In her study, she is exploring the educational and theatrical application of new technologies by Playtronica. Using their innovative musical gadgets, she is able to transform touch between people and objects into sound. AAUW FUND

AAUW Fund supports Fellowships and Grants to women scholars. One of the Fellowships, the American Fellowship, awards **\$8,000–\$50,000**.

The American Fellowship program began in 1888, a time when women were discouraged from pursuing an education. It is AAUW's largest fellowship program and the oldest non-institutional source of graduate funding for women in the United States.

AAUW American Fellowships support women scholars who are pursuing full-time study to complete dissertations, conducting postdoctoral research full-time, or preparing research for publication for eight consecutive weeks. Applicants must be U.S. citizens or permanent residents. Candidates are evaluated on the basis of scholarly excellence; quality and originality of project design; and active commitment to helping women and girls through service in their communities, professions, or fields of research.

We are fortunate to have one of the "fellows", Stacey Cabaj, as our speaker at the February 11 branch meeting. This past year 320 Fellowships and Grants were made in the amount of \$6 million dollars. Stacey is Assistant Professor of Acting and Pedagogy at Loyola Marymount University. She is the co-author of a forthcoming book, *Lessons from Our Students*. Her topic is "The Sound of Touch" which will be a revelation to our members about a new aspect of pedagogy. Diversity, Equity, Inclusion (DEI)

Last month the article introduced a panel, comprised of national officers, who answered questions from Stormy Miller Sabia, AAUW California DEI chair. The panel, Julia Brown, AAUW National Board of Directors Chair, and Melissa La Duke, AAUW DEI Chair, addressed DEI issues facing branches.

This month's panel responses focus on the Question:

How can a branch address lack of diversity within our membership?

There are no set model programs to follow.

Branches need to determine the interests of their members; what members are willing to do to bring in new members; then consider what planning is needed to implement the ideas. The online toolkit has resources to assist branches in planning events.

Attend a variety of community programs, activities, and events. Go to places not normally attended. Interact with people beyond one's usual circle of contacts.

Round tables facilitate more interaction at luncheons. However, members tend to sit with people they know and a new member or guest may feel isolated. Do you have a table hostess who sees everyone at the table is welcomed, feels comfortable, and is included in the conversation? Feelings of isolation are a deterrent to maintaining a diverse membership. Our Meet and Greet exemplifies creating that welcoming, inclusive atmosphere that we should strive to replicate at branch meetings.

Lobby Days are Here Again

Save the Dates March 21st and March 22nd, are the AAUW CA scheduled Lobby Days. Many thanks to members Sharon Heck, Chris Heller, Paula Ocampo, Nadine Wilcox, and Margo Reeg who registered to participate in Lobby Day.

Advocating for our top 3 priority bills is fundamental to achieving our legislative priorities by addressing economic security for all women, providing equal access to public education, and insuring social and racial justice for all members of society. We need all members on board and will be counting on you to reach out to our elected officials in the CA legislature.

Our Public Policy Committee will make it easy for you to do so. This year instead of a full week, Lobby Day will consist of two days and will occur while the legislature is in session, not on break. Hopefully, more opportunities to actually speak with a member in lieu of a staffer. Our plans are to make it hybrid – virtual and in-person. Those branches in and around Sacramento would have the option of in-person meetings at the Capitol with the remaining branches meeting virtually or in person with staffers in the district. So, a bit more flexibility this year as the committee feels it's beneficial to establish relationships with our elected leaders' local staff.

Our AAUW legislative Advocate will be scheduling meetings with the member offices willing to participate, and once Lobby Day surveys are in, the committee will begin to assemble branch participants and match them with Assembly and Senate districts in order to assign teams. We will provide you with material on the bills we are supporting and schedule a **mandatory training webinar for March 20th**, so you'll have the information at your fingertips. Lobby Day is our chance to make a concerted impact on the priorities and values we, as AAUW members, hold dear. It brings out the "advocates" in all of us for improving the economic and educational lives of women and girls. And goodness knows, we need that commitment now more than ever. So, mark those calendars and join us on Lobby Day/s, March 21 and 22.

MATH/SCIENCE CONFERENCE FOR 8TH GRADE GIRLS



We had a very "wet" Math/Science Conference on Tuesday, January 10, 2023. The girls had to run in the rain across the Whittier College campus, to get to their three sessions. After a brief Opening Session in the Shannon Center where they heard a welcome from our branch president, Nadine Wilcox; heard a keynote address from the president of Whittier College, Dr. Linda Oubre; and heard an orientation from me, they grabbed a snack in the Shannon lobby and headed to their assigned sessions. Each session had two women who spoke about their STEM related careers.

I have read the 300+ student evaluations and they were very positive. The biggest complaint was the difficulty in finding the three buildings and classrooms in each. We were a bit short of volunteers this year, and the rain made things more complicated. It was a good day, however, and I want to thank everyone who had a part in our success.

Each student was given a half-page form to rate each speaker Excellent, Good, Fair, or Poor. Many also wrote in the Comments space at the bottom. Here are some quotations from the student evaluations. "I loved this visit! Thank you for having me. This whole experience has been great and I hope I get to be something good like you girls someday." "It was interesting listening to people talk about their interests. I enjoyed this wonderful experience. I've never visited a college or been in one. Everyone was really kind to me." "Very efficient, specific, & openhearted. It was a pleasure to hear the speakers talk about their experiences & advice they have for us." "I would like to thank this college for the opportunity and would like to let you know I'm grateful for every speaker. I was inspired and interested in everything. I look forward to possibly coming here. Thank you." "I've learned so many things about science. I have also learned about woman power." "Thank you guys for teaching me something today \textcircled ." "This experience was very motivational and eye-opening to me." "Really enjoyed these sessions. Thank you \textcircled ."

There was a line near the bottom of the evaluation where they were asked to rate their Overall Impression of the Conference. On that line, one girl wrote: "Amazing! I got to learn so much!" Here are a couple of very brief comments: "Fun and engaging." "10/10 would recommend."

We did it! Thanks to each one of our volunteers who overcame the weather and joined the group that made things work at the Conference for 8th-grade girls at Whittier College on Tuesday, January 10. Under the amazing leadership of Sharon Heck who planned it all and saw to every detail, we had a successful event. Some of the same people met at the Packet Party on Thursday, January 5 at the home of Pat Dudley to prepare the backpacks for 394 girls who attended! In addition to the list of those who participated in both events, here are some of the comments received from the volunteers which indicate what a meaningful experience it was not only for the students but for the "helpers" also! In addition to the project, members were brought even closer together during the process.

As Pat Dudley said "It is always nice to work with these women. Get the job done then enjoy time with each other. Good way to build connections among members that don't necessarily attend the same sections or sit at the same tables at a luncheon."

Other comments included Pauline Rogers' "It was a bit more rigorous but to see those girls' faces light up with curiosity and interest made that liquid sunshine far less important." Kathy Arriola commented, "It was a day well spent to see not only the girls' gratefulness but getting to know each other as members of AAUW as our meetings allow limited time to share a bit about each other." Mandy Knight wrote, "It absolutely is a highlight and always a learning opportunity for me too." Kay Clark said "One of the important things our branch does. I love volunteering at it and look forward to next year." And Kaye Kidwell noted, "This may become known as the No Matter What Math/Science Conference. The rain wasn't the only obstacle, but we overcame each one".

We had new members attend for the first time, others who combined their responsibilities with other obligations the same day, last-minute substitutions because of illness, and those who took on "double duty" as speakers. It was AAUW at its best—hardworking, resourceful, and ever-continuing to advance equity for women and girls through advocacy, education, and research!
