in Schools – Funding Guarantee and Accountability Act.** Studies on educational achievement prove that arts and music education improve student learning. Music education has been shown to improve cognitive development and spatial reasoning while the dramatic arts improve reading comprehension. Arts and music education has also been shown to improve school attendance and individual self-confidence and motivation to learn, particularly among poor and other at-risk students. Yet these programs are usually the first cut when school budgets are reduced. Prop 28 would provide a minimum source of annual funding coming from the state General Fund to K-12 public schools to supplement arts education programs. School districts would be held accountable to use the funds for hiring certificated employees and purchasing supplies and materials. Diversity Equity, Inclusion (DEI)

What is Implicit Bias?

The term bias is easily defined and understood. It reflects a personal and sometimes unreasoned judgment: prejudice.

You probably are aware of your overt bias towards something but we all have unconscious biases, too. Unconscious bias is something you are not aware of; an idea or feeling not deliberately held.

It is important to identify and become aware of your unconscious biases as the first step in ridding ourselves of them.

The Harvard Implicit Bias Test is a tool to help you understand more about yourself. There are fifteen "tests" on subjects including race, gender, presidents, age, and weight.

The Implicit Association Test (IAT) measures attitudes and beliefs that people may be unwilling or unable to report. The IAT may be especially interesting if it shows that you have an implicit attitude that you did not know about. For example, you may believe that women and men should be equally associated with science, but your automatic associations could show that you (like many others) associate men with science more than you associate women with science.

You may be able to take something of value from the experience of taking one or more of these tests.

Note: This is a computer-driven testing experience and I found it challenging to respond quickly which may influence the results.



MYRA LONG SCHOLARSHIP FUND (MLSF)



October 2022

"MLSF is a standing committee with the purpose of receiving, investing, and distributing funds from corporations and individuals for the purpose of providing educational scholarships, programs, conferences and seminars consistent with the corporation goals and objectives." GWA-AAUW Bylaws

It will be helpful to remind ourselves about the relationship between MLSF and the AAUW branch. The two were separate entities/organizations until the merger/incorporation in 2011.

MLSF was established as a separate entity by a few AAUW Whittier Branch members in late 1998 and received tax-exempt status under the federal Internal Revenue Code - section 501(c)(3) - in November 1999. The EIN currently used by GWA-AAUW is the original MLSF EIN.

There has always been a symbiotic relationship between MLSF and the branch - both benefit from the relationship. There are several reasons why members of AAUW Whittier Branch and MLSF thought a formal merging of the two would be even more beneficial than the sometimes-elusive symbiosis. Two of the major reasons are that (1) the branch gains tax-exempt status that previously it did not have and (2) the merger would help eliminate confusion among members and donors about what MLSF is and does. In the process, we also applied for and received status as a corporation under California State law. Remarkably, the Internal Revenue Service granted our request to change the name on the MLSF EIN to GWA AAUW, thus eliminating the agonizing process of the branch having to apply for tax-exempt status as a 501(c)(3).

GWA-AAUW does not give or donate money to MLSF from the branch funds (look at the budget). The Whittier branch donates to the AAUW Fund located in Washington D.C. The branch does not provide any direct financial support in its budget to the MLSF. Generous members of GWA-AAUW, as individuals, support MLSF fundraisers and give direct donations. Also, the branch helps raise funds for MLSF by sponsoring activities like Dining 4 \$\$.

A way to remember the differences is: AAUW Fund = National Philanthropy and MLSF = Local Philanthropy and we all work together for a better understanding with the same goals.

Sometimes, symbiotic relationships can be quite confusing. Hopefully, this helps unravel some of the confusion about GWA-AAUW and MLSF.
