PUBLIC POLICY

Now we can all breathe a sigh of relief! The election is finally over and no more irritating ads! We can be grateful that the Right to Reproductive Freedom has been safely incorporated into the Constitution in California as well as in Michigan and Vermont. Kansas and Kentucky rejected measures to end the state constitutional right to abortion. In Montana, voters rejected a measure to require medical care be given to any fetus born alive, and failure to do so would result in prosecution.

In addition, we can celebrate that children in our schools will be given more arts and music experiences from dedicated teachers due to the passage of Proposition 28. Our young people will also be less likely to become addicted to nicotine now that the sale of flavored tobacco products is banned, thanks to Prop. 31.

From national AAUW: Americans showed up in record numbers at the polls across race, gender, and age, electing a <u>historically diverse slate of candidates</u>. Glass ceilings were broken in governors' houses across the country as 12 women won that office—a new record. Candidates and soon-to-be-sworn-in elected officials alike were more diverse than ever, with women, people of color, young leaders, and LGBTQ+ people taking center stage. In addition, we were pleased to see that many voters came out in support of candidates who align with AAUW's policy priorities on the economy, education, and health care—with a focus on abortion rights.

On the Congressional level, AAUW is asking us to learn more about women's Pay Equality and support stronger accountability on college campuses with respect to sexual violence.

- The final two <u>Equal Pay Days</u> of the year are coming up: Native Women's Equal Pay Day on November 30, and Latina's Equal Pay Day on December 8. Native women and Latinas are paid, respectively, 50 cents and 49 cents for every dollar paid to white men. Engage with us on <u>social media</u> to urge your senators to pass the <u>Paycheck Fairness</u> Act and support pay equity for all!
- Last month, the <u>AAUW-endorsed</u> Campus Accountability and Safety Act (CASA) was introduced in Congress. The bill (<u>H.R.9316/S.5047</u>) would combat sexual violence on college campuses, provide resources for survivors, and more.

DIVERSITY, EQUITY, INCLUSION

Recently, the State DEI Committee held a chat for DEI officers from each branch. A panel, comprised of national officers, answered questions from Stormy Miller Sabia, AAUW California DEI chair. The panel, Julia Brown, AAUW National Board of Directors Chair, and Melissa La Duke, AAUW DEI Chair, addressed DEI issues facing branches.

Questions included: How to engage lack of engagement or issues of DEI? How to address the lack of diversity within a branch membership? How can we learn all of this? These questions and the panels' answers will appear in future branch newsletter articles.

As a first step, it was suggested that branches ensure AAUW programs address and reflect issues of intersectionality. What exactly is intersectionality?

Intersectionality is the complex, cumulative way in which the effects of multiple forms of discrimination (such as racism, sexism, and classism) combine, overlap or intersect especially in experiences.

Equal pay is an example of the influence of intersectionality. Men and women are paid unequally for equal work. But moms or Latinas may make even less than the 82 cents women make for every dollar a white man makes. Other influences than just being a woman impact pay equity. These influences overlap and intersect to determine the inequity of an individual's pay.

Our identity is actually a combination of multiple identities formed from our unique experiences. These identities intersect. The result is that we each are affected differently by the same set of circumstances such as pay inequity. Recognizing that each of our branch members, though alike in many ways, is a combination of unique experiences and perspectives will help us as a branch in taking DEI action steps in our planning.



MATH/SCIENCE CONFERENCE FOR 8TH GRADE GIRLS


Our Math/Science Conference for 8th Grade Girls will be at Whittier College on Tuesday, January 10, 2023. Everything is coming together very nicely. I have 18 of the 20 speakers firmly in place with two other speakers very likely. I will send the list of speakers to the 27 schools before the end of November so that the girls can choose their five favorites. The schools send me their list of 14 girls and their speaker choices in December. I set up the ten workshops with two speakers in each workshop. Kaye Kidwell helps me create an envelope of three tickets for each girl and counselor. Tickets are required for entry to the workshops.

We have ordered three-years-worth of the cloth backpacks which are given to each participant. The girls are given a snack as they leave the Shannon Center where the opening orientation session is held. We must use the Whittier College food service for all food distributed, including the snacks for the girls, the early morning coffee and rolls, and the lunches given to speakers and volunteers. With the rent we pay to Whittier College and all the expenses listed above, we can see our Myra Long Scholarship Fund at work. It truly is a worthwhile project.

The students begin arriving at 8:15 AM and the third workshop ends at 12:45 PM. I am so happy we are holding this conference after a three-year hiatus due to the pandemic.
