Program - Our Women's History Speaker Returns!

Emily Teipe is a Professor Emerita of Fullerton College where she has taught for thirty plus years and continues to teach Women's History there.

Dr. Teipe spends retirement researching and writing books that focus on life in 18th century America as well as religious history. Emily was born in Baltimore, Maryland, attended the University of Maryland, Johns Hopkins University, California State University and holds a doctorate from the University of California. She is the proud mom of four sons and six grandchildren.

Her recent publications are: Our Beloved Friend, the Life and Writing of Anne Emlen Mifflin coauthored with the late Dr. Gary Nash; Different Voices, Women in United States History, Fourth Edition; and a work in progress Las Santas: Our Sisters in Faith and Spirit, Second Edition.

Professor Teipe, who graced our stage in 2023, will be adding to last year's discussion on 'Women and Victorian Culture" by speaking on, "Women and Health in the Victorian Era."

AAUW FUND

Each calendar year National AAUW raises money through contributions to AAUW Fund. These funds support AAUW's programs such as Fellowships and Grants, Public Policy, Research, Start Smart, Work Smart, the Legal Advocacy Fund, Campus Action Projects and NCCWSL. For example, Maddie Dailey, the USC graduate student in Architecture, who spoke at our February Branch Meeting, was the recipient of one of these Fellowships. Over 350 of these fellowships from National go to students studying in California.

In 2023 our branch members contributed \$3,440.50 to AAUW Fund with \$3,090.50 going to the Greatest Need Fund.

Diversity Equity, Inclusion (DEI)

The next session of the GWA AAUW Reads will be on Tuesday, March 26 at 1:30 at the home of Pat Dudley. Read the remainder of the book, *The Person You Mean to Be*, for our discussion. Questions for the chapters have been sent to participants.

If you missed the webinar on Mary Church Terrell, it's not too late to view it. Mary's story on her journey to become a member of an AAUW branch resulted in a court decision. It also provides a comprehensive history of the evolution of AAUW. It is available on the AAUW-CA website. Access information is on the home page.

The GWA Board and participants in the DEI reading sessions took part in a survey being conducted by statewide DEI Branch coordinators. The survey is an environmental scan to measure the progress a branch is making in several aspects of the DEI Mission. The results of the survey will be sent to the state DEI committee to assist them in planning DEI activities and providing support for branches. Results of our survey will be made available when it is completed.

I participated in the National DEI Committee webinar in January. A few take aways:

- Branches are referred to as Affiliates.
- A new Civility Policy is posted on the national website.
- Emphasis was placed on Member Responsibilities.
- Open membership will again be on the ballot this spring.
- Affiliates sign agreements to follow national rules and face consequences if not followed.
- Historically, only 25% of the national membership votes. ALL members are encouraged to vote in our upcoming ballot. Make your voice heard in the decisions being presented.

AAUW CA PUBLIC POLICY

The Role of California School Boards

AAUW California is concerned about the censorship of classroom material, the heightened enforcement of board policies rejecting diversity, and providing discriminatory policies against gay and minority students. This concern now leads me, as a former school board member, high school teacher/department chair and adjunct college professor, to reflect on the role of school boards in California and their limitations.

The State Board of Education (SBE) is the controlling structure for K-12, and is the governing and policy-making body of the state for public education. Among its duties is the adoption of statewide academic standards for content and of curriculum frameworks. These inform and guide the local school boards in the development and implementation of specific curricula for K-12 students, and serve as the basis for the adoption of instructional materials. School board members represent districts within the school district boundaries.

In 2023 AB1078 was passed, which requires the California State Department of Education to assess if school boards are in compliance with state laws requiring public schools to provide diverse and comprehensive education. It requires local school districts with insufficient instructional materials to correct this and authorizes the department to purchase (at district expense) adequate curricula if the district restricts students from learning about important topics like racism, sexism, and gender-based marginalization.

AAUW branch members play a critical role in ensuring all California school boards are governed by board members who will follow AB 1078, and who oppose policies that infringe on the civil rights of LGBTQ+ students.

AAUW Morgan Hill members are attending meetings of the Morgan Hill Unified School District board to monitor both the board and the public for threats to AB 1078 and the rights of all students to an equitable education. PUBLIC POLICY

The March Primary Election is the most important thing to focus on now. Please consult the website VOTE411 (https://www.vote411.org) for information about candidates for county, state, and local offices and on PROPOSITION 1. Urge your friends and neighbors to use VOTE411 and their SOS Election booklet to become informed. Then VOTE!!! Vote Centers open on Saturday, February 24 and will be open through Election Day. Drop Boxes are available throughout the county and are open now. They are emptied daily to safeguard the ballots.

You are also eligible to be an Election Integrity observer of Vote Centers through the Registrar Recorders office or through Common Cause. Many voter resources are available at https://toolkit.lavote.gov/ Members of the public can observe operations at the vote counting center in City of Industry on Crossroads Pkwy. both during the Vote by Mail processing before the election and after during the 29-day canvass. Ballots are counted on Tuesdays and Fridays. Verification of signatures on VBM ballots and verification of provisional ballots is ongoing. The 1% manual audit to crosscheck the computer tallies takes place in the second week of the canvass. Stay tuned to learn about the details of an organized go-see tour.

MYRA LONG SCHOLARSHIP FUND

MLSF COMMITTEE REPORT

The committee met on, Tuesday, February 6, 2024, Nadine Wilcox, and Paula Ocampo were guests. The Tech Trek Coordinator was excused. She is employed full time.

The following issues were discussed and decided upon:

TECK TREK: Nadine Wilcox, in lieu of Brenda Carrillo, discussed the timeline for Tech Trek this year. Rivera Middle School in Pico Rivera will be the participating school this summer. Brenda has met with the principal and a counselor there to explain Tech Trek. AAUW's participants will attend camp during week two, June 23-29. Teacher nominations for Tech Trek participants are due February 16. Parents need to fill out applications by March 1. AAUW member Roslyn Marquez, along with Brenda Carrillo, will help with Spanish translation, mainly for parents. Those who volunteer at the camp must be AAUW members and must sign a Code of Conduct. The applications will be reviewed in March by Tech Trek committee members. A state letter to parents says that parents shall pay \$50 toward the camp.

SCHOLARSHIPS: Carole Restovich reported that Rio Hondo Community College and three area high schools (California, Pioneer, and Whittier) have been contacted and scholarship applications will go online shortly. It was approved that Rio Hondo's "Earlyne Clemons Nursing Scholarship" be valued at \$3,000 this year. Over \$5,00 has been donated in honor of Earlyne, so the more than \$2,000 left over from this year will cover a \$2,000 scholarship next year. The hope is to continue to fund a nursing scholarship at Rio Hondo.

SPECIAL PROJECTS: Pat Dudley discussed the program for teacher requests in the STEM area. There is a \$5,000 budget for grants this year.

OTHER BUSINESS: In 1999, the Myra Long Scholarship Fund was incorporated under the direction of Judy Pappe. This means we are twenty-five years old and growing. To celebrate a fundraising letter will be sent to AAUW members, friends, and special donors. Cheri Trapani is diligently working on the design to have the letter ready by March 15th (Myra Long's birthday) Thanks in advance for making the Myra Long Scholarship Fund a viable part of our branch.



We are meeting this month on Monday, March 25, at 10AM to discuss <u>Lessons in Chemistry</u>, by Bonnie Garmus. Chemist Elizabeth Zott is not your average woman. In fact, Elizabeth Zott would be the first to point out that there is no such thing as an average woman. But it's the early 1960s and her all-male team at Hastings Research Institute takes a very unscientific view of equality. Except for one: Calvin Evans; the lonely, brilliant, Nobel–prize nominated grudge-holder who falls in love with-of all things-her mind. True chemistry results.

But like science, life is unpredictable. Which is why a few years later Elizabeth Zott finds herself not only a single mother, but the reluctant star of America's most beloved cooking show Supper at Six. Elizabeth's unusual approach to cooking ("combine one tablespoon acetic acid with a pinch of sodium chloride") proves revolutionary. But as her following grows, not everyone is happy. Because as it turns out, she isn't just teaching women to cook. She's daring them to change the status quo. Laugh-out-loud funny, shrewdly observant, and studded with a dazzling cast of supporting characters, *Lessons in Chemistry* is as original and vibrant as its protagonist. Andrea Bellamy will be leading the discussion.


