PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

As your President, my theme for this year's service and leadership is the continued theme from last year: <u>INCLUSION of ALL MEMBERS</u> - engaging & including all new and returning members to our board and branch, in as many ways as possible.

Engaging & including members is really a two-way street. We as board members reach out to you as we have needs of the membership, and members are welcomed and appreciated with whatever skill or interest they have to share with the larger group on the many activities the local association and the board initiates during this 2023-24 year. The Board leadership will keep you informed of when additional help is needed. As members you can seek to initiate inclusion in areas of interest (such as in the Sections, to assist the Section leader); volunteering to help with Math / Science Conference, etc.). With other activities, the call may be for needed assistance for small tasks by Board Members VP or Chairs. As members, you do not have to wait for that request, but know things have to be done that will help in our smooth operation and allow you as a member to see that board activities are a group effort, and more are needed to step up to volunteer in the near future for the board position. Activities you can volunteer to assist are: 1) check in with Kay Clark, Membership Chair, to see if you may assist in the variety of aspects of that position (the upcoming Meet and Greet, and other various activities to encourage and increase membership; 2) check in with Pauline Rogers, Hospitality VP to assist with set-up and breaking down for Branch meetings; 3) inform the President that you would like to review the minutes for the Branch meeting; 4) Sign up as a volunteer for the upcoming Math and Science Day in January 2024 (see /contact Dolores Seidman); 5) Inform the MLSF Board you are interested in helping prep and mail out the Non-Event Fundraiser (usually done in February/March); 6) as Tech Trek begins to formulate plans, volunteers will be needed in planning the various aspects of Tech Trek, there may be a small activity that a member's skills fits the needs of the group. I strongly encourage you to participate gradually in the Branch leadership activities by volunteering in areas of interest. Additionally, each member needs to think about what they can do to recruit new members whenever possible. The membership recruitment goal set by AAUW California is to have each CA branch grow by 6% /year. GWA - AAUW size is approx. 100, we have lost some members this year. So, let's all take an active part in having our branch grow this year by 6% (means minimally 4-6 new members this year. Recruiting and retaining new and longtime members is very necessary. Participation and finding meaning in the larger group, through our smaller activities develops meaningful new relationships. If a member finds their passion or niche, great, now grow some more, by expanding your interest with the larger group.

Each time any one of us stretches a bit and expands the skills we have into new areas; or just being there to help and assist with the smaller more mundane aspects or how the larger group, OUR BRANCH - GWA AAUW stays viable and meaningful to all individuals, and we strive more to the success of **AAUW mission: To advance gender equity for women and girls through research, education, and advocacy**.



PUBLIC POLICY

Margo Reeg, Public Policy Chair, is on top of AAUW Public Policy for our branch. Here is a timely article from AAUW California on gender equity.

Advancing Gender Equity is Advancing Environmental Sustainability (and vice versa) By Missy Maceyko, Co-Chair, AAUW California State Public Policy Committee

After a year of wild weather in California, many of us may be thinking more about climate, environment, and sustainability. How does our concern with the weather relate to AAUW California's <u>Public Policy Priorities</u>? Advancing gender equity is directly related to environmental sustainability. The inverse is also true.

<u>The United Nations sustainable development goals</u>, adopted in 2015, seek to push all countries to act to protect the planet, ensure widespread prosperity, and promote peace. Achieving gender equality, goal number five, is a crucial element in this overall strategy.



We know that <u>having greater gender diversity in leadership</u> improves organizations. One of AAUW California's public policy focus areas is increasing women in leadership positions. However, advancing this goal can also have positive climate impacts. <u>The UN has found that having greater gender diversity</u> in climate discussions leads to improved outcomes on climate-focused policies and projects. This is just one case in which we can see how sustainable development goal 5, promoting greater gender equality, alongside advancing AAUW California's public policy priorities, can be important for achieving sustainable development goal 13, creating more impactful climate action.

Data also shows us that (un)sustainable production and consumption patterns, which harm the environment, <u>tend to be gendered</u>, with "green" choices being widely feminized. While this is a global trend, we see this in popular portrayals of more planet-friendly consumption choices in the United States, as well, such as veganism, <u>which tends to be marked as more "feminine"</u> and less "masculine." This example shows us that sustainable development goal 5, promoting greater gender equality, alongside AAUW California's overall public policy mission of advancing equity for women and girls, is also important for achieving sustainable development goal 12, which focuses on creating more planet-friendly and responsible production and consumption patterns.

Advancing gender equity is directly related to environmental sustainability, and vice versa. In advancing AAUW California's public policy goals, and expanding the rights of all women and girls, we can help create the conditions for greater justice and inclusion, economic parity, and environmental viability, all at the same time.

GWA Reads Together: The Person You Want to Be by Dolly Chugh

November Reading: Part 1: Chapters 1, 2 and 3.

Before Your Read: Review the terms introduced in the preface and introduction as they will be repeated and expanded upon in subsequent chapters. Take two or more of the Harvard Implicit Bias tests prior to reading Part 1.

Chapter 1 focuses on "goodish" people and how our beliefs impact the way we think and act. **Chapter 2** looks at implicit and explicit bias citing the Harvard test as well as providing a story of one individual's experience with his bias. **Chapter 3** covers Privilege...What is it? What isn't it? If you are reading the book and have not notified me, please contact me. The discussion sessions are optional. Members who sign up or contact me directly will receive more detailed Reading/Discussion Guide materials and articles of interest via email each month. It is not too late to participate!




MORNING BOOK

We are meeting this month on Monday, November 27, to discuss <u>*The Lioness of Leiden*</u>, by Robert Loewen. Inspired by true events, Robert Loewen's debut novel pays tribute to the heroism of his mother-in-law, who served as a courier in the Dutch resistance during World War II.

When the Germans invade the Netherlands, Leiden University student Hetty's boyfriend goes missing. But she has little time to grieve when she volunteers as a courier for the Dutch resistance, joined by her roommate, the beautiful Mimi, and seventeen-year-old Maria, the daughter of a slain resistance fighter. At great personal risk, the three women carry documents, secret messages, and cash to protect Jews, downed pilots, and others hiding from the Nazis. During five years of war, Hetty is challenged by a gauntlet of spies and betrayal. She heroically fights back as she and her friends accept increasingly dangerous assignments. All the while, Hetty worries about her family. She tries to forbid her younger brother from volunteering for combat in the resistance and argues with her father about becoming too cozy with the Nazis.

This will be a special meeting as the author will be joining us. The meeting begins at 10 AM at my house, <u>5654 Palm Ave.</u>, Whittier. I will be providing refreshments. 


